MR. AND MRS. LEE KNORR ARRESTED AT LONE PINE FLAT

—OFFICERS REPORT SEIZURE OF 40 GALLONS OF MOONSHINE

REDMOND, Dec. 5.—Mr. and Mrs. Lee Knorr and Raymond Knorr of Lone Pine flat were arrested Saturday afternoon on a liquor manufacturing charge by Sheriff Topping of Jefferson county, Sheriff Olson of Crook, and Deputy Julian of Deschutes county. The Knorr ranch is in Jefferson county, near the line.

A complete still, 40 gallons of mash and 40 gallons of moonshine were found on the ranch, the officers reported. The still was one of the most complete ever assembled in this part of the state, they said. The prisoners were taken to Madras.

POLICE MISTAKEN FOR HOLDUP MEN

Logger Goes To Aid of Friend Being Placed Under Arrest, and Joins Him in The City Jail.

When Tony Pontulonecey, logger, saw Officers Tom Carlson and Willard Houston arresting Stanley Kalkosky, another woods employe, for drunkenness and disorderly conduct he thought they were holdup men, he told Recorder Ross Farnham next morning. He was taken along with Falkosky, lodged in jail over night on a charge of resisting an officer, and allowed to go after a lecture from the recorder.

FOX BUTTE WELL NEARLY FINISHED

Hole Now Down To 795 Foot Level. Will Be Abandoned If Water Is Not Struck Within 80 Feet.

Returning from an inspection of the well being sunk near Fox Butte to open up vast tracts of bunch grass land in the Deschutes National forest, Supervisor H. L. Plumb states that the drill has already gone down 795 feet, and that if water is not struck the hole will be abandoned at 830 feet. He now believes that the flow earlier reported was only a seep.

Drilling has as its object the tapping of the same water table which supplies the Cabin lake well. If this is not done at a depth of 830 feet, the task will be regarded as hopeless.

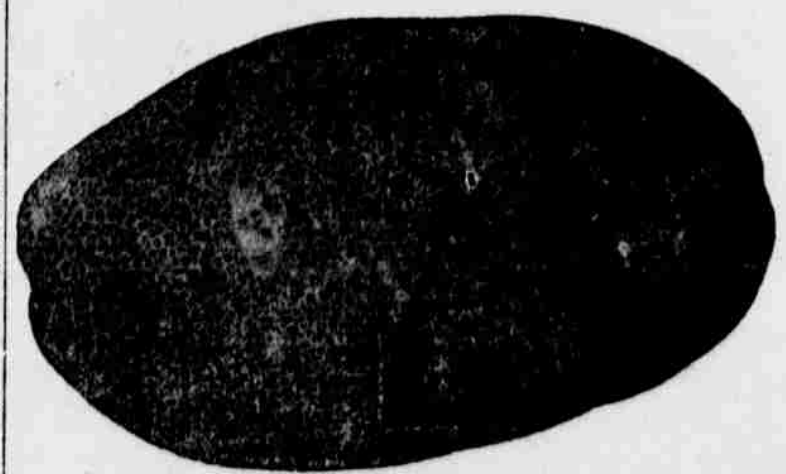
