REDMOND MILLAGE NEARLY DOUBLES

Redmond's millage for city expenses for the coming year is nearly double that on which taxes were collected this year, figures show secured in the office of Assessor August A. Anderson.

The total assessed valuation of property, including \$23,611.86 for public utilities, is \$304,106.86, while the tax levy is for \$10,157.17. This results in a millage of 33.4 as against the 19.1 in effect this year.

Expenditures in connection with the city water bond issue are largely responsible for the increase.

MAY TAP LAKE TO WATER BIG GRAZING AREA

\$25,000 COST, PLUMB ESTIMATES

WELL IS ABANDONED

Dry Hole In Fox Butte Section Left

At Depth of 830 Feet—New Plan

Would Open Rich Grass

Enough For 12,500 Cattle.

With the failure of the Fox Butte forest service well, abandoned as a dry hole at a depth of 830 feet, Supervisor H. L. Plumb will recommend through district headquarters in Portland, the construction of a pipe line from Paulina lake with a feeder system to provide water for livestock on 253,000 acres of the best bunch grass in Central Oregon, now inaccessible because of water lack.

The development would mean an expenditure of \$25,000, the cost of four such wells as that already sunk.

Such a system, opening vast areas of summer range, would permit the grazing of 12,500 head of cattle, more than the entire present allotment of the whole Deschutes National forest.

Some 20 troughs and tanks, scattered over the immense tract, would be placed so as to leave no part of the area without a water supply. Gravity would bring the water from the lake.

In addition to its function in doubling the grazing area available on the Deschutes National forest, the carrying out of Plumb's plan would prove of great advantage in the operations of fire fighters, he believes.
