LARGEST KNOWN FOSSIL BONE

Discovery Made in Northern New Mexico Is Interesting for More Than One Reason.

The largest shoulder blade of any animal on record, ancient or modern, has been discovered in San Juan basin in northern New Mexico by John B. Reeside, Jr., of the United States geological survey. This scapula bone is part of an immense extinct dinosaur estimated to be over one hundred feet long and markedly larger than any previously known to have existed.

Charles E. Gilmore of the National museum in Washington has assembled the collection of pieces of this fossil scapula and has found that the total length of the bone is more than five feet, nearly as tall as a man. This is five times the length of the shoulder blade of a cow of today.

The large fossil was found in the part of the earth that was deposited and formed in the Upper Cretaceous era, and this indicates to the geologist that the dinosaurs lived at a later geologic time than they had previously supposed. This fact has created more stir in geological circles than the size of the fossil.

Dinosaurs were large reptiles with long necks, little heads and brains, and long tails. Their bodies look somewhat like that of an oversized elephant with hind legs longer than fore legs. They dominated the earth in the days when the limestone beds were laid, but for some reason disappeared from the earth to give place to smaller and livelier animals.

Got a "Winter" Mark.

GASOLINE TAX BILL IS BY IN STATE SENATE

SALEM, Dec. 24.—The senate just before 1 o'clock today failed to pass the financial amendment to constitution, authorizing a state gasoline tax for financing the Portland world's fair. The final vote 15 to 14, the same division which had marked the senate fight since last night.

Exceptions were taken to an appeal from the usual announcement of failure, but failed by the same vote.

Ritner Overruled

The vote favoring passage 15 to 14, is one vote short of the majority necessary to pass or defeat the constitutional amendment. Due to the death of Senator Hume, the senate membership is now only 29. Following the defeat of the resolution, President Ritner ruled the bill had failed because of lack of a constitutional majority. This ruling was overturned, and the resolution sent to the house as amended.

The Fletcher bill, companion measure to the financing amendment, also passed and was sent to the house. The house may take the same view as President Ritner, that the bill failed of a constitutional majority in the senate, declaring it therefore not before the lower chamber, thus killing the bill, or it may pass its own bill as amended by the senate.

Courts May Decide

Certain senators said whether or not the amendment was passed in the senate might be for the courts to decide.

The house for the time being controls the fate of the Portland fair. Senator Moser, immediately after the vote on the fair, 15 to 14, was announced, appealed from the usual announcement that the bill had failed, holding that 15 votes, due to the vacancy, was a majority and that the bill had passed. By overthrowing President Ritner's ruling, the senate also held this view. Moser's exception and appeal may result in the house passing the bill as amended, even though Ritner had based his ruling on an opinion by the attorney general.

The Oregon state senate was still deadlocked when its session was resumed here today. Rumor had it that fair proponents had succeeded in corraling the one vote necessary to put their measure through. There

It was authentically learned today. Both Judge Duffy and the witnesses had apparently been sworn to secrecy.

Bride and groom are of equal age, 66 years, and Mrs. Pettigrew is a great grandmother, while her husband is a grandfather.

There was nothing in the early part of the session to indicate this.

The deadlock continued far into last night, fair backers finally achieving an adjournment until 10 o'clock today which was considered a partial victory.

Eastes' office on Oregon street, when Eastes distributed sacks of candy, but none of them enjoyed the occasion so much as the ex-mayor. Eastes says some of the 400 might have been repeaters, but he made no effort to check up on that at the time. At any rate, traffic on that side of the street was effectively blocked for more than an hour.

One hundred pounds of candy was distributed.

LOAN APPLICATION RETURNED APPROVED

GRANDMOTHER HERE LEARNS OF TRAGEDY

Mrs. Margaret Greenwood Relative of Two Children Burned to Death in Centalla—Details Lacking.

Word of the death of her grandchildren, Donald Dawson, aged 20 months, and Ruth Dawson, aged 3 years, who were burned to death Thursday morning in their home at Centalla, was received here last Thursday by Mrs. Margaret Greenwood, whose home is at 408 Broadway. She had visited with her daughter's family early this fall in Centalla.

The wire received by Mrs. Greenwood from J. Agnew, owner of the mine in which her son-in-law, Jack Dawson, is employed, gave no details of the accident. Press dispatches were to the effect that the mother and father were badly burned in attempts to rescue the children. A younger child was removed from a room which was on fire, and three older ones also escaped. Dawson had lighted a fire in the kitchen stove and had returned to his bed, which was in a tent nearby. This, says Mrs. Greenwood, was his usual custom.

Mrs. Greenwood came to Bend several months ago with her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Eutha Greenwood, whose husband died in service during the war, and who came here from Albany for her health.

The three grade schools and the junior high took part in the contest, selling in all \$75 worth of seals.
