

RENTAL BASIS RECOMMENDED FOR BUILDING

ATHLETIC CLUB MAY
CEASE TO EXIST

QUESTION IS STUDIED

Use of American Legion Building As
Community Hall And For All
School Activities Not To Be Af-
fected In Proposed Change.

Recommendation that the athletic activities of the B. A. A. C. be discontinued and the American Legion building be operated on a fee and rental basis was made to the Legion executive committee Friday by a joint committee of the Commercial club, the Woman's Civic league and the Legion, following discussion of the question at a noon luncheon.

Following a statement of the various angles of the question by Legion committee members, showing the expenses and receipts during the past six months in the various departments of the building's use, sentiment expressed by each person present showed that a majority were of the opinion that the athletic feature it not in sufficient demand in Bend to justify the expense necessary to its maintenance.

Returns Are Few
Returns from the questionnaires sent out Sunday by the Legion committee were: favoring the retention of the athletic department, 41; opposed, 12. Several of the replies favoring the club's continuance were from present members.

The recommendation of the committee was as follows:

"Every member of each committee representing the Woman's Civic league, the Commercial club and the American Legion would like to see the building kept open as it is, but not one from any of the committees is prepared to express an opinion that a campaign to secure 450 members could be put over, this being the least number which the Legion could consider.

"Because of that condition, it is the unanimous opinion of this committee that the community should be satisfied with the best program that the Legion can take care of, which we consider to be the fee system which is to be worked out by the Legion executive committee."

School Use Unaffected
The fee system can be made such that the use of the building for the schools, which the committee considered its most essential athletic use, will not be hampered, the committee pointed out.

In the mean time, Tonkin will endeavor to ascertain whether or not there are game birds which might be used in stocking Central Oregon's arid areas to relieve the sage hen from the concentrated attacks of sportsmen.

Tonkin's plans are made known in a letter received here in which he displays a keen interest in the movement started last season to prevent the extermination of Central Oregon's chief game bird.

MUSIC LOVERS GIVEN TREAT

PIPES-CAMPBELL CONCERT GIV-
EN UNDER CIVIC LEAGUE AUS-
PICES HOPE TO BE FIRST
OF SERIES.

Music lovers of Bend were afforded a rare treat Friday in the joint recital given under the auspices of the Civic league by Mrs. Susie Fennell Pipes, violinist and David Campbell of Portland. Both artists are connected with the Ellison-White conservatory of music. Mrs. Pipes heading the violin department and Mr. Campbell being director and head of the work in piano. The large audience listened with rapt attention to the numbers, and expressed hearty appreciation by spontaneous applause after each group. Both the performers expressed themselves as highly gratified at the cordial reception extended them, and at the appreciation of their musical offering.

Friday night's concert was the first attempt in Bend to bring musical attractions of a high character to the city. In the belief that a community can have no greater cultural asset than a music loving population, those who were instrumental in bringing Mrs. Pipes and Mr. Campbell to Bend hope to make this concert an entering wedge in a movement to give the people of Bend further opportunity to cultivate a taste for the best in music. The success of the entertainment is considered as demonstrating the feasibility of bringing to Bend high class musical attractions.

The program offered was varied and interesting. In the opening number a suite by Schutt, the two instruments have equal prominence and the exchange of the melodies from one to another was given with fine sense of balance and ensemble. In the piano group which followed the melody of a lullaby of Brahms was delivered with beautiful tone, quality and tenderness, and the Butterflies of Rosenthal was marked by remarkable vivacity, delicate brilliance and speed. Showing Mr. Campbell's unusual technical mastery to advantage.

The heaviest of the violin numbers was the Concerto of Vieuxtemps. In Mrs. Pipes brought out the exquisite quality of her rare Amati violin, drawing a tone now big and vibrant and again delicate and soft as a breath. The Rondo is in the nature of a display number and, calls all the resources of the violinist's technique into play. The difficult bowings, the treacherous harmonics, and big double note passages, were all met with ease and did not obscure the lovely telling theme with its entrancing rhythm. As an encore the ever popular Liebesfreud of Kreisler was given.

The remainder of the program was made up of smaller numbers. Mr. Campbell played a pleasing group by Chopin, responding to an encore. Of Mrs. Pipes' last numbers the wistful, muted lullaby of Cyril Scott, and the impassioned Souvenir Poetique of Fichet, repeated as last encore deserve special mention. As encore, Mrs. Pipes played "Drink to Me Only With Thine Eyes," as especially arranged for her by Miss Pauline Alderman, instructor in composition of the Ellison-White conservatory of music. The clever use of double stops in the arrangement has the effect of two voices singing and adds much to the appeal of the beautiful, familiar melody. In the smaller numbers Mrs. Pipes won the hearts of her audience as she had their admiration in the earlier part of the evening.

Mr. Campbell proved to be throughout an able and sympathetic accompanist, an ability not always met with in successful piano soloists.

After the program an informal reception was held at which opportunity was afforded to meet and become acquainted with the musicians.

BEND MAN FORMERLY "SPARKS" ON CROOK

C. G. Seward Radio Operator On
Transport In 1915—Unseaworthy
Quality of Vessel Recalled.

News accounts of the fight against storm and wave made last week by the U. S. transport, Crooke, have been followed with keen interest by C. G. Seward, of Bend, formerly radio operator on the transport. Seward recalled that in 1915 when he was assigned to the Crooke, the vessel had a bad reputation for rolling, and that a partially successful attempt to counteract this tendency had been made by the construction of bulkheads above the water line.

The Crooke was a German built boat, he said.

SCHOOL HEADS ENDORSE PLAN

COUNTY UNIT SYSTEM TO BE
INITIATED IN SEVERAL PARTS
OF OREGON SOON—THOMPSON
TELLS OF CONVENTION.

Endorsement of the county unit plan, which places country schools under one board of directors for the county with one superintendent in direct charge of administration, featured the convention of county superintendents at Salem this week, says J. Alton Thompson, who returned last week from the convention at Salem. Several counties are expected to initiate the plan soon.

Advantages of the new plan, made possible by the 1921 legislature, are the economy of quantity purchasing for entire county, and the possibility of transferring teachers so as to better make use of their qualifications, and the unit plan of taxation, said Thompson. This plan does not apply to districts of the first class, which will not be taxed for the support of other schools in the county.

The plan of consolidating schools was also favored, said Thompson, but he stated that in his opinion it is not feasible in Deschutes county, for the reason that transportation involving a ride of more than 45 minutes in duration is too serious a problem. The plan is ideal in the Willamette valley, where by a shorter ride the graded school system may be used.

Granting of permits to teachers not properly qualified was frowned upon by the convention, and stricter adherence to the law in this respect was decided upon. It was also decided that essentials should be given more attention, rather than classroom activities not required by the text books.

CHURCH TO BE FINISHED SOON

COMPLETION BEFORE END OF
SUMMER PREDICTED BY REV.
PURDY—WILL SELL WELL SE-
CURED BONDS TO FINANCE.

Completion of the Methodist church building by late in the coming summer was predicted by Rev. J. Edgar Purdy Sunday in announcements made at morning and evening services. The money necessary above the amount of \$11,000 present resources, which the trustees are confident can be liquidated this spring, will be raised by selling bonds in the amount of \$10,000, secured by a Portland surety company.

These bonds will be issued in large and small amounts, and the present plan is to sell them all locally. Further details, together with announcement of the opening date for sale of the bonds, are expected this week. This plan was agreed to by the trustees of the church in a meeting Friday night.

The amount of \$21,000 will be sufficient, says Rev. Purdy, to finish the church inside and out, including the brick veneer wall which is to cover the present wooden structure.

CONTINUED STRENGTH IS SEEN IN LUMBER MARKET OF AMERICA

The lumber market continues to exhibit strength, with the greatest activity shown in Douglas fir from the Pacific coast. Fir logs are scarce and high in price and manufacturers are having difficulty in securing sufficient quantities to produce the lumber needed to take care of orders booked. Consequently, buyers are working hard to place orders for fir and price advances have been well sustained. In the southern pine region orders are considered satisfactory for this season and the market is firm but not as strong as the fir market. Prices generally, according to the American Lumberman, are firm and the tendency is to advance them.

"In fact," says the Lumberman, "substantially advanced price lists have been issued by a number of manufacturers and while they have not been 'seasoned' by a large volume of purchases, these advances have not slowed up buying, which continues

good. Therefore, it seems reasonable to conclude that, considering the supplies of lumber available for sale, the price advances are fully justified.

"According to figures gathered by the National Lumber Manufacturers' association, orders for 1921 exceeded production by 4 per cent and shipments exceeded production by 1 per cent. This, of course, varied in different sections. For example, in the territory where California white pine and sugar pine are cut, orders were booked for 33 per cent more lumber than was produced, while in the redwood manufacturing district orders were booked for only 74 per cent of the lumber produced. In two major softwood producing regions, namely, southern pine and Douglas fir, the record of orders, shipments and production tally almost exactly for the totals of the entire country. In view of these facts no immediate change in the trend of the lumber market is expected and the belief is general that higher prices will result."
