PROTECTIVE DIVISION STATUS UNSETTLED

OIL PERMIT OPPOSED

Property Owners To Circulate Petition Against Union Oil Co.—City To Save By Putting The Police Headquarters In Firehouse.

While nothing will be done in the way of trimming city expenses through the reduction of the salaries of police or fire department employes, the fact remains that economies are still contemplated which will affect the woman's protective division, with a possible cut in the salary of the city engineer.

An ordinance introduced on the request of the Union Oil Co. of California, to permit the construction and operation of a warehouse and tankage system just south of the railroad spur on Wall street, for the storing, sale, and distribution of petroleum and its products, was read for the first time, but is by no means sure of passage.

Mill Possibility Pointed Councilman Gilbert pointed out that should rumors of mill construction north of the city become a reality, the business section of the city

would extend in that direction until it touches the oil company's desired location. Fire Chief Carlon added that it is common practice in many cities to exclude oil tankage systems from the city limits as a fire hazard.

December was added to the months during which, according to the city laws, public buildings must be adequately heated. An amending ordinance correcting an error by which December had been omitted from this list, was read for the final time, and carried without opposition.

Police Offices Moved A saving of \$30 a month, which the city has been paying in rent for office rooms used as headquarters for the police department was effected when a unanimous vote ordered that headquarters be moved to the firehouse.

1921 PEACE DOLLAR ARRIVES IN BEND

Coin Bears Designer's Monogram—Goddess' Head Modeled In Likeness of Sculptor's Wife.

The first 1921 "peace dollar" to reach Bend as far as is known, arrived Sunday morning in the trousers pocket of Frank R. Prince, at the same time that Prince landed in Bend from a trip to Minneapolis.

On one side of the coin, that bearing the eagle, is the inscription, "United States of America, E Pluribus Unum," with the single word "Peace" below the representation of the national bird.

On the coin secured by Prince, the designer's monogram appears just beneath the head of Liberty, which, it is said, was modeled in the likeness of the sculptor's wife.
