CLOUDS DOMINATE FEBRUARY WEATHER

Only Seven Clear Days Recorded For Month—Precipitation Heavy—Three Below Is Minimum.

With 14 cloudy days and seven partly cloudy, February will probably stand through 1922 as the cloudiest month of the year. The ratio of clear and cloudy or partly cloudy days in Central Oregon is ordinarily just reversed. The month was an unusually wet one, official records show. Fifteen inches of snow fell, and this with some which melted as it fell, or which was precipitated in the form of rain, brought the water equivalent for the 28 days to 2.54 inches. The coldest weather of the month was that recorded in the early morning of February 28, when the

mercury dropped to three below zero. On the same date the greatest daily range of temperature, 41 degrees, was noted. Fifty-seven degrees above zero was the warmest day, coming on February 6.

READING GAME LAWS ORDERED BY COURT

\$25 Fine Levied Against Taxidermist For Offering Mounted Brant For Sale Is Suspended.

E. N. Mallory, local taxidermist, must read the Oregon game laws through twice as the penalty for violation of the section which forbids the offering for sale of the plumage or carcass of a protected bird. This was the ruling of County Judge Sawyer Monday when Mallory, apprehended by District Game Warden C. A. Adams, appeared for trial and entered a plea of guilty. Mallory's fine was \$25, but this was suspended.

ORDER POSTPONES GRAZING PAYMENTS

Necessity for the payment of 1922 grazing fees by stockmen 30 days before the opening of the season no longer exists. The secretary of agriculture, according to word received Monday morning by Supervisor H. L. Plumb of the Deschutes National forest, will allow payment in two installments, the first to be made on or before the date that stock enter the forest, the second to be made on or before December 1 of the present year. No interest will be charged on deferred payments.

SISTERS DISTRICT WILL SELL BONDS

Disposal of \$25,000 worth of its bonds is sought by the Squaw Creek Irrigation district which has called for bids which will be opened by the directors at Sisters, Tuesday afternoon, April 4. Funds derived from the bond sale will be used in the general development of the system.
