## EARLY RESIDENT OF BEND DIES

**FRED C. FISH, FORMER MANAGER OF OLD PILOT BUTTE INN, IS VICTIM OF PNEUMONIA—FUNERAL TUESDAY.**

Fred C. Fish, manager of the old Pilot Butte Inn years ago and more recently a member of the Deschutes Garage company, died Sunday morning at his home, 508 Ogden, of pneumonia. He was 51 years of age, a native of Illinois. He came to Bend in 1910 from Salem, where he had been manager of the Marion hotel. At a later time he was a sawyer for the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Co.

Funeral services were in charge of the Bend Lodge of Elks, of which Fish was chaplain, and were held at 2 o'clock. Rev. J. Edgar Purdy preached the funeral sermon.

Fred C. Fish came to Oregon with his parents at the age of 18 years, and settled with them near Eugene. He had a wide acquaintance in the Willamette valley. He became a member of the Elks lodge in Salem, and was transferred to the lodge here as a charter member.

His mother died a year ago last fall, in Los Angeles. His father has been dead for several years. So far as it is known the only surviving relatives are his wife and one son, Edwin.

Pallbearers were M. P. Cashman, L. G. McReynolds, J. Edward Larson, W. L. O'Donnell, T. H. Foley, and J. H. Haner, with T. E. J. Duffy, E. L. Payne, S. E. Roberts, N. G. Jacobson, J. Charles Smith, and E. J. Catlow as honorary pallbearers. Thomas Edward Lyons, Dr. W. J. Manning, H. L. Plumb and Charles Saylor were the ushers during the services.
