Roland Johnson was called to Portland Tuesday where his grandmother was not expected to live. He returned Thursday in time for the high school play.

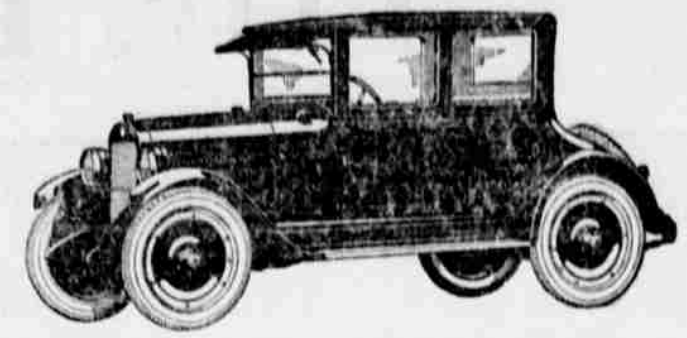
