104 FAMILIES ARE SERVED BY A. R. C.

Eight New Ex-Service And Five New Civilian Cases Handled—Shop Sales Total \$80.55.

The report of the Red Cross Home Service section for March shows that 104 families were served, including 5 new civilian cases, 8 new cases of ex-service men, four of them in connection with vocational training; 84 ex-service and 20 civilian cases in all. The Red Cross shop turned over \$50 to the Home Service office to be used in its work, total sales of the shop for the month amounting to \$80.55.
