Miss Naomi Hoskins went to Redmond last night to spend the week end with her family.

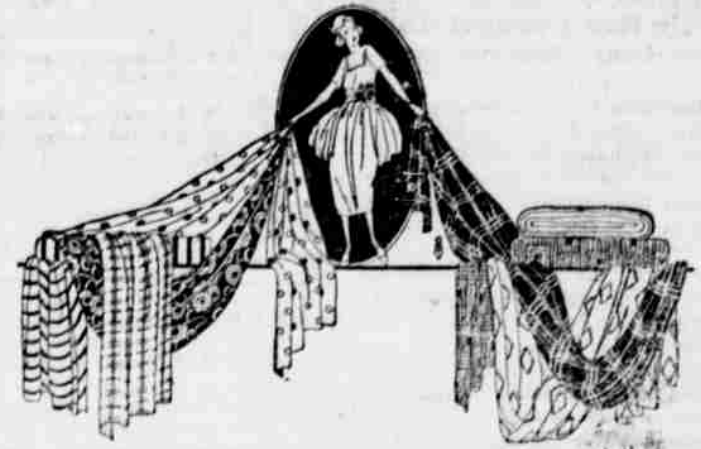

"Nothing But The Truth," chosen as the annual class play of the junior class at the Redmond high school, will be presented at the Redmond gymnasium tonight.

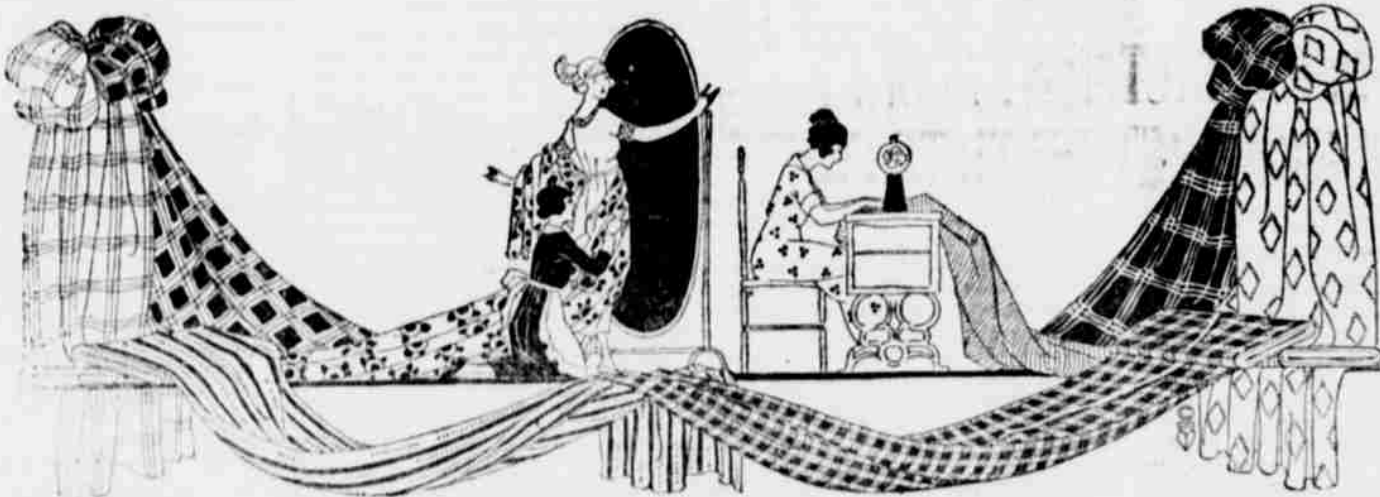
A dance under the auspices of Percy A. Stevens Post will be held at the American Legion building Saturday night. The Saxophone orchestra will furnish music.
