SINNOTT OPPONENT CAMPAIGNING HERE

On the last lap of a five weeks tour of the eastern part of the state, in which he has covered more than 3,000 miles, James H. Gwinn, seeking the republican nomination for congressman from this district, was in Bend Saturday, accompanied by H. Wagner of Pendleton. Gwinn predicts that he will carry a considerable majority of the counties in his district, but was doubtful as to the results to be expected in Central Oregon, which he considers a Sinnott stronghold.

Gwinn is basing his campaign on reclamation needs, contending that Oregon has not had her share of moneys expended for this purpose.
