Clark, Tumalo rancher, to import Japanese labor, Clark stated after his offer to pay the fines of prisoners now serving time. FREIGHT SERVICE TO KIRK TO BE STARTED

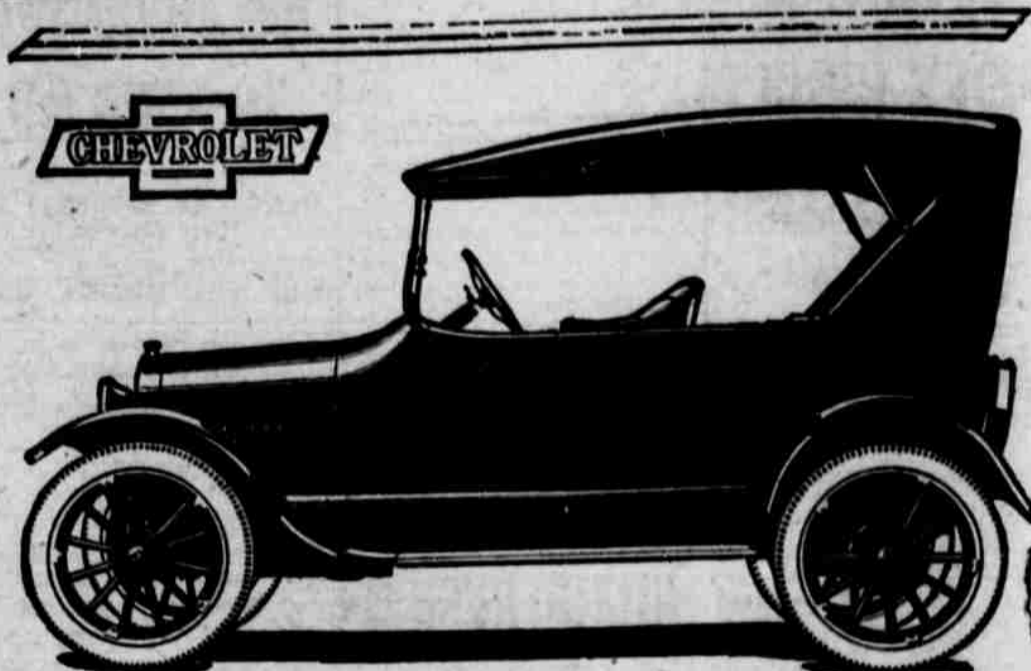
