

CITY HOLIDAY TO ALLOW FOR CAMP CLEANUP

Mayor's Proclamation To
Be Issued Soon

PURCHASE IS ORDERED

Council Votes To Make \$500 Pay-
ment—Merchants' Association
Plans For Auto Park De-
velopment Accepted.

A proclamation by Mayor E. D. Gilson announcing a city holiday will be the next step in the development of Bend's auto camp ground, it was decided Friday by the city council, after a vote to purchase the Bend Company's site near the county bridge for \$3500, with a \$500 payment down, had been taken. The holiday will be declared to furnish an opportunity for volunteer workers to clean up the camp, gravel drive-ways and in general put the place in shape for use in the immediate future. C. J. Leverett, as chairman of the public property committee, is in charge of all work, and will report to the mayor as to what day can be used to the best advantage.

Work Begins Monday

Grades will be surveyed, and lots staked out, according to plans furnished by a committee of the Merchants' association which appeared before the council, this part of the work starting Monday. The committee, composed of Carl A. Johnson, H. J. Power, J. O. Gibson, L. Antles, F. Inabnit, submitted ground plans to the council, including the location of camp stoves, tables, and necessary buildings. For the time being a fee of 50 cents a day will be charged for each car, and a caretaker will assign a separate lot to each car registering. Harry Cleveland was named temporarily for this office.

Complaints by Chairman N. H. Gilbert of the police committee that stock are not being fed sufficiently at the city pound and that unsanitary conditions prevail, were discussed at some length and finally referred back to Gilbert's committee with power to act.

Wind Cave Discovered In Arnold District, Reports L. D. Wiest

Discovery of a "wind cave" on the John White ranch in the Arnold district was reported today by L. D. Wiest, engineer for the Arnold Ditch Co. The cave was discovered when the ditch crew blasted out a spillway for the north lateral of the Arnold canal. The wind was blowing out of the cave at the time, says Wiest. The entire flow of the lateral was emptied into the cave for 12 hours without filling it, he said. This is the fourth cave of the kind to be discovered in the vicinity of Bend, he stated, but is the nearest to the city.

START SOON ON NEW BUILDING

American Railway Express
Co. To Erect Office Near
Passenger Station.

Construction of the new American Railway Express building south of the Oregon Trunk passenger station will begin early next week, it was stated this morning by C. G. Bertrand, local manager for the express company, following the visit here yesterday of James H. Humphries, engineer who has charge of the plans. The contractor, probably a local man, will be announced in a few days.

The building will be of stucco, and will be built to conform to the general plan of the passenger station. The cost will be in the neighborhood of \$5,000. The building will be 60 feet long by 30 wide, separated from the station by a concrete platform 60 feet long and 10 feet wide.

The building will be in three rooms, and will have a concrete floor throughout. It will be built and operated by the express company, and will continue under Bertrand's management.

LET ALL CONTRACTS FOR NEW BUILDING

Contracts for the construction of the new Methodist church have all been let, it was said Monday by Rev. J. Edgar Purdy, pastor, and completion by July 25 is probable. The outside finishing is to be of pressed brick furnished by the Bend Brick Co., the contract having been let to E. A. Frieberg. Stucco work will be done by Axel Olson, sheet metal work by William Montgomery, and the carpenter work by the day under the supervision of Frank Sutherland. August 13 has been set as the date for dedication of the new church building.

SILVER LAKE DAM NEARLY COMPLETE

Reservoir Proves Ability To Hold
Water—Contractors Prepare
To Turn Over System.

SILVER LAKE, May 27.—With work on the Silver Lake irrigation project reservoir dam virtually finished, costs are being figured by contractors preliminary to turning over the completed system to the district.

The reservoir and dam are holding water in fine shape and the supply will be more than sufficient for the ground that will be irrigated this year. It is estimated that the diversion dam will be finished within two weeks. The flumes are now being built, the one east of the Gowdy ranch being practically finished. The main flume which runs from the dam out to the mouth of the canyon is yet to be built, but the lumber is

ready and when once the workmen get at it, this piece of work will be completed within a short time.

PAROLE REFUSED FOR GUS NELSON

That the governor's office has refused to parole Gus Nelson, Bend man now serving time in the penitentiary following conviction two years ago on a statutory crime, was learned by Antone Ahlstrom, Pleasant Valley farmer, who has been working for Nelson's release. Ahlstrom's information came from the Portland office of the Swedish consul, Nelson being still a subject of Sweden.

Nelson's parole was recommended by both Sheriff S. E. Roberts and District Attorney A. J. Moore.
