VOTERS ADVISED TO CHECK REGISTRATION

Many Incorrectly Listed Due to Re-arrangement of Precincts, Says County Clerk

Registration for the fall election by any voters who have the least doubt as to the precinct in which they belong, following the recent re-districting of the city, was advised yesterday by County Clerk J. H. Haner.

"Owing to the fact that few of the registered voters have indicated the correct street and number in giving their residence, it has been impossible for the clerk's office to assign registration cards to the precincts as arranged in 1922," said Haner. "It is advisable, therefore, that voters investigate promptly whether they are properly registered for the November elections."

Registration may be made now, Haner said.

JAIL CAPACITY IS INADEQUATE

13 Are Charged with Week End Offenses—5 Fined, Four Will Fight.

Bend's jail proved entirely inadequate to the demands of Saturday night's epidemic of offenses, and the county jail was opened to a number of city prisoners. All but one had appeared in police court 'y 3 o'clock on Monday, or had forfeited bail. Gene Rose, charged with having liquor in his possession, and Ernie Gile, Cecil Sumner, and "Smoky" Moore, charged with disorderly conduct, pleaded not guilty and will fight the charges. Due to the number of cases, time of trial has not been definitely set. All are at liberty on bail.

T. Sheffold and J. C. Kaubbe forfeited bail of \$25 each, and Charles Brown forfeited \$50 bail, all being charged with disorderly conduct.

Following were charged with disorderly conduct, pleaded guilty and were fined: G. Christy, \$20; J. Hohnstein, \$20; Melvin Crane, \$20; Joe Dalley, \$20. C. A. Penney, charged with having liquor in his possession, pleaded guilty and was fined \$100. Ralph Webb, charged with disorderly conduct, was set to appear in court.

Four cases of chicken pox are quarantined in Bend, reports City Health Officer C. A. Fowler. The fact that the homes quarantined are widely scattered throughout the city indicates that the disease has a tendency to spread, and should be guarded against.

SEEK TO KEEP WESTON HERE

Allegedly Debatable Objections In Murder Trial Are Pointed Out.

Allegedly debatable objections of the defense in the trial of A. J. Weston for murder of Robert H. Krug, in which Weston was found guilty and sentenced to life imprisonment in the Oregon state penitentiary, were pointed out in circuit court yesterday by Earl Bernard, defense attorney, the object being to allow Weston to remain in the county jail until his appeal has been passed on by the circuit court.

The admission of the entire confession of George Stillwell, which Bernard declared contained matters prejudicial to the defense, which were not mentioned in the testimony and could not have been admitted, was particularly mentioned by Bernard. He also pointed out what he declared to be errors in Judge Duffy's instructions to the jury.

A complete transcript of the testimony of the case was asked by the defense, in order that it might present a complete bill of exceptions to the supreme court.

APPLICATION TIME EXTENDED BY RULING

Oregon ex-servicemen will have until June 21 to file their original applications for the cash or loan bonus, according to a recent ruling of Attorney General I. W. Winickie. The date on which applications had to be in was previously announced for today, May 25. The number of applications turned in from the state at large is now \$5,000.
