An inch of rain in 22 hours was the heavy precipitation recorded for Bend at 8 o'clock Friday morning after a continuous downpour which would have done credit to the Willamette valley. Rain continued most of the day, 25 of an inch having been added by 3 o'clock in the afternoon. Previous

precipitation since January 1 totaled 8.52 inches.

The general nature of the rain in Central Oregon is greatly brightening prospects for abundant grass on the range, and is expected to insure a good crop in the dry farming sections. It has greatly lessened the labors of early irrigation.

BETTER SERVICE ON TUMALO MAIL ASKED

Change of Star Route And Daily R. F. D. Delivery Purpose of Petitions.
