TAYLOR EARNS FIGHT AWARD

Shows to Advantage Over Valentine—Knorr Has Horseshoe Draw.

Allie Taylor earned the decision of Referee Willard Houston by a safe margin over Jimmy Valentine of Portland in the main event of the Fourth of July smoker held at the gymnasium. The fight failed to draw as large a crowd as the merit of the last two bouts should have warranted.

Taylor showed a decided improvement in form and aggressiveness over that displayed in his previous encounter with the Portland lad, and with the exception of the first, second, ninth and tenth rounds had the advantage in hitting, blocking, and the facility with which he had Valentine, ordinarily machine like in his precision, missing. Of the four rounds, the last should be classed as a draw, the others going to Valentine.

Jimmy Draws First Blood

The fighters boxed in the two opening rounds, real action starting in the third when Taylor led to the head and stopped two rights with his face. He shifted his tactics, playing for the body, and had a slight advantage when the gong sounded. Valentine found Taylor's nose in the fourth, and from then until the end of the battle, both fighters were more or less painted with the Bend bantam's blood.

Before the fight was half over, Valentine had found Taylor's damaged ear and persistently pecked away with right jolts in the clinches until a first class cauliflower, of dark blue hue, had developed. This apparently worried the Bend boy but little, however, and he continued to do his worst damage with rights to the wind, getting through Valentine's guard repeatedly, and landing with particularly telling effect toward the end of the eighth.

Valentine's best round was the ninth, when he outboxed and outbit Taylor, and dropped him for an instant with a left to the head.

Rose Forfeits Fight

Johnny Trambitas of Portland, fighting Duffy Knorr in the semi-windup, went six rounds against the Terrebonne lad, and had the better of it until the referee declared a draw. With the exception of the third round, a draw, Trambitas had the edge throughout.

Frenchie Le Clair and Gene Rose started to put on a love feast as the curtain raiser, stalled through the first round and had inflicted no damage whatever in the first minute and 15 seconds of the second spasm, ex-

cept for hurting the feelings of the fans, when Rose became annoyed at the referee. He left the ring, forfeiting to Le Clair.
