CONFESSES THEFT TO SAVE W. B. SHEPARD

Wilbur Fisk Admits Taking Auto Parts, and Head of Family Is Allowed Freedom.

Because W. B. Shepard, arrested Friday night with his brother, R. P. Shepard on a charge of stealing auto parts, has a wife and baby dependent on him, Wilbur Fisk, who accompanied the two last Sunday night when they stripped three cars, Saturday offered himself as a substitute for the married man, signing a confession admitting the thefts. Fisk and R. P. Shepard, who signed a similar confession, were held to the grand jury under \$1,000 bond each, while the case of the man for whom Fisk is willing to make vicarious atonement was postponed indefinitely. Authorities had virtually no evidence against Fisk aside from the fact that he was with the Shepards.

In stripping one of the cars, the thieves used the end gate of their own truck as a base for their jack, then forgot to replace this. It was found by Officer Tom Carlson and was the sole clue in fixing responsibility for the thefts. After a week's search, Carlson found a truck with an open end which the board he had picked up just fitted. The arrests followed, and in the Shepard home were found several hundred dollars' worth of purloined auto parts.

PERMITS REQUIRED FOR TRASH FIRES

Permits to build trash fires will still be required in Bend, was the statement of Fire Chief Tom Carlson Thursday. Because of recent heavy rains it is now considered safe to issue permits, which were denied for several weeks during dry weather.

COMPANIONSHIP LACK CAUSE OF INSANITY

Woman Wanders In Fields Without Clothing—Puts Money In Oven—Committed To Pendleton.

Wandering in the fields near her home, clad only in nature's garb, incessantly praying in Polish, her native tongue, and other unusual actions, reported over a period of weeks, caused Mrs. Welstora Evanov, wife of a rancher living southeast of Bend, to be committed to the Pendleton hospital for the insane, on complaint of County Physician R. W. Hendershott. Lack of companionship, the result of her inability to speak English, was responsible for Mrs. Evanov's derangement, it was believed. Her husband, the only person with whom she could converse, was busy away from home most of the time.

An interpreter went with Dr. Hendershott and others to the Evanov home, but Mrs. Evanov would not talk to him, but continued her ceaseless prayer. A large sum of money was found in the oven, wrapped in a stocking. Evanov explained that his wife had refused to do the house work without pay, and that she had placed part of the money in the oven, burying the remainder.

An attendant sent here from Pendleton took Mrs. Evanov to the asylum Monday.

START REBUILDING CONCRETE FACTORY

Work of rebuilding the Bend Concrete Pipe Co. plant, recently destroyed by fire, began Tuesday. The new plant will be built of corrugated iron, making it more nearly fireproof than the former structure. The company has contracted to deliver a large quantity of sand and gravel to the United Contracting Co. for use in building the diversion dam in the Deschutes river for the Deschutes County Municipal Improvement district.

BEND BOYS COMPETE ON THE RIFLE RANGE

CAMP LEWIS, Wash., Aug. 17.—Students at the citizen's military training camp, among them Darrel Whitaker, Frank Haner, Franklyn Toomey and Ralph Haner of Bend, are keenly competing this week for 12 medals offered by the Military Training Camps association, and for place on the Ninth corps area C. M. T. C. rifle team, which will compete September 2 to 28 with other teams from all parts of the country at Camp Perry, Ohio.

RESUME SCREENING SAND AND GRAVEL

Screening of sand and gravel to supply the local demand has been resumed at the Bend Concrete Pipe Co. plant which was practically destroyed by fire recently. The screening equipment was only partly damaged and has been repaired.

PAMPHLET TO SHOW BEND SCENIC VIEWS

Hunting Season Opens August 20th

Here Is a Copy of The Hunting Season Changes

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the open seasons as defined in Chapter 153 of the General Laws of Oregon, 1921, for hunting, killing and having in possession, the following animals and game birds, respectively, shall be as follows, to-wit:

The open season for Deer throughout the entire State shall be from August 20 to October 31 of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for Chinese Pheasants and Quail in all sections of the State where there is an open season shall be from October 15 to October 31 of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for Grouse or Native Pheasants in all sections of the State where there is an open season shall be from August 20 to September 20 of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for Sage Hens in all sections of the State where there is an open season shall be from July 15 to July 31 of each year, both dates inclusive.

The open season for Prairie Chickens in all sections of the State where there is an open season shall be from October 15 to October 31 of each year, both dates inclusive.

NOTICE IS ALSO HEREBY GIVEN that the changes in the open seasons above specified in no wise affects the bag limits or other regulations provided by law respecting the hunting, killing and having in possession such game animals and game birds.
