

GARAGE RAIDED BY CREDITORS; CARS REMOVED

Voluntary Bankruptcy May Be Entered

PROPERTY ATTACHED

Establishment Open Today, But Employees Carry Away Tires And Parts During Raid.

Creditors and employees of the Bend Motor Service Co. cleaned house at the company's garage on Bond street Friday afternoon, and now, although the establishment is still open for business, it is virtually empty. That the company may go into voluntary bankruptcy was indicated by Dr. J. C. Vandeventer, heavy stockholder in the corporation, who stated that he would strongly favor such a course in order to settle the company's affairs.

Arrangements have already been completed by which Dr. Vandeventer is given the local agency for the Paige and Jewett cars, one of the two main lines handled by the company, according to H. W. Lyon, state sales representative, who was in Bend today. The agency for the Oldsmobile, the company's other chief line, is being turned over to L. E. Seelye, formerly shop foreman for the Pioneer garage.

Neither of the new agents has announced his business location.

Take Office Equipment

Creditors took alarm Friday and, armed with bills of sale and writs of attachment, invaded the garage, removing new and used cars, while employees followed suit and marched out, carrying tires, parts and accessories.

Some of the effects taken were removed with no legal authorization, it was stated by disgruntled ones who came too late, but a list of all property removed was kept, so that all removals of property have been checked.

In a number of cases, cars removed on bills of sale were afterwards attached by Sheriff S. E. Roberts.

PUPILS MUST BE 6 TO ENTER PRIMARY

Entrance Within First 2 Weeks Required On Account Of Number Expected.

In order to enter the primary grade this year, boys and girls must be six years old at the opening of school, and must enter within the first two weeks. Superintendent G. W. Ager announced Monday morning. This rule is made necessary because of the size of the class which will enter, as a result of there being no beginning class last winter. As it is, several additional primary teachers may be necessary; but the fact that the county institute will be held during the first week will allow for adjustments. Ager now is in touch with teachers who will be available if needed. Renting of school room space may be necessary.

The plan to abandon the Highway Acres school has been dropped, as the space is needed and there would be no advantage in bringing the pupils to town and renting a room for them. Miss Eunice Catlow will teach this school again this year.

BRICK COMPANY HAS AN UNUSUAL SEASON

Motorcycle, Sidecar In Somersault; Man And Wife Not Badly Hurt

The accident occurred when they were about half way between Bend and Redmond. They were traveling about 30 miles an hour when the rod holding the sidecar to the motorcycle came loose. The motorcycle and sidecar turned completely over, landing right side up, and the occupants were thrown about 20 feet to the road.

The motorcycle was not damaged and Mr. and Mrs. Gates received only slight bruises.

MAZAMAS PLAN TO SCALE PEAK

Local Members Of Mountain Climbers Will Attempt Jefferson

The Central Oregon Mazamas, accompanied by a number of their friends, will attempt to scale the peak of Mount Jefferson, if weather permits, either next Sunday or Labor day, according to H. C. Ellis.

The party will leave Bend Friday and camp at the foot of the mountain. Ellis states that next to Three Finger Jack, Jefferson is the hardest peak to scale in Oregon because of disintegrated rock and steep ledges. However, with the aid of safety ropes the mountain climbers hope to accomplish the feat.

Horace Sykes of Salem, who led the Mazamas last year when they scaled the South Sister, will probably be in charge of the party. Sykes is connected with the state fire marshal's office and is well known in Bend.

FORMER RESIDENT DIES IN CALIFORNIA

George Woods Was Born In Western Clark County Missouri In 1875; Came To Oregon 1901

George Woods, 47, former resident of Bend, died at his home in Hamilton, Cal., according to a report received by his relatives here Thursday. The cause of death was not given.

Woods was born in western Clark county, Missouri, September 24, 1875, and came to Oregon in 1901. He resided in Bend for about six years and about a year and a half ago moved to Medford and then to Hamilton.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Nora Woods, Hamilton, Cal., his father and mother, Mrs. and Mrs. W. J. Woods; three sisters, Mrs. W. E. Claypool, Mrs. Lester Bryan and Mrs. A. W. Kohfeld, and three brothers, Walter, Robert and O. Woods, all residing in this city.

Two of the brothers, Walter and O. Woods, are now at Hamilton to attend the funeral.

REFORESTATION IS VOLUNTARILY TRIED

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.) SUSANVILLE, Cal., Aug. 25.—Reforestation measures that will mean that the timber resources of Lassen county will never be exhausted are being carried out by the Fruit Growers Supply company here. This company is the only company in California to voluntarily adopt reforestation and pay the cost itself.

R. W. Ayres, forestry engineer, has been employed by the company to carry out the program of conservation. His system consists in leaving the young growth protected by burning the underbrush away from the young trees and leaving from three to eight seed trees on every acre of cut over timber land. The Fruit Growers will carry out this program on 85,000 acres of land in Lassen county.

NEW ATHLETIC COACH ON JOB

Call For Football Men To Be Issued First Week Of Term

Leo H. Cossman, who is to coach athletics at the Bend high school this year, is now checking over the high school's athletic equipment and conferring with Captain Guy Claypool and other letter men in regard to the athletic prospects for the coming season.

Cossman is an ex-University of Oregon track and football man and graduated from the university with the class of 1920. He was on the varsity track squad for two years and played on the freshman football team.

It is the intention of the coach to call out the football men during the first week of school and it is probable that the athletic schedule will be arranged at the teachers' institute, which will be held here some time in September.

Last year Cossman coached the Vale high school athletic teams. He will also be an instructor in the science department.

GOLD IS FOUND IN RIVER BED

But Ancient Prospector Not Enthused—Coffer Dam Is Pumped Dry

Armed with a magnifying glass and a sluicing pan an old prospector invaded the United Contracting company's coffer dam on the Deschutes river Tuesday morning and proceeded to look for "pay dirt."

The old miner found a small quantity of gold, but said that sluicing would not be profitable in that section of the river because of the great number of crevices among the rocks which form the bed of the river there. He also stated that he had found some small particles of platinum.

The water is now completely pumped from the coffer dam and the removal of loose rock and excavating for the base of the dam has begun. Foreman M. J. Danielson states that very little excavating will have to be done, as solid bed rock has already been reached.

As soon as the work is completed on the left side of the river and the dam gates have been installed, work will begin on the right bank of the river, where another coffer dam will be constructed.

The work of constructing the dam is being carried on by the United Contracting company for the Tumalo project at Bend.

Teachers' Assignments Are Announced by Ager; Chute To Head Junior High School

Assignment of teachers for the opening of the Bend schools on Monday, September 11, was completed Thursday by Superintendent G. W. Ager. Unless some of the teachers contracted with resign between now and the opening date, no changes are expected, except that some additional primary teachers may be needed.

Estimates based on last year's enrollments and promotions indicated that without allowing for an increase in Bend's population, which has undoubtedly occurred, 1,420 students must be cared for. There are three rooms at the Kenwood school, and the Murphy building may be utilized.

John L. Chute, a recent graduate of Monmouth normal, has been assigned as junior high school principal. Miss Lois L. Davis has been employed as domestic science teacher, following the school board's decision at its last meeting to conduct that department again this year.

High school—Arthur S. Taylor, principal, mathematics; Helen B. Warnes, Latin and Spanish; Vera Grant, mathematics; Franklin Forrester, history; Claire Collins, commerce, civics; Viva Chandler, commercial; Leo H. Cossman, science, athletics; Naomi Hoskins, English, debate, American history; Chester A. Klink, manual training, mathematics; Harriett P. Umbaugh, English and library; Lois L. Davis, home economics.

DIPPING REQUIRED BY SANITARY BOARD

Between August 15 and November 15, all buck sheep in Deschutes, Crook, Lake, Klamath and Jackson counties must be dipped twice in an officially approved anti-scabies solution under state or federal supervision, provided they belong to three or more owners, according to an order made public by the Oregon state livestock sanitary board. Lesser restrictions govern the buck sheep in other counties.

This order was made because the buck sheep are more difficult to cure than the ewes, and it was thought that while practically all of the ewes have been cured in the past season, the disease might remain with some of the males.

Auto Dealers' Association Aid To Be Sought For Project

Aid of the Automobile Dealers' association of Portland in an effort to keep the McKenzie pass open throughout the winter will be sought by Ralph J. Staehli, secretary of the organization, according to a statement made by Staehli before leaving for Portland Saturday night.

The McKenzie pass, the most direct route between the Willamette valley and Central Oregon, is closed every winter, snow blocking the road from early in November until late in June because of the great amount of snowfall.

Up to the present time nothing has been done in regard to keeping the pass open during the winter. A year ago, government engineers considered a system of snow sheds for this purpose, but no further action was taken.

Should this project be taken in hand, a great amount of labor and money will have to be invested to make the undertaking a success.
