Burning Peat Bog Resists Efforts of Fire Fighters, Dynamite Tried; General Situation Bad, Says Plumb

When campers in a meadow above Pringle falls built their camp fire several days ago, they failed to take into consideration that the ground underneath is a layer of peat extending over many acres and several feet thick. The result is a ground fire which has spread over three acres, burning deep, and almost impossible to extinguish, states H. L. Plumb, supervisor of the Deschutes national forest.

Fire fighters have finally been forced to adopt heroic measures; and are now engaged in blasting with dynamite a trench around the

The fire situation is at its most critical stage, Plumb believes. Recent frosts have killed much green vegetation, and this with the long dry spell has resulted in the wood being unusually inflamable.
