## Merchant Is Choice of Club Directors

### MILLER IS TREASURER

**J. P. Hennessy Elected Vice President—Club's Condition Investigated to Determine as to Maintenance for Year**

## DRIVER OF RUNAWAY HORSES IS INJURED

**Frank Eitelgeorge Hurled From Wagon When Telephone Pole Near River Is Struck**

Thrown from his wagon when the vehicle, drawn by a runaway team, struck a telephone pole, Frank Eitelgeorge, Miller Lumber Co. teamster, sustained a badly wrenched back Tuesday morning and is now confined to his home.

The team started to run while crossing the Tumalo avenue bridge. Eitelgeorge was unable to hold the slippery lines, and the team headed around the corner to the left after crossing to the west side of the river. The horses separated as they neared the pole. Their harness broke as the wagon encountered the obstacle, and a few minutes later they were caught and returned to their stable.

## TAYLOR KNOCKS OUT OPPONENT

**Martin Bests Knorr, But Loses on Foul—Montgomery-Manfredi Draw**

It took Albe Taylor only three rounds to demonstrate that the clever punches which he seems able to deliver from almost any position, and always without any warning, also have in them the knockout possibilities. After driving Jerry Terry, his opponent in the main event on the Christmas card, around the ring from the opening of the match, and outpointing him in every skirmish, Taylor hammered the New Orleans scrapper against the ropes in the third round until he dropped to the floor helpless. Blows to the head put him out.

Terry demonstrated that he is a clever boxer and willing to mix, but the combination of Taylor's cleverness and a weight handicap of eight pounds made him no match for the local bantam.

Guy Martin fouled Duffy Knorr in the third round of their match, hitting low, but Martin had the edge up to that time and was evidently in much better condition than the Redmond fighter. The fans agreed that the foul was unintentional, and gave the Centralia war veteran an ovation as he left the ring.

Not much can be said, however, for Johnny Manfredi, the other visitor from Centralia. Matched against Johnny Montgomery, who was seven pounds lighter and much less experienced, Manfredi was unable to get more than a draw. Manfredi used some of the fastest footwork ever seen in the ring here, but most of it was wasted. He fell to the floor continuously in ducking after his rushes, the only system of covering up he seemed to have. Had Montgomery used uppercuts and done more dam-

age in the clinches, in which the visitor left his kidneys an easy target, Montgomery probably would have won. No damage was done except in the fifth round, when the Italian did land several uppercuts at close range. In the final round Manfredi was evidently in distress, while Montgomery did not have enough strength left to finish him.

Ray Crosswhite and Art Andrews, who met in the first preliminary, proved to be willing fighters, and each carried a punch. After they had smeared each other for nearly four rounds, Andrews struck Crosswhite low, according to Referee Fred Gilbert. Crosswhite was half through the ropes and lying on them when the foul was committed. This decision, as well as the others that Gilbert made, had the approval of the fans, and the arbiter also gained popularity in the manner in which he conducted the events.

The American Legion auditorium was well filled with spectators for the smoker. The fight management came in for concerted criticism when it was announced that the Knorr-Martin bout would be for only four rounds, after the Manfredi-Montgomery event had been reduced from eight to six rounds.

## THINK VESSELS LOST IN STORM

**Battered Ships Report Atlantic's Worst Gale in 20 Years**

(By United Press to The Bend Bulletin.)

QUEENSTOWN, Ireland, Dec. 26.—Three vessels are believed to have been lost in a hurricane which is sweeping the North Atlantic, according to the captain of the New Columbia, which was driven into this port by today's storm.

The Celtic and the Carmania, with decks and lifeboats smashed, put into port, reporting the most terrific gale in 20 years.

The New Columbia's captain reported receiving distress signals from three vessels just before the storm reached its height, and that afterwards he was unable to reach them by radio.

## FEW OF TEACHERS ARE TAKING EXAMS

**Law Requiring Normal Training Held Cause—Two of Five From Outside the County**

Teachers' examinations in Deschutes county this term drew fewer instructors to Bend than ever before, states County School Superintendent J. Alton Thompson. He considers that the law requiring normal school training is responsible for this.

Of five who took the tests last week under Thompson's supervision this week, two are from out of the county, Mrs. Blanche E. Robinson-Albright of Wasco county, and Miss Verne A. Cockerham of Prineville. The others are Miss Emma Peterson of Hampton, Mrs. Edna Jaeger of Tumalo, and Miss Edna Lindberg of La Pine.

## Pythian Rank Conferred to Class by High Officials of Order, Using Famous Bible

Over 200 members of the Knights of Pythias order, including large delegations from Redmond, Prineville and Madras, witnessed the conferring of the first rank on a class of 13 candidates Thursday night by Grand Chancellor W. F. Hardesty, after the class had been given their initial obligation over the Rathbone Bible, used by the founder of the order in initiating the first members in 1864. Harry M. Love, supreme keeper of records and seal, and the first supreme officer of the order to make an official visit to the Bend lodge, delivered the obligation and told the history of the Rathbone Bible, the most cherished possession of the order. Walter G. Gleason, grand keeper of records and seal for Oregon, also had a part in the ceremony.

In an address following the banquet at Epworth hall, Love, whose home was in Colfax, Washington, until he was elevated to his present position, told the Central Oregon Pythians that community service is the best means of increasing the membership and influence of the order, the teachings of which are much needed now, when distrust and strife are so common.

## Over 2,000 Rabbits Are Killed Before Weather Halts Poison Campaign

Between 2,000 and 5,000 rabbits met an untimely death in the vicinity of Brothers last week before the rapid thaw halted the work of Roy Fugate and A. W. Moore, operatives of the U. S. biological survey, who were conducting a poisoning campaign there. Fugate reported while in Bend Tuesday on his way to Redmond to report to County Agriculturist W. T. McDonald.

Over 100 dead rabbits were counted within a radius of 50 yards at one place, Fugate stated.

## PERJURY CHARGED AGAINST WITNESS

**I. B. Gordon Defendant as Sequel to Hewitt Case—Giving Liquor to Minor Alleged**

As a sequel to the circuit court trial of Mrs. Bernice Hewitt, acquitted on a charge of immoral conduct at the Wright hotel, I. B. Gordon, complaining witness, was arrested last week by Deputy Sheriff George Stokoe on a charge of perjury. The complaint specifically alleges that whereas Gordon stated that he visited the hotel seven weeks before December 16, the night clerk, Frank Herford, denies the truth of this or of occurrences connected with the visit to which Gordon had testified.

Complaints were filed against two other witnesses, T. R. Anderson and C. R. Hagman, charging them with giving liquor to a minor. Anderson was arrested.

The big car which was responsible for the accident continued on its way toward Redmond, Owens reported. Three men who came along in another machine shortly afterward helped to turn Owens' car right side up, following which Owens drove it to Bend on its own power.

## UNEMPLOYMENT NOT DESTITUTION CAUSE

Illness and the combination of low income and large families are responsible for such destitution as exists in Bend, reports Captain L. S. Broadbent of the Salvation Army, after a survey of conditions since his arrival here. In no case is it due to lack of employment, he states.

In several cases where the head of the family has been ill or disabled for some time, and in others where the income is not sufficient to support the number in the family, Broadbent has found the children undernourished and insufficiently clad; and donations of food and clothing are much desired to relieve this condition.

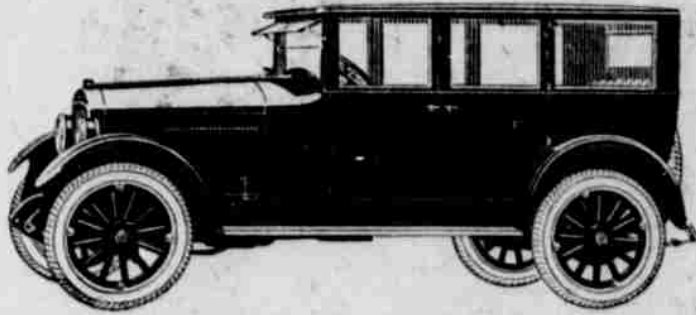
