NEW HEAVYWEIGHT IN THE MAKING

NEW YORK, Dec. 11.—A new heavyweight will be sprung on the poor public some time before the year of 1917 has passed into history unless the plans of men who control a big part in the boxing game fail.
Tex Rickard and several other very prominent promoters are now busy scratching the woods, doing their best to dig up a man who will be able to knock the crown loose from Jess Willard's brow. The probable entry hasn't been sprung, nor has the location of the bout, but all indications point to a meeting between Fred Fulton and Willard some time late in January or early in February at the Tia Juana race track. If Fred's quest for championship honors proves successful the promoters will get busy on another tangent.
It is the feeling in New York that the boxing game, which began to recover from a long attack of Jack Johnson shortly after Willard ascended the throne, is again on the skids. The skids are not greased with any very slippery substance, but everyone is agreed that a brand new variety of pep, alias a new heavyweight champion, is the thing to drag it another notch up the ladder of public favor.
True, there are few heavyweights who stand a chance with Willard, but there are some, and there are many who believe Willard's days as champion will end the first time he tries another bout over the marathon distance.
Carl Morris has been mentioned as a probable opponent, and Harry Pollock is doing a lot of work in an effort to give Charlie Weinert a go with the champion. Weinert seems the most improbable of the three, and public opinion would eliminate Morris in a short time.
But, no matter who is put up for the first chance, or the last one, it is certain that the promoters are on the trail of a new champion, and they are going to trot one out if it is at all possible.

BEND BANK PRAISED

Oregon Voter Says Kind Things About First National.

Under the caption, "Enterprising Bank," the Oregon Voter has the following to say concerning the latest piece of enterprise on the part of the First National Bank, of Bend, in issuing the Rural Credit laws. The book referred to was printed in The Bulletin shop.

Says The Voter:
"Characteristic of Bend enterprise and of the bank which issued it is a 24-page book just published by the First National Bank of Bend, Oregon, outlining the Federal and Oregon Rural Credits systems. It contains an amortization table, the text of the Federal Farm Loan Act and of the Oregon Rural Credits Amendment and a statement that the bank is on the job as usual to help the farmers of the Bend country.
"The bank was the first in Oregon to buy dairy cattle and hogs by the carload for breeding purposes and sell them to farmers on long-time notes at cost prices. More power to the bank that is alive to farmers' needs, for such a bank is one of the greatest assets of a pioneer agricultural country."

AMERICAN CITIZEN TAKEN BY MEXICANS

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Dec. 11.—Ricardo Solis, an American citizen, arrested at Matamoros last week on secret charges, was taken to Victoria for a military trial today despite Consul Johnson's protests. The Consul warned General Cabellero, the de facto Matamoros commandant, that the action would probably result seriously. He reported the facts to Secretary Lansing.

BOYCOTT MAY INJURE OREGON EGG RANCHES

Big dealers and market experts are receiving frantic letters asking for relief. Andrew Eggman, of the Mountain View Poultry farm, said the boycott is only hurting the poultrymen.

JAILBREAKER FOUND BY TRACKS IN SNOW

He found Bensene in bed, where the latter had applied for a job and had received shelter.

WILL ANSWER DEPORTATION PROTEST

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 11.—Ambassador Sharpe cabled today that Premier Briand has started the organization of a new French cabinet. The Berlin American embassy has received Germany's reply to the Belgian deportation protests, according to a cable received here. They also received an explanation of the sinking of the steamship Lanau.

MAYOR NEARLY LOSES

Mrs. Laura Starcher Almost Disqualified by Spouse.

UMATILLA, Dec. 11.—It was learned today that Mayor-Elect Laura Starcher, and the six women officials scheduled to take office on January 1, were nearly disqualified. Mayor Starcher, husband of the mayor-elect, suddenly remembered Saturday night that he had forgotten to canvass the votes. He hurriedly summoned the council and counted the ballots just before the four-day limit expired. He said that if the women had been disqualified, he would never have gone home again. He declared that the world would have been too small to hold the men officials.

HUGE SWINDLE FOUND

Prominent Capitalists Charged With \$2,500,000 Deal.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 11.—Federal postal inspectors conducted a wholesale raid today, arresting several men prominent in Philadelphia finance. Officials declared they had discovered a gigantic swindle involving \$2,500,000, taken from widows and orphans through the sale of worthless stocks.
Companies involved included the International Can and Electric company, the Bachman Bank, and such concerns as the Suburban company, the Gaston Gas company, the Georgetown railway, and Light company, and the Southern Gas and Electric company.

CHEMICAL EXPLOSION IS CAUSE FOR ARREST

PITTSBURG, Dec. 11.—James Reed, aged 26, an alleged German, was arrested today in connection with the explosion of the Fort Pitt works of the Aetna Chemical company, in which three were killed. Officers pursued Reed in an automobile, and overhauled him several miles away. Federal officials are hunting three men suspected of complicity in the bomb plots. Reed was employed at the Oakdale plant when it was dynamited a few months ago.

Adamson Case Set.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 11.—The supreme court agreed today to hear the Adamson law arguments January 8. Government attorneys asked haste. The law becomes effective January 1. The government and the railroads have agreed not to enforce the law until the court decides.

Judge T. E. J. Duffy has taken the case of J. Hasselberg, of Kelso, Washington, under advisement. The case was heard Saturday in Bend, and involves the trade of Tumalo property for farm land near Hartline.

ENGLAND GALVANIZED

Whole Nation Feels Effect of Lloyd-George's Energy.

LONDON, Dec. 11.—Lloyd-George is suffering from a severe chill, as a result of working 20 hours daily, and is confined to his bed. Despite his illness, the whole nation feels the effect of his energy. The public believes that British conservatism has been finally smashed. Some newspapers had charged that Lloyd-George is a tool of Lord Northcliffe. These rumors were stopped when he named Balfour and Lord Cecil as cabinet members. Both of the appointees are intensely disliked by Lord Northcliffe.
