IRRIGATIONISTS CLOSE SESSION

BRILLIANT FUTURE FOR COUNTRY SEEN.

Land Will Be Worth \$100 an Acre,
With Water, Predicted—Many
Important Resolutions
Passed.

Business of the annual Central Oregon Irrigation congress was closed late yesterday afternoon with the report of the resolutions committee, and the adoption, by the delegates, of every resolution proposed by the congress for the guidance of the state congress, which will convene in January. A majority of the delegates left for their homes last night, although a number remained over, departing today.

Issues Important.

Discussion of issues of moment followed the report of the committee on credentials, excellent talks being given by Roscoe Howard, of the Deschutes Irrigation Project, who predicted that Central Oregon land, when watered, would be worth \$100 an acre; by J. N. B. Gerking, of Tumalo, who urged the necessity of co-operation, by Harry J. Chenoweth, of Grandview, who branded the plan to seek government assistance, as worthless; by G. W. Bales, of Tumalo, who predicted a brilliant future for the country; by L. A. Hunt, of Lower Bridge, who counseled repeated effort as necessary in obtaining the money needed by irrigationists, and by Earle Benton, of Redmond, and J. H. Upton, of Prineville, who gave addresses on general irrigation phases. J. T. Hardy, of the Oregon Trunk, and S. L. Wiggins, of the O-W R. & N., each put in a strong bid for the purpose of hauling Central Oregon delegates to the state congress.

To Aid Congress.

Two committees were named for the purpose of putting the State congress in touch with the desires of the Central Oregonians, and to enable the delegates to Portland in January to act as a unit. The original resolution committee, Guy E. Dobson, Harry Gard, Ed. Slayton, Geo. S. Young, and J. E. Stadig, composed the first body, while J. H. Upton, George S. Young, Harry Gard, A. O. Walker, C. H. Irvin, E. T. Slayton, Gus Stadig, F. N. Wallace and O. C. Young, the second.

Following are the resolutions adopted:

Resolution No. 1.

The present district laws provide no way in which to capitalize the interest on Irrigation District bonds, therefore, we, the Central Oregon Irrigation Congress, endorse and recommend that Irrigation districts be allowed to add the amount of interest which will accrue on bonds, during the first five years, to the costs on the project, and issue bonds to the total thereof.

Resolution No. 2.

Be it resolved by the Central Oregon Irrigation Congress that the Irrigation District law should be so amended as to provide for a longer term of office by the directors, and also provide that the entire board of directors shall not be retired at one time.

Resolution No. 3.

Be it resolved by the Central Oregon Irrigation Congress that the Irrigation District laws should be revised so that the duties and powers of the board of directors shall be more clearly set forth.

Resolution No. 4.

Be it resolved by the Central Oregon Irrigation Congress that in any measure recommended by the Oregon Irrigation Congress, which would provide for financial support or assistance of irrigation projects, that wherever applicable, drainage districts shall receive the same consideration.

Resolution No. 5.

Be it resolved by the Central Oregon Irrigation Congress that the State Treasurer and Insurance Commissioners should be authorized by the State Legislature to accept Irrigation District bonds on a parity with other bonds and securities, now specified in laws on the statute books, providing for the investment of Insurance, Trustee and public funds.

Resolution No. 6.

Be it resolved by the Central Oregon Irrigation Congress that a vote of thanks be extended to the Bend Commercial club for their cordial welcome and generous hospitality in entertaining the present session of the Central Oregon Irrigation Congress.

Resolution No. 7.

Be it resolved by the Central Oregon Irrigation Congress that the Oregon Irrigation Congress should request the Oregon Senators and Congressmen to use their best efforts to further the passage of the Jones bill, now pending in Congress.

Resolution No. 8.

Be it resolved by the Central Ore-

gon Irrigation Congress that the letter, written by R. W. Rea, and addressed to Fred N. Wallace, in which he suggests the organization of a permanent committee or league, with the idea of following up the resolutions passed by the Oregon Irrigation Congress, to the end and that these resolutions shall become effective, be and hereby is referred to the next annual meeting of the Oregon Irrigation Congress.

Resolution No. 9.

Whereas: A move is now on foot by which it is proposed to increase the charges for grazing livestock on the National Forest, and,

Whereas: The charges as already in force, together with the expense of caring for livestock within the National Forest are already a heavy burden on the owners, and,

Whereas: The length of the grazing season is so uncertain in the mountainous regions,

Therefore, be it resolved by this Congress, that a protest against any increase in grazing rates is hereby made, and that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the National Forest officials.

CARNIVAL PROGRAM IS WELL RECEIVED

STOCKMEN WANT PEACE; TO SELECT BOUNDARIES

A meeting of cattle and sheepmen, that was intended to be pacific in character, turned out to be decidedly the contrary yesterday afternoon at the Pilot Butte hotel when the sheepmen, who have been using the range east of Bend for grazing approximately 10,000 head, failed to put in their appearance. The session was called by several prominent cattlemen living east of Bend, who have become exercised over the invasion by Lake county sheep owners of Crook county range which has been used by the cattlemen for years, to ascertain whether some boundaries could be established that would not damage the cattle range.

the meeting yesterday that the cattlemen must take immediate action to prevent the use of the cattle range for sheep grazing purposes, and to save the grass for the coming spring's grazing.

There was no disposition manifested yesterday to renew old feuds connected with range wars. The cattlemen believe that a more amicable settlement can be effected. The cattlemen suggest that the Bend-Burns road be made the boundary line and that the sheepmen can confine the herding of their sheep to the territory south of this road and the cattlemen will hold their former grounds north of the road.

R. E. Grimes, of the Pilot Butte ranch, will appoint a committee of

six cattlemen to wait on the sheepmen for their answer to this proposal.
