FARMERS NEAR BEND MARTIN WILL HAVE SEEK RABBIT PELTS

Long Eared Pests Killed in Homestead Section to Furnish Material for Hats.

County Agriculturist R. A. Blanchard is in receipt of a telegram from Congressman N. J. Sinnott asking for a shipment of 50 rabbit skins to be sent to a felt hat manufacturer in Philadelphia. This is the result of several weeks of inquiry into the question of finding a market for the famous Eastern Oregon jack rabbit.

The skins to be used in the experiment are being furnished by the Homestead region back of Bend. A. S. Fogg of Hampton, S. W. Merrill of Brothers and Chas. Marrin of Held are the most active in securing the skins.

Some care is required in the preparation of the skins, which must be well dried and stretched on a board before being shipped. As yet there are not quite enough skins to satisfy the demands of the hat-makers, and other attempts are being made by Mr. Blanchard to secure them.

Mr. Blanchard reports that so far indications lead him to believe that should the Oregon rabbit satisfy the requirements of the manufacturers, they will pay from about 35 to 40 cents per pound for the skins. It takes about 4 or 5 skins to make a pound, which together with the bounty already placed upon the rodents would make each rabbit worth about 10 or 12 cents.

DRY SPELL MAKES POOR HUNTING FOR LOCAL SPORTSMEN

Dry weather has made unusually poor sport at this time of year for duck and goose hunters, was the report brought back to Bend yesterday afternoon by a party composed of John Steidl, his sons Steve and John, Jr., and Bruce Deyarmond, who spent the greater part of the week 25 miles up the river.

During their stay they saw about 25 waterfowl of all kinds, they stated on their return. Mallards were especially scarce. It is thought that the birds are making headquarters in the mountain lakes during the dry spell.

DOG OWNERS COMPLY WITH MUZZLING LAW

DIVISION LINE FOR STOCK AGREED UPON

Adam Kotzman, as Referee, Effects Settlement Between Cattle and Sheep Owners.

That the embryo range war between cattle and sheep men in this section is at an end before it had fairly commenced, was the announcement this afternoon of Adam Kotzman, a rancher living near the city, one of the referees appointed to effect a settlement between the two factions, and who has just brought to completion an agreement between the stockmen using the range near Bend.

According to this agreement, the Bend-Burns road, beginning at a point two miles from the city, will be the boundary line between sheep and cattle for a mile and a half, and the balance of the disputed territory will be divided by the Horse Ridge road, which intersects the Bend-Burns highway. Cattle will graze to the north of the boundary, and sheep to the south.

Both cattle and sheep raisers, Mr. Kotzman declared, expressed themselves as entirely satisfied with the arrangement.

BUSHEL OF CHEER WILL BE DISPENSED AT COMMUNITY TREE

If the plans of the large committee in charge of the second annual Community Christmas Tree to be held in Bend a week from tonight assume their full proportions, there will not be a child in Bend who will not be given a measure of Christmas cheer, because the name and location of every child is being taken and special arrangements are being provided for the speedy and accurate giving of presents.

No less than 1200 children will be cared for at the tree, but provision will be made for a larger number if found necessary.

The tree will be a much more elaborate affair than it was last year in the manner of decoration. Special lighting effects and ornaments will be selected by T. H. Foley, who will have charge of the illumination and decorating.

Santa Claus will be present for the children and the doling out of candies and toys will be under his personal direction.

Mrs. C. V. Silvius is now working on the program. The school children and churches are planning to co-operate in the presentation of music for the occasion.

EXERCISE AND FOOD.

In the Interest of Good Health They Should Just Balance.

"It has not been so very long, comparatively speaking, since our ancestors were almost exclusively animal in their daily pursuits," says the New York Medical Journal. "Since then the blessing of cooking has proved often a curse, in that it adds temptation to our natural tendency to take more food than we need for sedentary purposes, merely for the sake of the savor thereof."

"It is such a joy to dine, and other sources of pleasure seem so scarce or of such less moment to the average man that to a large extent eating has become one of the reasons for existence. We have made much of the evil of treating to alcoholic drinks, but the temptation held out to intemperance in foods is a more widespread evil, with serious consequences in the long run."

"With a reasonable amount of muscular exercise, perhaps, truer physiological balance is reached than if we are purely sedentary. We approximate more nearly our animal ancestry as to muscular activity, and we can exercise our digestive powers a trifle more without harm. Surely if we do not expect to suffer in one way or another the amount of bodily exercise must balance the intake of food or the intake of food must be made to correspond with the degree of bodily activity."

Federal Church Council Brings Together Many Preachers and Laymen

The third quadrennial meeting of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America was held in St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 6-11, in the Second Baptist church.

The Federal council is a representative body, its constituent bodies being thirty of the leading Protestant denominations with an aggregate membership of 18,000,000. The total population represented by this membership is perhaps 35,000,000.

The St. Louis meeting was the largest and most important yet held. The official members or delegates approximated 450 in number. They are appointed from the constituent denominational members.
