CROOK OFFICIALS IN THE CITY LOSE JOBS

Charles W. Erskine, H. J. Overturf, L. A. W. Nixon, and Theodore Aune Must Step Out.

Four Bend men, who held offices in Crook county, are automatically out of jobs, and one of them Deputy District Attorney Charles W. Erskine, this morning received notification from District Attorney Willard H. Wirtz, notifying him of this fact. Mr. Wirtz revoked the appointment for the reason that affairs in this section are no longer within the jurisdiction of Crook county officials, and requested Mr. Erskine in the future to refer all complaints to the district attorney of Deschutes county, H. H. De Armond. He assured Mr. Erskine that relations existing had been most pleasant and satisfactory.

H. J. Overturf ceases to be a county commissioner, but acting on the precedent established two years ago in Jefferson county, will go to Prineville tomorrow to attend the adjourned session of the county court. "If there is any disposition shown not to keep me on, I will of course resign, but otherwise will continue as a member of the court until the end of the year, to aid in winding up the 1916 business affairs," he explained.

Tomorrow's meeting of the Crook county court will be the last of the year, and the main question causing the adjourned session is that of redistricting the county for voting precincts. This was made necessary by the rapid growth of Bend, but was held over from the last meeting because of the county division issue. Now that Bend is in Deschutes county, there will be no redistricting found necessary, it is expected.

L. A. W. Nixon and Theodore Aune, deputy sheriffs, are the two other Crook county officers in Bend who have lost their positions by virtue of the county division.

INSTRUCTORS OF CITY IN PRINEVILLE TODAY

Virtual Elimination of Chances for Local Institute This Year Deemed Politic.

Virtually eliminating the possibility of a Deschutes county teachers' institute, practically all of the local educators who will return for work after the Christmas holidays left for Prineville this morning, gathering first at the Wright hotel shortly after 7 o'clock. City Superintendent Franklin Thordarson headed the delegation.

In spite of the choice offered them by State Superintendent Churchill, the action was taken, following a conference yesterday in which Mr. Thordarson advised the faculty members of the Bend schools to attend at Prineville this year to avoid any possible trouble which the Crook county authorities might make as a result of non-attendance.

Tomorrow night the visitors will be the guests at a dinner given by the members of the district division board.

\$35,000 DELIVERED ON RAILROAD BONDS

Another step toward the Strahorn railroads was taken today when G. E. Keeler, of Keeler Bros., bond dealers, of Denver, arrived in Bend to place \$35,000, the purchase price of the bond issue authorized to secure terminals and right of way, to the credit of the city, in the First National Bank. It is understood that work will be started to secure the necessary terminal sites within a few days.

DECORATING A ROOM.

Touches That Tell in Making It Harmonious and Artistic.

One of the things to remember in planning a new house is that the walls should be the background of the room, and therefore that it is a mistake to select paper that fills up the room before anything else has been put in. The best thing to do is to choose a neutral tint and get your color scheme through the hangings and furnishings.

If the room is dark choose a tan or gray paper with a pinkish or yellow tinge; if it is sunny let the gray or tan be of a blue or green cast. Then if it is a blue room you have decided upon choose a rug with blue predominating, chintz overcurtains with blues, yellows and greens, a big dull blue pottery vase for the lamp with a blue and yellow Japanese shade for the table, one chair upholstered with the chintz and another with plain blue and you have a blue room that you will not tire of in a week or a month.

Red, the cheerful color there is and can only be effective if used very sparingly. It fairly eats up the light. A red shade on the desk lamp, a red cricket, a red Japanese bowl on the dark bookcase or just a scarlet quill pen on the desk may be all you need to give exactly the right note of color. —New York Sun.

John Hays Hammond, World Famed Engineer, Ill In Baltimore

John Hays Hammond, probably the most famous mining engineer in the world, was reported ill at a Baltimore hotel in which he was staying temporarily. It was said that the illness was not serious. Mr. Hammond will be sixty-two years old on March 11 next. He has been interested in promoting mining ventures in many parts of the world, and his career has been filled with interesting episodes, such as his arrest by the British government for complicity in the Jameson raid on the Transvaal. For this he was sentenced to death. The sentence was commuted to fifteen years' imprisonment, and he was released on payment of a fine of \$125,000. It was said some years ago that Mr. Hammond received a salary of \$1,000,000 a year from certain mining interests. He has been an active Republican, was mentioned for the vice presidential nomination and represented the United States at the coronation of King George. Mr. Hammond has homes in Gloucester, Mass., and New York city.
