Drastic Action Is Counseled to Wipe Out Danger of Rabies

Acting on the request of Mayor J. A. Eastes, City Physician U. C. Coe today wrote an open letter to the city council, requesting stricter enforcement of the muzzling ordinance, because of recent developments. The last case to be noted was that of the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Carey, bitten Saturday by a cat believed to be rabid. Dr. J. C. Vandeventer, who is attending the case, reports the little girl to be doing well, and intends to send the cat's head to the state board of health for examination.

Mayor Eastes declared today that he would favor licensing dogs out of existence in Bend. "The steady growth of the city, and the fact that we are bound to have coyotes, the chief carriers of the disease, with us for years to come, makes it necessary that we should eliminate the dogs from Bend if possible," he declared. "I shall advise drastic action to the next city officials."

In his letter Dr. Coe says: "Lately I have had several complaints made to the effect that there were still dogs about town which had not been muzzled and that others muzzled their dogs in the daytime and took them off at night, and I have thought it advisable to call your attention again to our muzzling ordinance which I think should be enforced to the letter."

"Rabies seems to be on the increase at present in the vicinity of Bend. Yesterday a dog belonging to Mr. Armstrong, at Brooks-Scanlon camp No. 2, was bitten by a coyote which was apparently rabid. Saturday a girl was bitten by a rabid cat, and stringent measures should be taken at this time, and continue to be enforced until the danger of rabies is over."

"Rabies is an infectious disease chiefly affecting dogs, but to which all mammals are susceptible. The disease is communicated usually by the bites of dogs, cats, and in this section coyotes, the virus being contained in the salivary secretion. It prevails in all countries except England, where the importation of dogs has been prohibited and the infection has been practically unknown for many years. When the symp-

oms of rabies appear the disease process is already well established. The period of incubation, or the time elapsing after the dog is bitten until the first symptoms appear, in dogs varies from a week to several months; usually the disease manifests itself within three to ten weeks. Although the animals may appear healthy, they are capable of transmitting the disease to human beings prior to the appearance of the period of rabies in human beings varies from 15 to 60 days, although it must be observed that incubation periods of a year or more have been recorded.

"On account of these things, and the long period of incubation which this disease carries, you can readily see that it is a very hard disease to stamp out. A dog that may be bitten now by a rabid animal may be kept muzzled for six months and when his muzzle is taken off next summer his bite will be infectious to some other dog, and the disease will continue to spread."

"I would respectfully urge a strict enforcement of this ordinance to the letter, and the killing of all stray dogs without owners forthwith."

NEW TEACHER NAMED BOARD ADVANCES PAY OF GEORGE F. HOOVER

To take the place of Miss Lillian Cooper, resigned, Miss Joanna Hislop has been appointed to teach the seventh and eighth grades in Bend. It was announced this morning. She is expected to arrive in the city in time to take up the work immediately after the close of the Christmas holidays.

That the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Co. has tacitly agreed to pay one-third of the expense of transporting the children living in camp to the city schools, was stated this morning by H. J. Overturf, of the school board. From now on, instead of \$80 a month formerly paid George F. Hoover for furnishing a conveyance for the children to and from school, \$95 will be paid, the board has decided.

SCHOOL PROBLEM IS UNIQUE HERE

**SUCH IS DIAGNOSIS OF
EDUCATION HEAD.**

Would Not Have Ordered Attendance of Deschutes Co. Teachers at Prineville, But Thinks It More Advisable.

SALEM, Dec. 18.—The problem in county school affairs stirred up by the creation of Deschutes county, whose teachers probably will not participate in the institute held this week by the parent county at Prineville, is unique, according to State Superintendent Churchill.

Friday the Bend school board telegraphed Mr. Churchill asking if teachers in Deschutes county would run any danger of losing their certificates if they refused to go to the Crook county institute, but waited instead for a Deschutes county institute. Replying, Mr. Churchill said, in effect, that he couldn't cross a hypothetical bridge until he came to it; he couldn't commit himself. But now the state superintendent has gone to Prineville to participate in that very Crook county institute. Before leaving, he discussed the situation.

"Of course usually I would stand behind any recommendations of a county superintendent for revocation of certificates," said Mr. Churchill, "but in the case which seems to be developing it is extremely doubtful if any such serious consequences could follow, or should follow. If the Deschutes county teachers attend their own institute, that will be all the law requires, and I can't see that they will be liable for any punishment."

Mr. Churchill added, however, that he believed it would be a mistake to precipitate the proposed action.

"The Prineville institute is all organized and under way," he said. "It costs a good deal of money. Undoubtedly some Deschutes county teachers will go to it, perhaps many of them. Those who do go can't be compelled to attend any other institute. So probably there would not be a very large attendance at the proposed Deschutes county institute later. That would be a poor start and would entail needless expenditure. It seems to me that it is better to go through with this last institute at Prineville in good shape, and then start with a clean slate next year."

U. S. METHODS NEEDED

Good Chance for Americans in Russian Business.

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—There is plenty of room and a welcome for the American business man in Russia today. And clean-cut business methods will get him as much in the land of the Cossack as in his own United States.

The business man who wants to be "babied" had better stay away. Sitting on the doorstep of a Russian ministry waiting a handout of juicy orders will bring only an order to beat it. No use either working on the theory that one has to "cultivate." The American who tries to bribe his way there is a chump.

There is a huge demand for manufactured goods. The demand is large now and, as Russia is comparatively an undeveloped country, the demand will grow.

For complicated machinery this demand will last for a long time. In the case of most staple articles sold on a small margin, the Russian market will be attractive for only a limited time. Russia will soon supply herself with these products. She must do so to become economically independent. She has the raw materials and a huge home market. Every effort will be made to develop home industries, including a high protective tariff.

Despite the high tariff, for years vast quantities of manufactured products will have to be imported. Before the war many of these goods came from Germany. Even if after the war there is no trade combination of the allies there will be for a long while a sentiment against Germany.

Russia especially wants Americans to establish factories in Russia. American concerns are going to make their big money in Russia out of Russian branch factories.

Although Americans and others will be encouraged to establish such factories, yet certain restrictions will be put upon them. For Russia has learned something on this point. Before the war there were many German owned factories employing only Germans. The war came on and these shut down at once.

In the future Russia will probably require every foreign owned

concern to employ a certain proportion of Russians in every department. However, there is an abundance of Russian labor—good labor too—and plenty of available administrative and technical experts. American capital is especially welcome because Russia believes that such capital does not come as the advance political agent of a foreign government. While the opportunities for Americans and American capital are inconceivably large, there are no easy pickings. And Russia is no place for second-raters or cast-offs.

LATIN AMERICA SENDS SHIPS THROUGH CANAL

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Forty-two vessels of Latin-American registry passed through the Panama canal during the fiscal year 1914-15, according to figures of the Panama canal record available today. Of those four were Peruvian, three Hondurian, one Nicaraguan, 33 Chilean and one Panamanian. These figures do not mean that each vessel enumerated was a different one.

BRAVERY OF A TOREADOR.

Remarkable Display of Nerve by a Spanish Bull Fighter.

The famous Spanish toreador Reverte figured in one of the most thrilling incidents ever witnessed in the bull fighting arena.

It was at Bayonne. After disposing of two bulls Reverte had twice plunged his sword into a third of great strength and ferocity, and as the beast continued careering wildly the spectators began to hiss Reverte for bungling.

Wounded to the very quick of his pride, the Spaniard shouted, "The bull is slain!" and, throwing aside his sword, sank on one knee with folded arms in the middle of the ring.

He was right, but he had not allowed for the margin of accident. The wounded beast charged full upon him, but the matador, splendid to the last, knelt motionless as a statue, while the spectators held their breath in horrified suspense.

Reaching his victim, the bull literally bounded at him, and as he sprang he sank in death, with his last effort giving one fearful lunge of the head that drove a horn into the thigh of the kneeling man and laid bare the bone from the knee to the joint.

Still Reverte never flinched, but remained kneeling, exultant in victory, but calmly contemptuous of applause, till he was carried away to heal him of his grievous wound.
