HOLIDAY TRAVEL BIG

Oregon Trunk Makes Special Arrangements for Its Patrons.

Two special tourist coaches have been engaged by J. T. Hardy, of the Oregon Trunk, to accommodate the holiday traffic leaving Bend. This extra service becomes effective tonight and will continue through Saturday night. According to Mr. Hardy the travel of homegoers and tourists during the holidays promises to be three or four times as heavy as it was last year.

That the delegates to the Oregon Irrigation congress may be cared for properly Mr. Hardy has also arranged for three special tourist coaches which will leave Bend on the evening of January 3. Reduced rates of one and one-third fares have been announced and will be effective for return up to January 13. Mr. Hardy says that about 45 will attend from Bend and Tumalo, 25 from Redmond, 40 from Prineville and about 60 from points north of Redmond.

FIRST SUIT FILED IN CIRCUIT COURT IN NEWEST COUNTY

The first case in Deschutes county to be filed in circuit court, was begun late yesterday afternoon by Vernon A. Forbes, when he placed on record with County Clerk Haner a suit brought by J. S. Bogue & Co., of LaPine, against Mr. and Mrs. Edward Emblem. The suit is for the recovery, and judgment is asked for \$298.35, alleged to be due as the purchase price of goods sold by the plaintiff.

No definite time has been set for the holding of circuit court in Deschutes county, but at the coming session of the legislature a bill will be introduced allowing for two terms a year. The Deschutes court will, of course, be under Judge Duffy's jurisdiction.

FARMERS TO BORROW

Federal Farm Loan Association Has Organization Meeting.

The farmers of the vicinity of Gist, known as Plain View neighborhood, met with County Agriculturalist R. A. Blanchard for the purpose of taking advantage of the opportunity offered in the recent federal Farm Loan act. The meeting was addressed by R. A. Ward, the assistant from the U. S. Biological survey, at first. The biologist explained the investigations of his department and the service rendered to localities infested with jack rabbits. Much interest was elicited and the community expressed their willingness to co-operate and make a concerted attack on the rabbit pest following Mr. Ward's suggestion in the poison method.

Mr. Blanchard then explained the history of the rural credits movement of the country to the present enactment of the Federal Farm Loan act, and the workings of the law. Mr. Blanchard brought out several pamphlets sent by Mr. C. S. Hudson of the First National bank of Bend, and discussed the preliminary steps to be taken in forming an association. Accordingly a temporary organization was formed which will shortly grow into and be perfected as one of the Federal Farm Loan associations. The meeting elected Mr. T. F. McAllister as president and Mr. H. A. Scoggin as secretary.

FARMERS PLANNING TRIP TO CORVALLIS FOR COMING MONTH

County Agriculturalist R. A. Blanchard has arranged for an excursion to Corvallis for the farmers of Crook county to take advantage of the Farmers' Week there. The special sleeper will leave on the regular evening train January 2, going straight through to Corvallis and returning to central Oregon again on Sunday morning. The car will be parked at the station at Corvallis and will be used every night in lieu of hotels, which will probably be crowded at the time.

Special rates of one and one-third fare will prevail, passengers purchasing full one way fare and presenting the receipt for the return privilege. Mr. Blanchard hopes to get at least 30 people who will make the trip. In this event it will cost each passenger one dollar for the car per day. Arrangements have been made with the Redmond Bank of Commerce, the First National Bank of Bend and the First National Bank of Prineville to receive deposits of \$4.50 from the excursionists. This money must be deposited by December 28, Thursday evening, in order to insure the use of the special car.

STOCK SHOW INCREASE

Will Be 25 Per Cent Gain Next Year, Says Forest Head.

Grazing permits on the Deschutes National forest will be eagerly sought during the next year, according to Forest Supervisor Hastings, who bases his statement on the fact that already applications for government permission to place stock on the forest range are beginning to pour into the local office. He predicts that there will be 25 per cent more stock on the range next year than during the last season.

"We will be able to take care of everybody in 1917," he said this morning, "but in the next year, allowing merely for the normal increase, the range is going to be badly crowded. It is because of this that an increase of grazing fees is contemplated by the service."

COINAGE IS DELAYED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Issuance of the new half-dollar coin, designed by Adolph Weinman, designer of the new dime; and the new quarter, designed by Herman A. MacNeil, both considered by experts as coins of great beauty and quality, has been deferred by the treasury department until the beginning of 1917.

The extraordinary demand for small coins—cents, nickels and dimes—is overtaxing the facilities of the mints and officials believed calls for the new quarter and half-dollar coins would swamp the mints.
