BEND WOMAN INSANE

Mrs. A. L. Zacharias Committed to Asylum—Suicidal Mania Shown.
 On examination by Dr. J. C. Vandever, Mrs. Mabel Jane Zacharias, wife of A. L. Zacharias, of this city, was last night committed to the state insane hospital at Pendleton, by order of County Judge William D. Barnes. Suicidal mania, thought to have been induced primarily by church troubles, was the diagnosis of the examiner. Mrs. Zacharias was taken to Pendleton this morning by attendants from the hospital.
 The examination revealed that she was a victim of hallucinations, imagining that she saw animals of various kinds.

OREGON TRUNK WILL HAVE LARGE SCALES

Preliminary work laying the foundations for a new set of track scales for the Oregon Trunk railway began here today, near the warehouse of the Bend Hardware company. The scales will be of standard size. Traveling Freight and Passenger Agent Hardy announced today and will have a capacity of not less than 100 tons. All material possible, to be used in the installation of the huge weighing machinery, is being purchased locally.

MOOSE LODGE MADE \$675 ON CARNIVAL

Payment Is Completed on Dream Theatre to Be Remodeled for Club Rooms for the Order.

That profits accruing to the Moose lodge of Bend from the recent carnival, will amount to \$675, was the report this morning of Myron Symons, chairman of the finance committee, following the discharge of all obligations incurred in putting on the all week show. The amount, he said, was greatly in excess of expectations, for although receipts amounted to \$1,500, expenses had been very heavy.
 The lodge has completed payment on the old Dream theatre, which is to be remodeled and used as a club by the organizations, but exact plans in regard to this have still to be formulated. It is expected that a definite decision will be reached at the meeting of the lodge next week, when the possibility of purchasing a new site and moving the building will be considered.

SCHOOL TO BE BUILT AT LOGGING CAMPS

That 26 children whose parents are residing at the logging camps of the Brooks-Seanlon Lumber company, may be afforded schooling facilities close at hand, the school board yesterday at a meeting decided to erect a small school building in the woods and employ Harry Thompson, of Sweet Home, Oregon, as teacher.
 The Brooks-Seanlon company is desirous of giving the children in its camp every possible opportunity to attend school and has offered to furnish the lumber and much of the labor so that the building may be completed as soon as possible.
 The location of the school remains indefinite as plans may be made in the spring to change the location of the camp.
 The change from transporting the children to town to erecting a school at the camps was thought advisable in view of the distance, the cold weather and the congested condition of the local schools at the present. According to Superintendent Thordarson many families are moving into the city during the holidays and the schools promise to be even more congested at the opening of the second semester, January 29, than they are now. It is expected that the new school building will be ready for occupancy about the middle of February.

SUE FRANK M'GOVERN FOR NEARLY \$5,000

Three Cases Brought Against Boarding House Keeper for Supplies, and More May Be Filed.

Suits to recover money alleged due for goods purchased, were filed today with County Clerk Haner against Frank McGovern, proprietor of a boarding house patronized by the employees of several of the mills and logging camps adjacent to Bend. In addition, it is understood that several smaller claims may be presented. Sheriff S. E. Roberts was unable to find McGovern this morning to serve papers. More than \$4,000 is the present total of claims.
 The largest claim is that represented in the suit of the Bennett grocery store, \$2,400. P. A. Erickson's suit is for \$1,335.45, and that of the Bend Produce and Commission company is for approximately \$700. Practically all indebtedness was incurred during the last two months, according to the complaints.

MAY SEND DEPUTY TO TAKE OVER PRISONER

Unless assurance is received from Portland that Ike Weinstein, arrested for appropriation of property belonging to Robert Smith, of Sisters, will return to stand trial here, Sheriff Roberts is planning to send a deputy to bring the defendant to Bend. Weinstein is now out on \$200 bail.

In company with C. E. Radding, for whom a warrant has also been made out, Weinstein purchased Mr. Smith's store at Sisters. Later when Mr. Smith repurchased the establishment, he complained that on taking inventory, he found a number of office fixtures missing.

MANY WILL ATTEND IRRIGATION CONGRESS

More than 30 local irrigationists are expected to attend the annual Oregon Irrigation congress which opens January 4 in Portland. According to George S. Young local men are planning to take a more important part in the affairs of the congress this year than usual, realizing that this coming year means much in the way of irrigation to Central Oregon.

Letters have been received in Bend today from C. C. Chapman, chairman of the program committee, urging that local men participate in the program.
