FINGER PRINT CLUE

Police Seek Blackmailer Who Minced Publisher's House.

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 29.—A finger print forms the chief clue in a hunt by the police of several cities, private detectives and federal secret service operatives, for the ring-leaders and agents of a band of blackmailers who partly wrecked by explosion the home of Charles T. Hutchinson, publisher.

Money had been demanded of Hutchinson in four letters since October 8. The finger print was obtained from one of these.

The Hutchinson case is linked with an attempt to blackmail Governor Hiram Johnson, whose life was threatened in September in a letter demanding that he leave \$20,000 in the capital grounds.

Black powder instead of dynamite was used on the Hutchinson home last night. It blasted a two foot hole in the brick wall of the basement. The only occupant of the house was a Chinese cook, who was uninjured.

On November 22 five sticks of dynamite were discovered in a tank house adjoining the home of Hutchinson, who is manager of the Mining and Scientific Press. Before that attempt, \$5000 had been demanded of him. He has been having private detectives guard his home nightly from 8 o'clock in the evening, but last night's explosion was timed for a short time before they arrived.

T. R.'S FRIENDS TO START FOR AFRICA

OTTAWA, Dec. 29.—Premier Borden today accepted the invitation of Lloyd George to a war council to be held soon.

France Makes Nivelle Commander In Chief In Place of Joffre



General Robert George Nivelle, who succeeded General Feltin to the command of the Verdun terrain in May and recaptured Douaumont and Vaux in October, has been made commander in chief of the French armies in the north and northeast of France, succeeding Joffre, who becomes a member of the war council in Paris.
 General Nivelle is half English, his mother having been a Miss Sparrow of Deal. He is sixty years of age and comes from Tulle, in the department of Correze. In August, 1914, he was a colonel in command of the Fifth regiment of artillery, expecting soon to be retired. Joffre brought him forward, and in October he was made general of brigade and a few weeks later placed in command of the Sixty-first infantry division. On Dec. 23, 1915, he became a general and was appointed to command the Third army corps.

George F. Baker, Called By Financial Sharps "Wall Street's Big Man"

Wall street and the other financial centers of America, while not hopeful of peace, felt the stirring that affected the rest of the world and the foreign exchange market reflected the increased chance of peace. A number of the belligerent exchangers, conspicuously German exchange as well as exchange on some of the neutral countries, advanced in decided fashion. Should peace come soon George F. Baker of New York probably will be one of the leading figures in the financial re-organization to follow the war. By many he is called "Wall street's biggest man." Mr. Baker is chairman of the board of the First National bank of New York. This snapshot of Mr. Baker, who is seventy-six years old, was made a few days ago.
