

"Don'ts" Face English and Neutrals On Every Side

LONDON, Dec. 30.—Living in London or any other part of England is no paradise these days of strict censorship. The English are becoming adapted to the stringent regulations laid down under the "Defense of the Realm Act," but easy going Americans and other neutrals do not adjust themselves to the conditions so easily.

Some of the "Don'ts."

If you want to live in London, or even only visit the city for a few days you must not:

Talk about naval or military operations in a restaurant, railway station or any other public place.

Say anything which might cast aspersions upon the forces of the Allies or prejudice their good relations with neutral powers.

Spread any report of a Zeppelin scare.

Use a cipher code in sending letters to a neutral country.

Possess any cipher code which could be so used.

Send a letter abroad containing any matter written in invisible ink.

Receive letters and telegrams for a fee, unless you acquaint the police.

Attempt to give letters to members of the crew of a vessel about to sail for a neutral country, or to any country.

Receive any letter from outside the United Kingdom without notifying the authorities.

Write to any one, either in this or in a neutral country, giving information about enemy submarines or airships.

Post any newspaper to a neutral country except through an authorized agent.

Walk about camps, controlled factory, defensive works, ship or office used for the service of the country.

Railway Trespassers.

Enter a special military area without the permission of the commandant.

Trespass on railways or loiter near railway arches.

Collect any information as to the condition of any of the ships.

Enter any government works without a permit.

Walk over or in trenches constructed by the military.

Wear a war work badge when not authorized to do so by official permit, or wear it after it has been recalled.

Wear any naval or military uniform when not entitled to do so.

Purchase any clothing or equipment from any soldier or sailor.

Show films, still pictures, or produce stage plays prejudicing discipline in the army.

Photograph, draw or paint any picture of the coast, or within so many miles of it as specified locally.

Buy any drawings, photographs or silhouettes of ships of the navy.

Send any postcard upon which are pictures of the ships.

Buy prismatic binoculars, portable terrestrial telescopes and prismatic compasses, unless you obtain an official permit.

Propose to another a deal in war material without a permit.

Use a flashlight as a signal.

Fly a kite which is capable of being used as a means of signalling.

Give a display of fireworks except by permission of the naval or military authorities.

Send up a fire balloon.

Allow a bonfire, even of garden refuse, after 5 p. m.

Ride on or drive any vehicle after dark that has not a rear red light, as well as a front white light. Perambulators are vehicles.

Raise blinds or remove shades from lights.

Allow any ray of light to escape from any window of your house after 5 p. m.

Rules for Intoxicants.

Procure intoxicants other than between 12 and 2:30 and 6:30 to 9:30 on week days, or from 1 to 3 and from 6 to 9 on Sundays.

Buy intoxicants to take away after 8:30 p. m. on week days, and 8 p. m. on Sundays.

Buy spirits on Saturdays or Sundays for home drinking. On other days from 12 to 2:30.

Buy less than a bottle of any spirit.

Buy a flask of spirits at any railway refreshment rooms.

Give or offer any soldier or sailor in or going to a port of embarkation any intoxicant.

Sell or give alcoholic liquors to soldiers and sailors in hospital garb.

Pay for any intoxicating liquor for another person on licensed premises.

Shop after 5 p. m. on all days except Saturday, when the hour limit is 9.

Buy refreshments at a railway station buffet after 5 p. m., unless you consume them then and there.

If selling sugar made it a condition that the purchaser shall buy tea.

Act in a manner prejudicial to the public safety or the defence of the realm. This is a warning to practical jokers.

Shoot or capture any carrier or homing pigeon.

Neglect to report the finding of a bomb dropped from enemy aircraft.

Sell firearms of any kind without a proper permit to do so.

Sell, buy or give cocaine or opium.

Melt down bronze, silver or gold coin.

Refuse to show your registration card to any person authorized to look at it.

Ring bells or allow outside clocks to strike after 5 o'clock at night.

Have possession of any document the publication of which would be forbidden.

Attempt to leave as a member of a neutral ship.

She offers to go away with him, but the boss says that because of his love for her he will not permit this. Marian confesses to the boss that her husband had sent her to visit him that first time and to try to make him love her, and that afterward she loved him for himself. Powers, hearing the conversation, rushes to Marian as the boss leaves and frantically asks whether she has obtained the boss' promise to nominate him. She upbraids her husband and with a shrug he starts to leave the house, but meets the big boss in the hall. The boss tells him that he is now convinced that he was right in declining to give him the nomination.

EXPLOSIVE SMOKES ARE PLENTIFUL IN CALIFORNIA CITY

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 30.—A total of five men in Los Angeles have received the "dynamite cigars" which federal agents say have been sent broadcast throughout the country and which have already resulted in the injury of four men in Brawley and Auburn.

W. T. Turner, former mayor of Watts, near here, and H. Perkins, a contractor, each report having received one of the deadly cigars. Perkins, who had heard of the cigar plot, threw his into the stove and it exploded, blowing the stove to pieces.

T. E. Berry and J. T. Bill, motorcycle dealers, each received one of the cigars, while J. O. Burns, also of Los Angeles, received one several days ago. All had read in the newspapers of the exploding cigars in Brawley, and gave the little package over to the police. With the one sent to a man in San Francisco, this makes a total of eight reported so far.

Detectives and federal officials say that all of the intended victims have at some time or other been connected with labor troubles, and that the cigars may have been sent out by a crank member of the I. W. W.

Following the report of A. C. Garnet, a Santa Fe conductor, that he found at least 25 cigars wrapped in individual packages and mailed them believing they had been left accidentally by some passenger in the train, authorities sent out a nation wide warning to all post offices to be on the watch.

Garnet said the packages were addressed to various parts of the country, including San Francisco, Phoenix, Duluth and cities in North Dakota, Idaho and Nebraska.

PLAN OVERHAULING OF FOREST PHONES

45 Miles of Line to Be Gone Over to
Shorten Circuits, and Make Communication More Effective.

The overhauling of 45 miles of telephone line of the 250 miles in the Deschutes National forest is planned by Supervisor Hastings to begin in February, he announced this morning. The elimination of 15 miles of the Minto line, 10 miles of this being within the forest boundaries, will form an important part of the renovation of the forestry phone system.

The chief object of the service is to break up the lines into shorter circuits. It has been ascertained that the character of the soil is such that an unusually high resistance is offered to the passage of an electrical current, and as the earth circuit system is in use, this has resulted in difficulty in communication. There is no trouble in the clearness of tones transmitted, Mr. Hastings says, but the volume of sound is greatly reduced.

A crew of six men will be given employment on the work.
