THOMPSON ON IRRIGATION.

The one dissenter from the general agreement that the state irrigation district laws need revision is W. Lair Thompson, of Lakeview, former state senator from this district, and defeated for re-election in November by one vote. According to the Journal, Mr. Thompson wired the irrigation congress and besought it "to recommend no changes whatever in the existing irrigation district laws, pointing out that they are the best in the country, and that, under them, development and settlement of the country are encouraged. He asserted that proposed changes could be nothing but impairments of the present law and work to the advantage of the absentee landlord instead of the settler."

Mr. Thompson must be given credit for taking the unpopular side of the question. He did the same thing with the lakes lease bill two years ago, and his reported opposition to irrigation measures is understood to have contributed in large measure to his retirement to private life. It was the unpopular stand. But when one opposes a measure which has such

unanimous support, and support of such character as has the district law amendment, there is good ground for inquiry as to whether he is a true friend to irrigation and the irrigation country.

Mr. Thompson might assert that he was a true friend who was brave enough to stand for what he believed right, in the face of a misguided popular sentiment. But an inquiry into the facts on which he based his position would indicate otherwise for, contrary to Mr. Thompson's statement, the present irrigation district laws have absolutely not encouraged the settlement and development of the country.

A year ago the district law was hailed as the solution of the irrigation problems of the state and much of the time of the last irrigation congress was devoted to a discussion of the law. There followed the formation of several districts, notably in this section, the Ochoco project, the North Unit project and the Suttles Lake project. But there, in most cases, the development ended because the law was found unsatisfactory and unworkable.

One of the tasks facing the coming legislature is the amendment of that law, and we hope and believe the work will be well done.
