TEUTONS SWEEPING RAPIDLY TO FRONT

Five Towns in Roumania Taken, and Important Stronghold of Galatz Seriously Menaced.

BERLIN, via Bayville, Jan. 6.—The onward sweep of the Teutons is described in an official statement issued today, announcing the capture of five towns, and the arrival of outposts at the Sereth river. This constitutes a new menace to Galatz, an important Roumanian city now in the hands of the Russian and Roumanian forces.

The announcement detailed the storming advance movements by the Teutons in the Carpathians. Remniceni, Tartaru, Cleusnessca, Guillanes and Maxenini are now in the hands of the Germans.

A British night attack at Serre, on the Somme front, is announced. The attacking force entered the German advanced trenches.

LANSING LISTED FOR LEAK PROBE

WILL TESTIFY MONDAY—GARDNER PROVES ADVANCE INFORMATION WAS GIVEN TO THE STOCK TICKER SERVICE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6.—Secretary Lansing will appear Monday before the committee investigating the alleged leak in connection with President Wilson's peace note, it was announced here today, following an executive session of the rules committee of the House this afternoon.

Representative Gardner, of Massachusetts, supported his charge that there had been a leak giving advance information to the Presidents note to Wall street. He read a dispatch sent by Down Jones, to the stock ticker service at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, before the note was released for publication.

Subpoenas have been issued for the entire Washington staffs of the Wall Street Journal, and the Financial American.

VILLISTAS DEFEATED

600 Prisoners are Killed, After Capture, is Report Received.

EL PASO, Tex., Jan. 6.—Details of an irreparable defeat to the Villistas was sent to the Mexican consul here by General Murguia, the Carranzista commander. Three Hundred of Villa's followers were killed, south of Chihuahua, 600 were wounded, and 600 captured.

According to the report received at the consulate, those taken prisoners were executed.

ORIGINATOR OF BREACH OF PROMISE SUIT FOR \$50,000 TO ENTER COURT

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—The stage is set in federal court here for the entrance Monday of handsome "Oliver Osborne," self-confessed starter of a \$50,000 breach of promise suit between tiny Rae Tanzer and former District Attorney James W. Osborne.

If this debonair and charming man with the smile identified by Rae as the man who flirted with her on the 72nd street subway platform, and afterward made love to her at closer range, the wealthy and reputable former official, James W. Osborne, will have proved his contention that he never saw or heard of the woman who sued him for \$50,000 for breach of promise.

The concrete situation to be dealt with Monday is whether the wee woman is guilty of perjury in swearing that James W. Osborne actually was the man who flirted with, then promised to marry her.

But the center of interest will be the mysterious "Oliver" himself. It was only after a chase of several years, involving expenses running into several comfortable fortunes, that this elusive individual, whose existence James W. Osborne has asserted from the beginning but of whom no trace was found until recently, was caught under another name, in Chicago.

REDMOND GETS MUCH OF BLAME

PRINEVILLE SHIFTS RESPONSIBILITY.

Many Substantial Citizens of Crook County Seat See Folly in Attack Against Deschutes, and Attach No Significance.

There's an ethiopean in the woodpile in these parts who has been making a lot of noise, doing a considerable amount of work, making himself very conspicuous, but his exact whereabouts to many is quite unknown. In Bend he is believed to reside in the county seat of Crook county, but to visitors from Bend who go to Prineville, the statement is made that he is resident in Redmond.

While in Prineville several Bend citizens made an effort to ascertain the location of this black gentleman by feeling around, asking questions and getting what was thought to be a little first hand information. They failed, however, to learn of the habit of the colored man. The opinion, according to these visitors, is that little potential feeling against Deschutes county exists among the substantial citizens of Prineville, and that no credence is given to the charges of Prineville against Bend conduct of the election.

Redmond, they say, is being blamed for a large part of the fight that is now raging against the county division issue. It was said that Redmond was putting up a heavy portion of the financial assistance. At this attitude, it has been learned here, Redmond is quite concerned because neither moral nor financial assistance is coming out of Redmond in the attack against the new county.

Redmond is Loyal.

The fact that so little is known about the operation of the self-styled detectives who were in Bend a few days last week, supposedly with the view to obtaining information regarding the conduct of the November election in Bend precincts, leads many citizens here to believe that the actions of these detectives were not prompted by Prineville people. By substantial citizens in Prineville this sort of conduct is looked upon with disgust and regret to see Prineville's name in any way associated with the action. Information obtained here leads local people interested in the creation of the county to believe that these detectives came up from Portland on their initiative, thinking that the contest, with the subsequent charges of fraud, would prove financially to their benefit, and when they had obtained what they thought to be information, went to Prineville and quoted a price for it. 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RADICAL CHANGE WANTED IN LAW

MORE SECURITY ASKED BY IRRIGATIONISTS.

Lien on District Works as Well as on Lands, is Innovation Proposed for Bond Purchasers—Warm Springs Issue Bought.

(Special to The Bulletin.)

Portland, Jan. 6.—Features of the latter part of the session yesterday of the Oregon Irrigation Congress, were the urging of necessity of necessity of state or federal backing for irrigation districts through bond guarantees. The district plan, even for federal projects, was advocated.

A committee consisting of Percy A. Cupper, assistant state engineer; Jay H. Upton, Alber E. Elder and O. Laugaard presented sweeping resolutions to be acted on this afternoon. The most radical change proposed was that bondholders shall have a lien on district works in addition to a lien on district lands. It was also urged that district bonds shall bear a circuit court certificate confirming the legality of the issue.

Roscoe Howard reported exhaustively on local operations of the Central Oregon Irrigation Co., while W. F. King described the Ochoco project.

The first bonds sold under the Oregon Irrigation District law were purchased today by the Lumbermen's Trust Co., when the issue on the Warm Springs project, in Malheur county, sold at four and three-quarters cents below par.

GOVERNORSHIP YET IN DOUBT

COURT PROCEEDINGS IN ARIZONA WILL NOT BE COMPLETED TO DECIDE ISSUE BEFORE THE LEGISLATURE CONVENES.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Jan. 6.—The condition of Arizona's politics is so chaotic that nobody knows who will be governor when the legislature meets Monday.

No one knows whether the administration, or anti-administration will dominate, as the administration is yet to be determined. No one knows anything about it, except that there is every indication of one of the liveliest sessions in the brief history of the baby state.

The governorship is at present tied up in the courts. Tom Campbell, republican, was elected by 30 votes over Governor George W. P. Hunt, on the face of the returns. Hunt is contesting, and despite every effort to speed up the case, it is almost certain that the recount and the court proceedings will not be completed in time for the inauguration of the new governor.

Campbell will seek to take his seat by virtue of the certified returns. Hunt will seek to have him restrained until the contest is decided.

This unusual situation is occupying the attention of politicians to the exclusion of plans for a legislative program. Neither the present nor the de-facto governor-elect have done anything toward preparing a message. The legislature is almost overwhelmingly democratic, but is almost equally divided between the Hunt and the anti-Hunt factions.

PEACE TERMS STILL OFFICIALLY UNTOLD

WIRTZ STATES HIS POSITION

HAS NO CONNECTION WITH DETECTIVES.

Says Same Kind of Irregularities Exist Everywhere—Only Matters to Which He Will Pay Attention are Vote Padding.

In a straightforward statement, appearing in this week's Crook County Journal, Willard H. Wirtz, district attorney for Crook county, makes it plain that he has no connection with the work of the detectives who have been seeking to uncover election irregularities in Bend.

Mr. Wirtz says that if such trivial matters as failure of an election official to follow all the red tape necessary in an election are to be investigated he will start at home, and with the number of such technical irregularities that are known to exist in other precincts the hunt would reach Bend about July 1.

Mr. Wirtz' statement follows:

"There have been no private detectives working in Crook county under the district attorney's office, investigating so-called election frauds at Bend or in any other precinct in the county. If the county is employing private detectives to ferret out so-called election frauds, it is being done under some other official.

No Election Probe.

"I have talked with no detectives regarding any election investigation and know nothing about the investigations being made until I saw an account of the presence of a Burns' detective in one of the Bend dailies on Tuesday of this week.

"If any evidence of election frauds has been uncovered, such evidence will be placed before the grand jury when it meets next Monday, but mere irregularities of election cannot be taken up and will not be taken up by my office.

"The failure of election officials to follow all the red tape provided by law has nothing whatever to do, in my opinion, with the qualifications of the voters. A qualified voter cannot be deprived of his vote merely because a registration official or clerk of an election has not signed his name to a printed oath on a card or piece of paper.

Technicalities Many.

"If such law violations are to be taken up by the grand jury, we will begin at home and we will not begin in the Bend precinct until the home precincts have been cleaned up, and when we have tried all the local violators of the election laws, we will work over toward Bend. From the number of such violations that have come to my attention we will get to the Bend precincts about the 1st of July, for I have yet to find a precinct, no matter how small, where there were not some irregularities, that might cause some, if not all, of the election officials of that precinct some trouble should the grand jury see fit to indict them for intentional and wilful and malicious violation of the law.

"However, if any detective has found where any voter repeated or where registration lists were padded or where there were gross frauds in the handling of returns by election officials which amounted to a wilful and malicious attempt to prevent the results, such cases will be taken up and prosecuted to the fullest extent, regardless of which prosecutions might affect."

FOREST PHONES OPEN TO PUBLIC

CHANGE IN POLICY ANNOUNCED BY SUPERVISOR HASTINGS TODAY, IN EFFECT EXCEPT IN FIRE SEASON.

A radical change in the policy of the forest service, in regard to the telephone lines through the national forests, was announced this morning by Supervisor Hastings, of the Deschutes National Forest. The change is to go into effect immediately, and will allow making of connections with the forest lines by private individuals, during that period outside the fire season.

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U. S. SHELL FIRM BIDS DENOUNCED

LOSS OF CONTRACT FOR HOME NAVY, TO ENGLISH FIRM, IS SCORED IN CONGRESS—HADFIELD DEPENDS ON PEACE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 6.—Advocates in Congress, of American manufacture of munitions, today denounced American makers of war supplies who were outbid \$200 per projectile by the British firm of Hadfield & Co., when the naval department bids for 16-inch shells were opened.

The shell contract specifies delivery within 16 months. Secretary Daniels announces that he is working on plans for a government projectile factory.

BIDS NOT SETTLED

LONDON, Jan. 6.—Bids for the manufacture of shells for American use by the English firm of Hadfield & Co., are contingent on the ending of the war. The Hadfield factories, as well as every other munition plant in the United Kingdom, are under government control, and will continue so, according to the present war policy, until a cessation of hostilities is declared.
