OLD RING GENERALS PICK RIVAL BOXERS FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—Within a short time Ruby Robert Fitzsimmons, former middleweight and heavy-weight champion, and James J. Corbett, former heavyweight champion, are expected to reach back into history, dig up the old moss-covered axes and begin their feud right where it left off.

The reason for the mediaeval inclination is found in an approaching contest between Billy Weeks and Roddy McDonald, middleweights from Canada. Each of them claims the Canadian middleweight championship and each made something of a record.

Corbett claims the equal of Billy Weeks, of Vancouver, B. C. does not live, while Fitz has selected McDonald to carry the Fitzsimmons standard in coming ring battles.

Fitz isn't given to raving over youngsters, but after having seen McDonald in action the one-time champion made the assertion that he expected the youngster to capture the middleweight championship.

Corbett already has made his statements regarding Weeks. Now he wants to see the two youngsters get together and decide who is the best picker.

McDonald is a native Canadian. Weeks was born in Boston and has spent most of his time in Western Canada. McDonald lived near Cape Breton in Nova Scotia. Each weighs about 155 pounds in good condition, and each stands about 5 feet eight inches high.

McDonald has already appeared in New York bouts, while Weeks started from Canada to work himself to this settlement.

Promoters already are angling for a match between the two.

BANK MESSENGER IS HELP UP FOR \$9,000

MRS. WILSON MAY NOW INVITE OWN GUESTS

First Lady of the Land Cuts Down Invitation Lists, Establishing New Social Precedent.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Mrs. Wilson today is the "ultimate authority" on all invitations to White House social functions. For the first time in years, a management of these events has been transferred from the executive offices to the mansion proper. As a result, the number of invited guests to the state events has fallen off between fifty and sixty per cent.

Incidentally the new regime has brought joy and peace to the minds of assistant secretaries in the business wing of the White House. In the past, the functions given by the President have been attended about equally by those on the regular White House lists and by those who request special invitations. Each reception is preceded by letters and phone calls from senators, congressmen and others, appealing in behalf of themselves and others, for precious cards of admission.

Now it's all changed. The assistants merely refer those asking invitations, directly to Mrs. Wilson, or her secretary, Miss Edith Benham. Hence the big reduction in guests, noted for the first time at the judicial reception.

WOMAN CHAMPION OF MINIMUM WAGE LAW

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 8.—Miss Clara Ruth Mozzer, the only woman assistant state's attorney general in the United States, appointed to the position in response to the demands of the women of this state, today started her campaign to force the democratic party to live up to its pledges and put through a minimum wage law for women at the present session of the state legislature.

The bill passed the last legislature and vetoed by the governor will be amended and reintroduced at this session. The most important changes in the bill, which is patterned after the Oregon law, will be the inclusion of piece workers as well as wage workers in the minimum, according to Miss Mozzer.

If the bill passes, all cases coming under the new law while she holds office will be turned over to Miss Mozzer.

BUSINESS INCREASES

Postal Figures for Last Month and Quarter Show Big Advance.

Figures gleaned from the quarterly and monthly report of Postmaster Henry B. Ford, just compiled for the period ending December 31, show that receipts for the past month are equal to two-thirds the value of the amount taken in in the entire last quarter of 1916. For the three months ending December 31 a year ago, receipts totalled \$3,219.93, while for December of the year just gone, \$2,071.51 measured the receipts.

During the last quarter of 1916, \$5,360.55 was taken in by the local office, and for the quarter preceding, \$4,056.23. November receipts for 1916 were \$1,777.39.

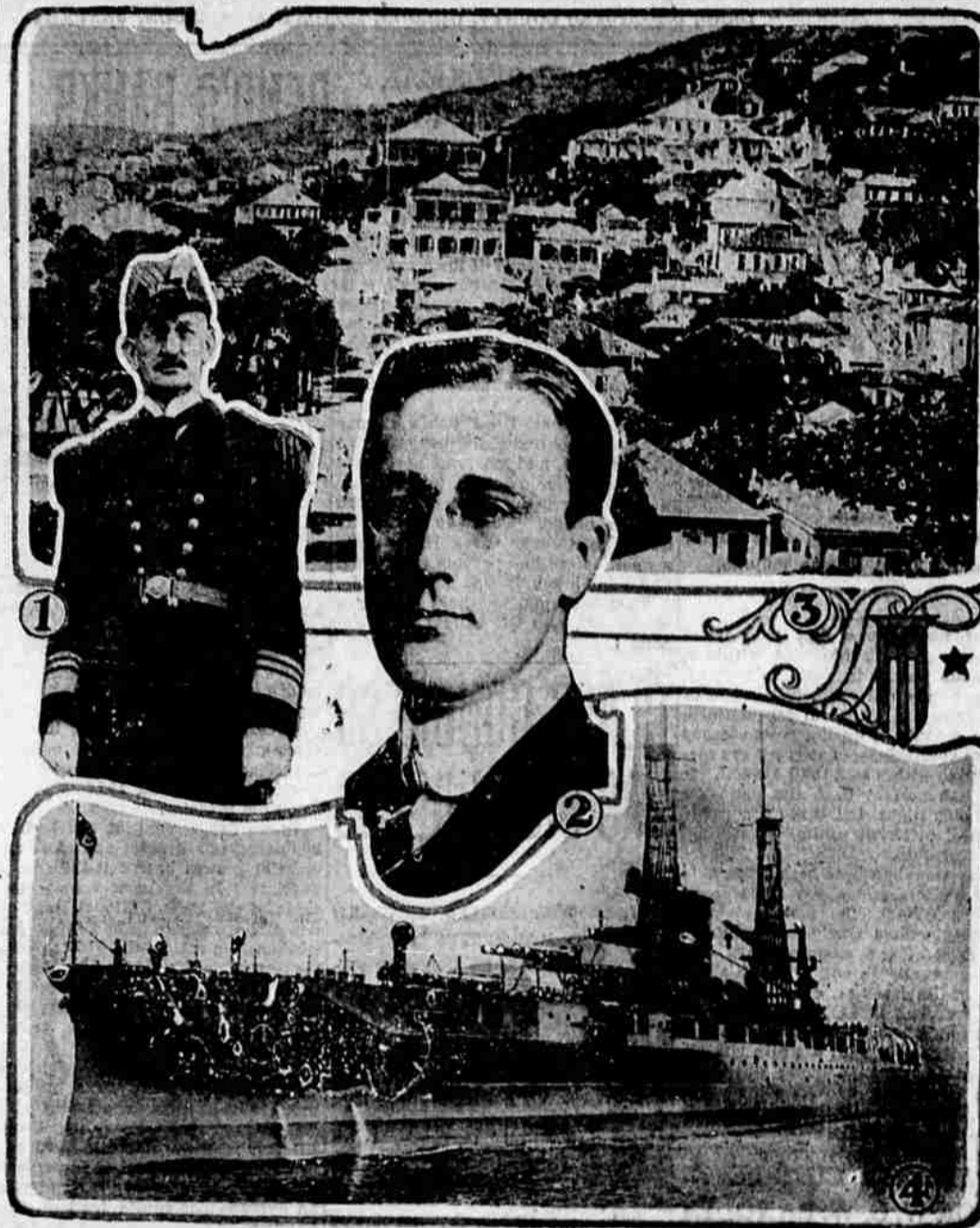

Plans for a great naval demonstration to signalize the American acquisition of the Danish West Indies are being considered by state and navy department officials. Probably the entire Atlantic fleet, headed by the flagship Pennsylvania (No. 4 in the pictures) and commanded by Admiral Mayo (No. 1), will be ordered to St.

Thomas (No. 3), the long sought naval base, to participate in the celebration. Minister Bruun of Denmark formally advised the state department that the treaty for the sale of the islands had been approved by King Christian and would be dispatched from Copenhagen on Dec. 30. It should reach here two weeks later for Secretary Lansing's signature.

The Atlantic fleet will mobilize at Guantanamo, Cuba, for winter maneuvers in January, and will be reviewed there by Assistant Secretary of the Navy Franklin D. Roosevelt (No. 2 in pictures). Mr. Roosevelt, who will be on his way to inspect the naval forces in Hayti and San Domingo, may take charge of the ceremonies at St. Thomas.
