SUPREME COURT HEARING ON TODAY FOR THE ADAMSON EIGHT HOUR LAW

(By United Press to The Daily Bulletin)
 WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 8.—Whether the people of the United States again will face a national railroad strike depends on the supreme court's decision as to the law's constitutionality, argument of which is being made before that tribunal here today.
 The governmental and industrial crisis of which this law is the outgrowth is looked upon by leaders as a concrete showdown between the powers of labor and those of capital.
 The Adamson measure was rushed through congress last summer by President Wilson to ward off a strike by 400,000 railroad workers that would have tied up transportation in this country and gave promise of leading to conditions verging on civil war. This strike menace has not yet been obviated.
 At the top of the calendar of the United States supreme court today was the case—No. 797; Francis M. Wilson, United States attorney for the western district of Missouri, vs. Alexander New and Henry C. Ferris, receivers of the Missouri, Oklahoma

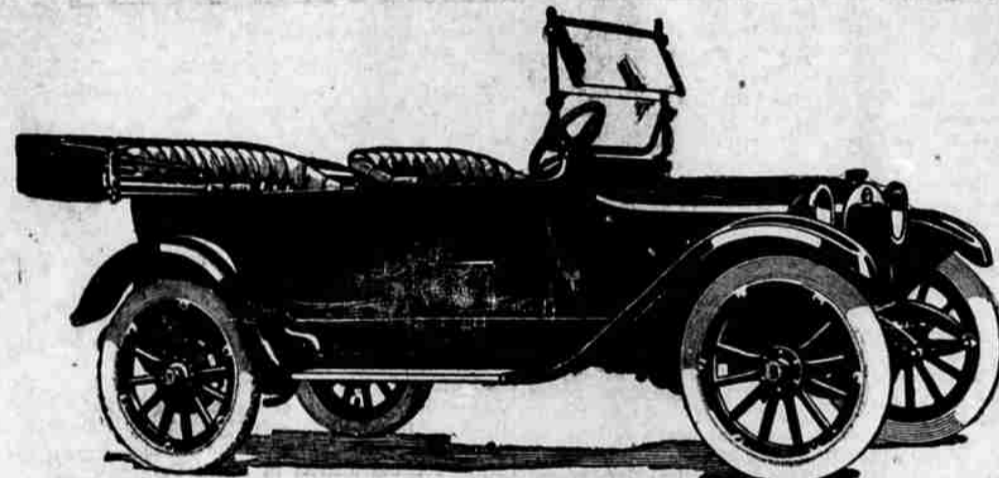
