REVIVAL SERVICES PROVING EFFECTIVE

Fourteen Converts Made by Evangelist Dr. Elwood Lyon, Last Night —"Old Homestead," Subject.

The effectiveness of the union services was shown last night, when at the meeting conducted by Dr. Elwood Lyon, 14 converts were made, the largest number at any of the meetings held so far. The evangelist spoke on the subject, "The Old Homestead," introducing his remarks by a description of a New England home stead.

He utilized the story of the Prodigal Son again in his sermon. "There are more people," he said, "to invite a young man to sin and shame than there are to help him to a life of purity and happiness."

In his afternoon lecture on the Book of Esther, Dr. Lyon emphasized the prominence of the Jewish people in world affairs. "Some of the most prominent places among all nations have been held by Jews," he declared. "The first 600 highest award medals given by Russia in the present war, went to Jews. They are learning the army tactics of the world, and will use them some time in self defense."

APPLICATIONS MANY ON ANIMAL BOUNTIES

Hunters Coming in From Outside Counties Expecting Revenue From Rabbit Scalps.

Applications are becoming more and more numerous for bounties on coyotes and jackrabbits, is the report of County Clerk Haner, who states not only are they being presented by residents of the county, but that hunters living in other parts of the state are coming here with the intention of making money during the winter on rabbit scalps.

No bounties are being paid, however, as the county has as yet no funds at its disposal, and as no warrant issue has been authorized by the county court.

Mr. Haner declares that in any event he would refuse payment on rabbits while the bounty law is in question.

I could get my hands in it a lot better, and ate faster. Finally, I got tired sitting in that position, so I leaned over a little bit farther, and of course fell in head first. I struggled, but all in vain. I heard mother calling me, then she heard me in the pantry. She pushed at the door and it opened. Well, you know what little boys get. That is what I got. That is the last time I have been in the pantry without asking my mother.

TRAIL HITTERS WILL INVADE METROPOLIS

Preparations for Billy Sunday Revivals in New York City to Begin Tomorrow.

(United Press Staff Correspondent.) NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—The Billy Sunday cocktail is being mixed here today and will be served at a thousand different places in New York tomorrow.

This cocktail is made of seasoned Sunday trail hitters. There'll be a thousand of them from Philadelphia, and others from elsewhere. Most of the Philadelphians will be of seven year vintage and bottled in unbroken religious bonds.

The idea is to serve this cocktail to New York tomorrow and several others of the same kind, to whet the public's appetite for the big religious feast when Billy cuts loose here April 1. The Billy Sunday cocktail is made like this:

Take one made-over, old-line churchman, mix him thoroughly with ex-saloon-keepers (preferred); add two plain trail hitters (burglars and one Bible class expert, bring them to a boil and serve red hot to the sinners.

The "invasion" will take the form of community and church meetings. It will be under the direction of the Rev. George G. Dowle, leader of the Philadelphia Bible classes.

One of the big attractions probably will be Al Saunders, of Scranton, Pa., a trail hitter as fiery of hair, mustache and manner as the booze he used to consume. It is said that John D. Rockefeller, Jr., wept the first time he heard Saunders tell his story.

This is the first step the Sunday campaigners will take in their plans to develop atmosphere for the evangelist's coming.

AMERICAN RANCH IN MEXICO HAS ARMY

Force of 200 Private Soldiers Do Excellent Work Against Forces of Pancho Villa.

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Chih., Mex., Jan. 13.—For the protection of the two million acre American owned Babicora ranch, permission to maintain a private "feudal" army has been granted by de facto government officials. Two hundred men are armed today to defend the properties against bandit forays.

In the month the private army has been in existence, they have engaged marauding bands three times and killed or captured and turned over to Carranza authorities 28 bandits. Colonel Rosaria Garcia and two followers, bearing messages to Villa were bagged by the Babicora army and executed here by a firing squad a few weeks ago.

John Hayes, American manager of the ranch, estimates the losses in the last 24 months at 25,000 head of cattle, 1,000 horses and mules, 35,000 bushels of corn and beans burned and an equal amount confiscated or stolen; and three Americans and 20 natives slain.

THAW'S MOTHER TO WATCH AT BEDSIDE

Will Remain Until Preliminary Examination is Completed—Attempted Suicide Better.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 13.—Harry K. Thaw's mother today announced her intention of taking a suite of rooms near St. Mary's hospital where her son is confined, following his attempted suicide. She intends to remain at his bedside until the preliminary examination is completed.

It is reported that the New York district attorney is attempting to make alleged conspirators confess and turn state's evidence. Thaw was much better this afternoon.
