**Cooper in mood for fun, games before flight**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—Astronaut L. Gordon Cooper, only a few hours away from a long journey into space, found himself in the mood for "fun and games."

Cooper, at 36 the youngest of the original Mercury astronauts, took out his preflight humor on official photographers of the space agency.

Cooper and fellow astronauts Walter M. Schirra Jr. and Donald (Deke) Slayton took the light-bulbs out of a special unit set up for the photographers in Hangar S, Cooper's temporary quarters. They taped the contacts and put the bulbs back into the socket.

To make sure of their prank, they fouled the wires in the light switches.

When the photographers arrived to take pool pictures for newsmen inside Hangar S, they had no floodlights.

Technicians, however, quickly corrected the difficulty and Cooper's preflight preparations were duly recorded for posterity.

"There's been fun and games in the crew quarters," reported the Project Mercury information officer, Lt. Col. John A. (Shorty) Powers.

**House in uproar over move to up national debt limit**

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The House, which has voted for programs that keep running the government into the red, was in an uproar today over an administration attempt to raise the legal limit on the national debt.

House leaders called up a bill that would allow the Treasury to borrow the money it says is needed to pay the government's bills through August. Despite GOP opposition Democratic leaders were confident the legislation would narrowly pass the House.

The debt now stands at about \$303.5 billion and all agree it is going higher. But the debt ceiling of \$305 billion is scheduled under existing law to drop to \$300 billion on June 25 and to \$285 billion on July 1.

The administration-backed bill which is a stop-gap measure would boost the limit to \$307 billion through June 30 and fix it at \$309 billion during July and August.

A substitute bill backed by Republican leaders would continue the present \$305 billion limit indefinitely. Republicans insisted the administration could get by

under this ceiling, if it curtailed the rate of federal spending.

The GOP substitute appeared certain to be rejected, leaving the House a choice between embracing the Democratic proposal or doing nothing.

Some conservative southern Democrats, who have opposed President Kennedy in his previous battles with House Republicans this year, were ready to support him on the debt limit issue.

Among them was Rep. A. S. Herlong, D-Fla., who felt that it would be irresponsible for Congress after voting for programs and services to refuse to let the Treasury borrow the money needed to pay the bills.

The old, narrow bridge across the Metolius River at Camp Sherman is to be replaced by a modern structure, with bids for the project to be opened in the office of the U.S. Forest Service, Portland, at 3 p.m., on June 3.

Plans call for completion of the project this summer.

The new span, supported by 14 beams of prestressed concrete, will be 22 feet wide and 71.6 feet long. The project calls for 34.7 cubic yards of concrete. Wooden hand rails are planned.

The old span to be replaced is known to many as the "fish bridge." There thousands of visitors to the Metolius area seasonally view the big trout in the protected area.

A copy of the bid and plans for the project may be obtained from the Deschutes National Forest headquarters office, at 745 Bond Street in Bend.

**Money provided for migrants**

SALEM (UPI)—The Ways and Means Education subcommittee backtracked on an earlier action Tuesday and decided to provide some money for migrant children.

The committee earlier had decided to discontinue state aid for the program, pegged at \$142,000 for the next biennium.

That decision was based on a shortage of state dollars for other special education programs, and on a policy decision that such programs should be taken over by the local districts.

Tuesday, however, the subcommittee reacted to an appeal from Sen. Don Willner, D-Portland, by restoring \$50,000 for a summer program for migrant children.

Willner said Oregon's program of education for migrant youngsters has been "extraordinarily successful and economical."

The subcommittee voted a re-vamp of the basic school fund, but decided to leave basic school money as a continuing appropriation that school districts can count on in subsequent years without

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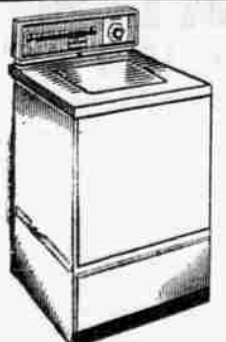
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**New bridge is planned**

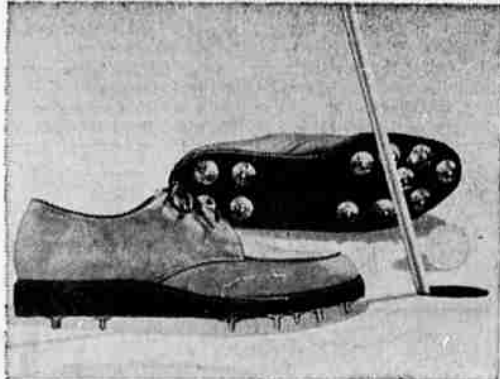
