Log shipment measure inked

SALEM (UPI)—Permits will be available for shipping surplus logs abroad for sale under a bill signed Wednesday by Gov. Mark Hatfield.

It amends a 1961 law that prohibited the sale abroad of raw logs cut from state or county lands. The intent was to have Oregon mills do the primary processing.

Since the law was passed, however, some logs in some areas have been in oversupply.

The bill grants an outright exemption for Port Orford white cedar, which is in demand abroad but not in Oregon.

It will permit the sale of other raw logs abroad only after a lack of demand was shown for the logs in Oregon. The foreign sales will be controlled through an export permit system under the Forestry Department.

Union requests tax reduction

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI) — The AFL-CIO Executive Council has asked Congress to pass an immediate \$10 billion tax reduction for lower and middle income families and at the same time to increase federal spending.

The Economic Policy Committee of the council in annual session said Wednesday such a tax cut would result in higher incomes by families which would immediately be put back into the economy and result in further spending.

Further, the statement said, "any tax reduction policy that fails to concentrate its benefits among low-and-middle income taxpayers — that fails to focus on creating jobs and reducing unemployment—will be opposed by organized labor."

The council, in its resolution, also said any tax reduction should not be accompanied by reduced federal spending.

"Since the top priority objective is to get Americans back to work, the AFL-CIO is unalterably opposed to any effort to accompany tax reduction with cuts in the general level of federal expenditures."

RELEASE PRISONERS

TOKYO (UPI) — Communist China released 333 Indian prisoners of war Wednesday, the New China news agency said in a broadcast monitored here.

The Communist agency said the prisoners, captured during Sino-Indian border fighting last year, were released "in the Tibet region on the northern side of Bang Pass." New China also said that 498 more Indian prisoners will be released Monday.

Democrats push debt ceiling up

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy today still boasted an undefeated 1963 record in his battles with House Republicans. But only because Democrats rallied to his support in unprecedented numbers to pass a measure hiking the national debt ceiling.

Administration forces overruled almost solid Republican opposition of the bill to boost the \$305 billion ceiling on the debt for a new record high.

With only 17 members not voting, the bill squeaked through on a vote of 213-204. Republicans opposed it 212-32.

The House-passed bill would permit the national debt to climb to a new record high next month so the government can keep paying its bills.

The debt now stands at \$303.5 billion. According to Treasury projections, it will surge in mid-June more than \$1 billion above the record high \$305.5 billion peak reached last Nov. 30.

The debt now is subject to a legal ceiling of \$305 billion which drops under existing law to \$300 billion on June 25. The stop-gap legislation, which the House sent to the Senate, would boost this level limit to \$307 billion through June 30 and set it at \$309 billion during July and August.

The Treasury has told Congress the debt limit will have to be raised again — possibly to \$320 billion — to accommodate the deficit spending in prospect after August, particularly in view of the tax cut President Kennedy wants enacted this year.

CHECK TRAINING PROGRAM
WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Labor Department plans to form a committee to look into discrimination in federally-approved apprenticeship programs.

John F. Henning, undersecretary of labor, said Wednesday that some parties were not following the rule that there would be no discrimination in about 7,000 apprenticeship and training programs operated by the Labor Department and industry.

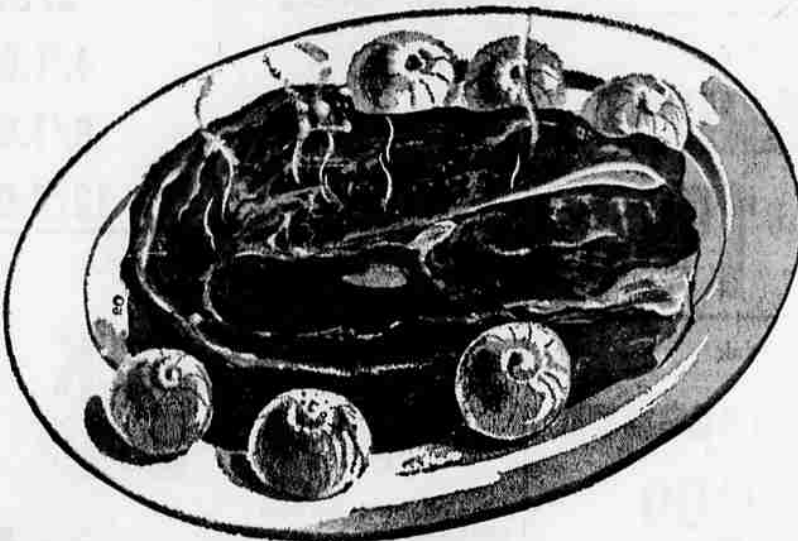
