City Commission gets objections to city ordinance against horses

At least 15 visiting residents raised objections to a city ordinance last night when Bend city commissioners assembled for their bi-monthly meeting in city hall.

They were concerned with a restrictive ruling requiring horse owners who live inside city limits to maintain 1/2 of an acre for each horse, and enclose the pasture 30 feet back from their property lines on all sides. The general feeling among objectors was that this ordinance would force the removal of all horses from the city, without good cause.

Lloyd Reed, who heads the 4-H Rim Rock Riders Club, told the board that 50 per cent of his members live inside the city. He claimed his youngsters should have close contact with their horses.

Dr. Joe Winter, of 81 Oregon Avenue, reminded commissioners that the ruling would almost eliminate the traditional "western" atmosphere of Bend. He added, further, that a horse doesn't need the amount of roaming space specified in the ordinance.

A third complaint was voiced by Dr. Lowell Aplin, 1012 Wall Street, who cited the importance of the Rim Rock Riders' participation in the Fourth of July parade and other annual events. One unidentified woman advised that, so far as odors were concerned, only a dirty corral would raise offensive smells.

Commissioners, however, determined that none of the arguments presented was sufficiently valid to warrant repealing of the ordinance at this time. A motion was carried to let horse owners draft their own model ordinance and submit it to the board within 60 days.

New Zip code put in operation by Post Office

Details of the Post Office Department's new Zip code program that becomes effective for use by mailers on July 1 have been outlined by Farley J. Elliott, Bend postmaster.

Five digit numbers are currently being assigned to every post office and city delivery zone in the country. One of the nine Oregon divisions is being termed the Bend zone, with "977" the local zone number.

Elliott said the system will make it possible for businesses to pre-sort mail by existing automatic date processing equipment with little additional effort or cost, but with great savings in time and expense to the Post Office Department. Better delivery of mail is expected.

The Zip coded mail will be able to bypass as many as six current hand operations and will lay the ground work for extensive automatic sorting of mail by optical reading equipment in the future.

Bend is one of 552 cities in the country designated as "sectional center" as part of the transportation and mail distribution pattern which will make possible use of the Zip code.

The Zip code program takes its name from Zoning Improvement Plan.

Asked to name the man orbiting the earth Wednesday, one tyke replied: "Mr. Rocketfeller."



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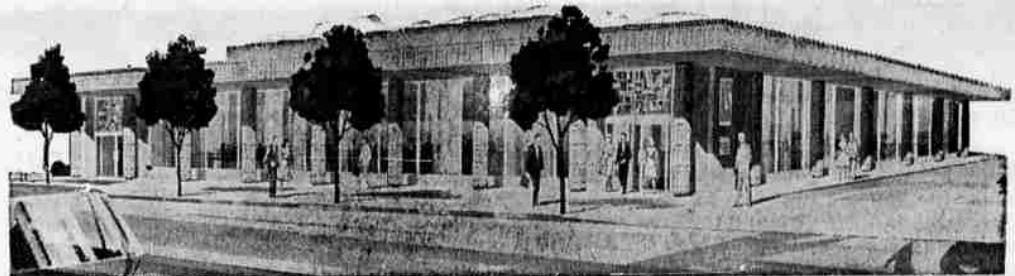
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
