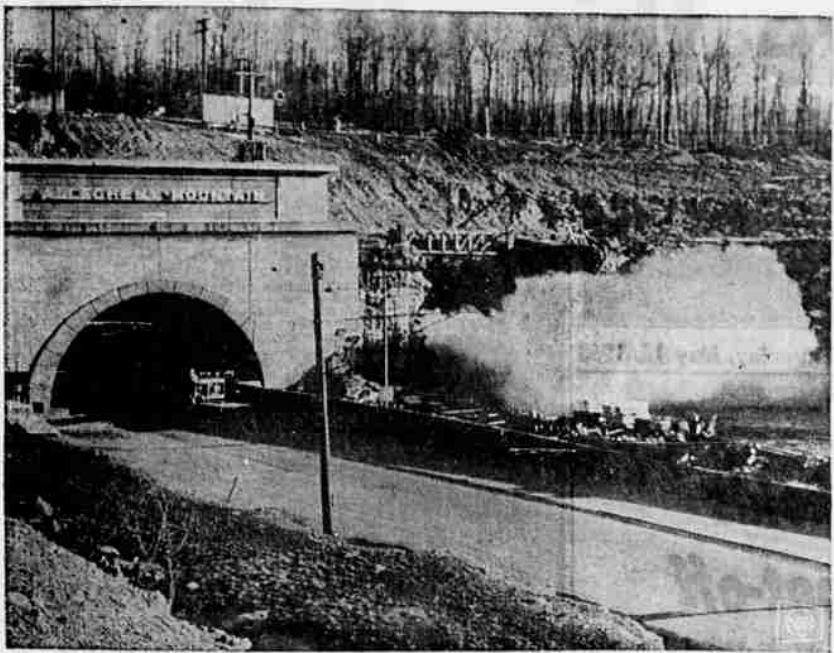




BLASTING THROUGH A MOUNTAIN—Pennsylvania Turnpike's second tunnel through Allegheny Mountain is being drilled and blasted 125-feet south of the existing tunnel, in use since 1940 when the nation's first turnpike was opened. Traffic is halted briefly in the present tunnel during six blasts a day. Turnpike commission hopes the double tunnels will be able to handle much of the traffic to and from the New York World's Fair in 1964.

Forage study session held

FORT ROCK — Don Hedrick of Oregon State University and Bill Moser, Lake County Extension Agent, met here May 10 with local rancher R. A. (Rube) Long to initiate the next step in a forage utilization study.

The purpose of the study is to determine what might be the best method of utilizing crested wheatgrass. The 48 acre tract on Long's Bureau of Land Management grazing allotment is divided into four equal pastures. Six heifers have been placed in each of two of the plots. The first of June a new pattern will be established, depending on the remaining feed supply and the study plan. The experiment will include feasibility of two periods of use.

The animals were weighed before their assignment to the tracts and will be again weighed at each change in the study.

Study plans were made by Hedrick about three years ago. Following the beating of the brush came the seeding. Planting included a legume which failed to grow. It is still undecided whether to try to re-establish a legume. Spraying of sagebrush followed re-growth, and fencing was a necessity. Last came the cross fencing to establish four 12-acre sites.

Taking part in the study at various stages have been Hedrick, Moser and Oris Rudd, Lake County Extension agents; Bill Currier, then representing the U.S. Forest Service; Everett Green and Jack Gillette, Soil Conservation Service technicians and BLM range specialists.

Strike authority given by union

PORTLAND (UPI) — Members of the International Woodworkers of America (IWA) have voted overwhelmingly to authorize negotiators to call a strike if talks for new contracts with lumber industry representatives break down, it was announced Wednesday.

Present contracts expire June 1. Harvey Nelson, regional IWA president, said the vote was 15,634 to 2,147. He said the vote represented about 80 per cent of the workers in local unions participating in regional negotiations.

An estimated 26,000 IWA members are involved.

The union has asked a 40-cent hourly wage increase, with 20 cents this year and 10 cents in each of the next two years. It also asked higher pay for some skilled classifications, travel time for loggers and some pension plan revisions.

Negotiations with one employer group, Timber Operators Council, are scheduled to resume Thursday and Friday here. Negotiations also are scheduled with the Simpson Timber Co. on May 22.
