

State Class B track test here this weekend

3 records
in jeopardy;
185 to compete

Competitors, parents, fans and coaches from Class B high schools all over the State of Oregon will be in Bend this weekend for the giant Class B track regalia for 1963.

Oregon's State Class B High School Track Meet will be held in Bend at new Bruin Field. Friday will see the preliminaries, and Saturday the finals.

Over 185 athletes will compete in the annual track and field test that is being sponsored jointly this year by the Bend School system and the Bend Chamber of Commerce. Previously, it was held mostly in Springfield, and occasionally at Corvallis.

Last year's top three team winners will be back for more honors, and to outdo their 1962 performances. Corbett is defending champion. Camas Valley was last year's runnerup and Elgin, third.

In order to qualify for the state meet, the athletes must take either first or second in their events during their own district run-offs. Only two from each district are allowed in any one event. There are eight districts, resulting in 16 competitors in each event.

In order to handle all of the competing athletes fairly, the meet will be run off in heats and flights. Only one from each district shall be allowed in any one heat or flight. Seedings for lanes or field positions are assigned according to the participants' past performances. In order to get the best possible performance out of top athletes, the recorded better competitors get the better lanes.

This year's scheduling is tight, but should go according to the slate, a glance at the time table reveals. The preliminaries for the field events start at 4:30 p.m., Friday, while the running events start at 6.

A quick look at the submitted times and distances recorded on the entry sheets as compared with the standing records for those events, suggests that there is an excellent chance that at least three of events will see shattered records.

One case in point is the high jump. The standing record is 5' 11 1/4". Two men have gone over six feet this year. W. Fredericks of Oakland has gone 6' 1", and E. Lewis of Colton has leaped 6' 2". Most of the jumpers, however, have old marks 5' 6" or below.

King Spain of Union may top the 120-yard high hurdle mark. So far this year, he has topped the high timbers in 15.2 seconds. The record is 15.0. R. Hager of Corbett looms as a potential record breaker, too, as he has covered the distance in 15.5 seconds.

Another mark that might tumble is the pole vault standard of 12' 3" which Pat Farley of Arlington set in 1960 at Springfield. D. Hunt of Knappa has cleared the bar at 12' 0" so far this season. Two others have made it over 11' 9". P. Albin of Crane is one, and the other is T. Heimbigner of Ione.

In other contests, however, some real battles are shaping up. It looks like a three-way fracas for 100-yard dash honors. R. Rice of Bonanza has run the century in 10.1. M. Burnett of Bonanza has a 10.2 mark, G. Miller of Wal-lowa has a 10.3, and M. K. A. B. Powers, and K. Morton, Cove, are at the 10.4 mark.

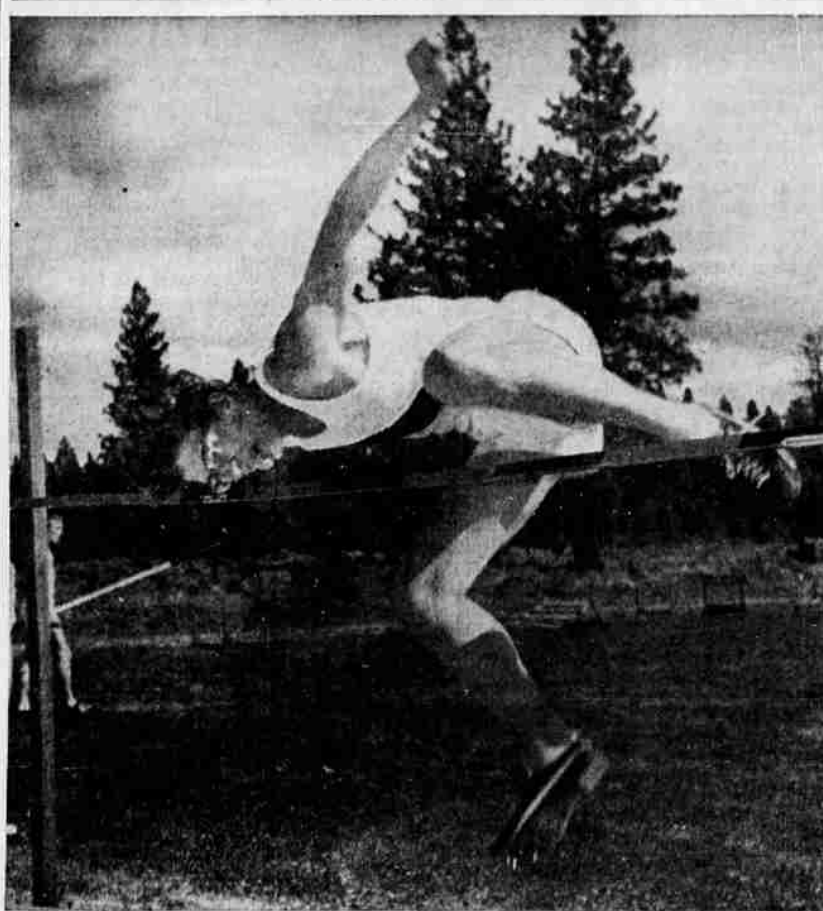
In the 440-yard dash it looks as if it could be a four-way contest between: M. Burnett, Bonanza (52.5), J. Archer, Oakland (53.1), T. Volkman, Camas Valley (53.0), and K. Hale, Chiloquin (53.2). Allen Gail of Gates set the current 50.9 mark in 1963 at Corvallis.

In the mile run, beating the record is not in the cards. The old mark will probably stand at 4:29.9. It was set last year by Terry Smith of McEwen High School (Athena) in Springfield. Two men will probably fight it out for first honors. J. McCray of Powers holds a 4:46.3, and T. Smith of McEwen holds the best time at 4:36.5.

In the 800, it looks close. R. Lawson of Camas Valley holds a time of 2:03.5 minutes. T. Smith of McEwen has run it in 2:05.4, and R. Duntin, Crane, has covered the four laps in 2:06.

A real battle is shaping up in the 800-yard relay, although there is little probability that the standing time mark will be broken. Pilot Rock set it in 1961 at Corvallis when they toured the distance in 1:34.5 minutes.

Four teams this year have run it under the 1:37.0 mark. Powers has a 1:36.6, and so does Wal-lowa. Corbett is a shade behind with a time of 1:36.8, while Camas Valley has posted a 1:36.9.

Koufax dashes no-hitter myth, pitches true

Sandy Koufax exposed one of baseball's oldest myths today by proving a pitcher doesn't necessarily have to take his lumps the next time out after a no-hitter.

Down through the years relatively few major league pitchers have managed to go the distance in their next game following a no-hit performance.

Koufax, who hurled a no-hitter against the San Francisco Giants last Saturday night, not only went nine innings Wednesday night but did better than that, going 12 while leading the Los Angeles Dodgers to a 3-2 extraordinary triumph over the Philadelphia Phillies.

The southpaw fastballer gave up 11 hits but struck out 12 and did not walk a man. It was only the second time in his major league career that he did not give up a walk during an entire game.

Ron Fairly provided Koufax with his fifth victory by singling home Jim Gilliam from second base in the bottom of the 12th. Reliever Johnny Klippstein had retired 14 straight batters before Gilliam singled in the 12th and moved up to second base on Bob Ollis' passed ball.

Elsewhere in the National League, the Milwaukee Braves defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 9-3, the league-leading San Francisco Giants shaded the Pittsburgh Pirates 4-3, the Cincinnati Reds crushed the Chicago Cubs 10-2, and the New York Mets snapped the Houston Colts' six-game winning streak 7-4.

In the American League, the first-place Chicago White Sox topped the Detroit Tigers 7-4, the Boston Red Sox took two from the Los Angeles Angels 9-3 and 7-6, the Cleveland Indians beat the Kansas City A's 1-0, the New York Yankees downed the Minnesota Twins 4-3, and the Baltimore Orioles defeated the Wash-

ington Senators 7-1.

Bob Hendley of the Braves held the Cardinals hitless for 8 1/3 innings before Curt Flood tripled. The Milwaukee southpaw gave up two more hits in the ninth and settled for a three-hitter and his fourth victory. Denis Menke connected for his fourth homer of the year off Curt Simmons, who lost his first game after five straight victories.

Held To Four Hits

The Giants were limited to four hits by loser Don Cardwell and two Pirate relievers but rallied for four runs in the fifth to win. Cardwell, now 1-5, walked winning pitcher Juan Marichal (5-3) with the bases full in the fifth and hit Felipe Alou with a pitch to force in another run. An error by third baseman Bob Bailey on Willie Mays' hard smash produced two more runs.

U.S. against Yugoslavia in final round

RIO DE JANEIRO (UPI)—The powerful United States squad, unbeaten in three preliminary round games, will be pitted against Yugoslavia tonight when the final round-robin series begins in the world amateur basketball championship.

Brazil, which drew a bye into the finals because it is the defending champion, swings into action against Puerto Rico and the Soviet Union faces France.

Italy, the seventh team to gain the final round, will not resume play until Friday night when it faces Brazil while the United States will take on the Russians in what shapes up as a crucial match.

Team No. 4 emerged the winner last week, when they had a shoot-off against team No. 6. The whole affair was narrowed down

to two the week before, when team No. 9 was knotted with 4 and 6 for first place honors.

Entries close for Preakness

BALTIMORE (UPI)—Entries for Saturday's 87th running of the \$150,000 added Preakness Stakes close today with Darby Dan Farm's Chateaugay, the Kentucky Derby winner, named ahead of time just as he was at Churchill Downs two weeks ago.

Trainer Jimmy Conway, who had to leave for New York Wednesday, filed the entry before he left "just so there will be no slip-up."

And when the box closes, the names of Candy Spots, Never Bend, Sky Wonder, On My Honor, Lemon Twist and Country Squire are expected to join that of Chateaugay, completing the field of seven.

Although he won the Kentucky Derby by a length and one-half, Chateaugay once again finds himself east in the role of underdog. For Candy Spots, third in the Kentucky Derby, is pre-race favorite at 7-5 with Never Bend, second at Churchill Downs, second choice at 2-1. Chateaugay ranks third at 5-2.

Candy Spots, winner of the Santa Anita derby and the Florida Derby this year, suffered his only defeat in the Kentucky Derby, many observers blaming jockey Willie Shoemaker for his third place finish.

Shoemaker again rides the son of Nigromante, who now boasts six wins in seven races.

Never Bend, winner of the Flamingo Stakes and the champion juvenile of 1962, will be ridden by Manny Ycaza. The colt is ranked better than Chateaugay because several of his races prior to the Kentucky Derby were easy victories and he is expected to improve with a tough race now behind him.

Sempert new L & C coach

PORTLAND (UPI)—Dean Sempert has been named basketball coach at Lewis and Clark College, president John R. Howard announced today.

Sempert graduated from the Portland school in 1949 after winning all - Northwest Conference honors. He has been head coach at Mira Costa High School in Redondo Beach, Calif., for the past eight years and compiled a 132-63 record.

Sempert succeeds Jim Goddard, who resigned recently to become head coach at the University of Idaho.
