

# Rainier pitch eyes Bosox, humbles Pads

For Wilbur Wood, the step from the Pacific Coast League to the majors is as long as the trip from Seattle to Boston, and the young Rainier southpaw is closing that distance just about every time he walks to the mound.

The 21-year-old native of Belmont, Mass., was signed by the Red Sox in 1960 just after being named the outstanding high school hurler in the greater Boston area.

He saw action in a Red Sox uniform briefly at the end of the last two seasons, and he may be wearing that uniform on a more permanent basis if he continues

to pitch as he did Wednesday. Wood held San Diego to six hits and picked up his fourth straight victory as the Rainiers blanked the Padres 4-0. Wood fanned eight men and showed perfect control in not walking a batter.

## Other Games

In other action around the league, George Williams' home run sparked a four-run rally by Oklahoma City that carried the 89ers to a 7-3 victory over Denver, Hawaii blasted out of a long batting slump with 17 hits to turn back Portland 9-3, the Dallas-Fort Worth Rangers used the home run ball to defeat Salt Lake City 9-5 and superb relief pitching by Ken Rowe preserved Spokane's 6-4 victory over Tacoma.

Wood got all the offensive support he needed from teammate Billy Harrell who drove in three runs with two singles and a sacrifice fly.

Oklahoma City and Denver were deadlocked 3-3 when Williams smashed his home run with two men on base to ignite a four-run outburst by the 89ers in the seventh.

Johnny Weekly had accounted for all three Oklahoma City runs in the early innings with three hits. Starter Ben Johnson, who left the game for a pinch hitter in the seventh, was credited with the victory, his second in three decisions.

## Bernier Leads Islanders

Veteran Carlos Bernier made the most noise in Hawaii's hitting spree with five hits in five trips, including a bases-empty home run. Chuck Dees also got into the act for the Islanders with four safeties and two RBIs.

Hawaii starter Ed Thomas was working on a no-hitter until Portland's Jay Hankins dropped a double down the left field line with one out in the seventh inning.

Joe Christian, George Banks and Ray Jablonski led Dallas-Fort Worth's home run parade against Denver. Christian's four-bagger ignited a four-run rally in the first inning, and Banks' and Jablonski's home runs came during a four-run outburst in the fifth.

Ranger starter Mary Mecklenburg survived a four-run spurt by the Bees in the eighth and went the distance for his second win in three decisions.

The Spokane Indians got off to a quick 6-0 lead before Tacoma started whittling it down with three runs in the third and one in the sixth.

When the Giants Jim Hart walked to lead off the eighth, Rowe was called in from the bullpen to relieve starter Norm Koch. Rowe struck out the side in the eighth and retired the Giants in order in the ninth to preserve the victory for Koch.

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## Final respects to 'Big Daddy'

DETROIT (UPI) — Relatives, friends, players and fans paid their final respects to Gene (Big Daddy) Lipscomb Wednesday.

An overflow crowd that spilled out onto the lawn of a local funeral home attended the funeral for the 290-pound giant who came off the Detroit sandlots to become one of the National Football League's most feared and yet best liked players.

The honorary bearers who attended were Art Rooney, the owner of the Pittsburgh Steelers, the team that Lipscomb played his last game for, Rooney's son Dan, and Don Kellert, the general manager of the Baltimore Colts.

Lipscomb achieved his greatest fame while helping the Colts win two straight NFL titles in 1958 and '59 and earning recognition as the game's top defensive tackle.

Many of the NFL's top standouts who played both with and against Lipscomb also attended. The pallbearers were six football players — John Henry Johnson, John Sample, Lenny Moore, Jim Parker, Dick (Night Train) Lane and Sherman Plunkett.

Lipscomb, who was one of the few NFL standouts who didn't play college ball, was discovered by the Los Angeles Rams while playing Marine ball. He didn't make it big until traded to the Colts in 1956. He was traded to Pittsburgh in 1961.

In Baltimore Wednesday, doctors reported that Lipscomb's death last Friday was due to an overdose of heroin.

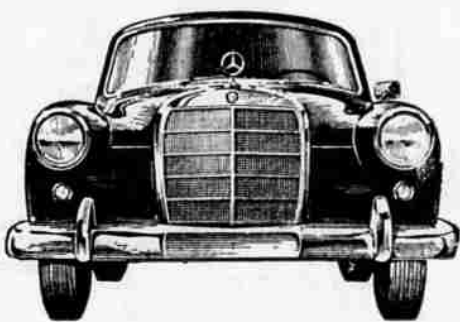

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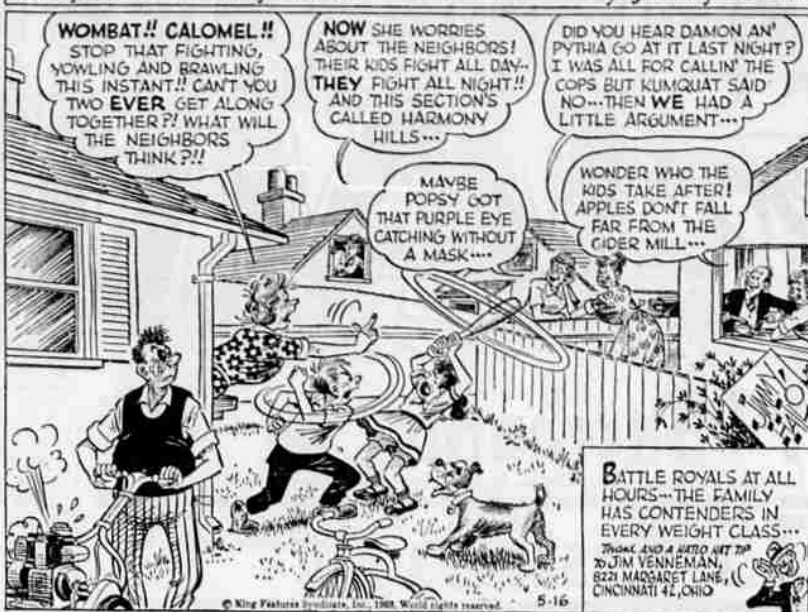

## Herds vary

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## Releases game count data

PORTLAND — Just over 45,800 mule and black-tailed deer were tallied by district biologists of the Oregon State Game Commission on 5,300 miles of sample routes during late winter and spring in a recent annual study.

Effort was made to determine trends in the big game population. The mules travelled were covered on foot, horseback, automobile, and airplane. The only herd on which data is incomplete is the interstate herd. The count here will continue for two or three weeks yet as the herd migrates from California to Oregon.

On a state-wide basis, blacktail deer trends were up slightly from a year ago, while mule deer trends were down slightly from a year ago.

On 2,149 miles of sample route on the blacktail ranges the deer observed averaged out a 5.0 deer per mile compared to 4.8 deer per mile in 1962. Mule deer trends in eastern Oregon averaged out at 11.1 deer per mile compared to 11.9 a year ago. Inventories were made on 3,159 miles of sample route on mule deer winter ranges.

Biologists pointed out that fluctuations occurred on most ranges with some above the trends of 1962, while others were below the trends of 1962. Also reported was the widespread dispersal of big game on most ranges throughout the winter.

In addition, many animals spent the winter high in the mountains on their normal summer ranges. Game officials feel the wide dispersal at high elevations may have influenced the trend counts on some ranges since most of the

permanent sample routes do not extend into big game summer areas.

In Central Oregon, mule deer numbers showed a drop from 7.5 deer per mile in 1962 to 6.5 deer per mile in 1963. The 1963 trend was identical to the tally per mile in 1961.

Again, mule deer herds were up in the Sprague, Ochoco and Maupin units, and down slightly in the Deschutes, Grizzly, Klamath, Maury, Metolius and Paulina units.

Fawn production and survival in the Paulina unit was only 45 fawns per 100 does, 44 in the Metolius, 47 in the Maury unit, 54 in the Grizzly country, and 50 in the Deschutes unit. Even in the better units in Central Oregon, fawn production was considered low.

Northeastern Oregon region averaged out at 13.1 deer per mile compared to 13.4 a year ago. Al-

though fluctuations occurred on several ranges, fawn production and survival was recorded low on only two units, the Baker unit with 33 fawns per 100 does and Murderer's Creek with 56 fawns per 100 does. Fawn production and survival was considered good to excellent on all other ranges in northeastern Oregon.

Down slightly from last year but above the 1960 level was the Fort Rock unit. Malheur and Owyhee units were down from last year, again reflecting two years of very poor fawn production. The Silvies and Warner units were down slightly from a year ago.

Populations of Rocky Mountain elk were almost identical to that of a year ago, averaging out at 3.7 elk per mile compared to 6.0 a year ago. Fluctuations were noted on all eastern Oregon ranges. Biologists report that

## Pros, amateurs start Okla. City Golf tourney

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI) — A crowded cast of 148 professionals and 10 amateurs began their assault on the Quail Creek Country Club course today in the first round of the \$35,000 Oklahoma City Open golf tournament.

Defending champion Doug Sanders, Colonial National Invitational winner Julius Boros and New Zealand southpaw Bob Charles, who took the Houston Classic two weeks ago, headline the field.

While it is one of the best groups ever to play in this five-year-old tournament, pro golfs "Big Three" — Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer and Gary Player — are passing it up for a rest.

Par on the 7,030-yard layout is 36-36-72, and tight fairways with out-of-bounds markers face golfers on most holes.

Sanders engineered a truly remarkable comeback to win the \$5,300 first prize money last year. As the final round began, the jaunty Californian was six strokes behind the leader, Texan Don Massengale.

But Sanders staged a furious rally and shot a 5-under-par 67 while Massengale stumbled. Sanders capped his onslaught with a 22-foot eagle putt to win by two strokes over Johnny Pott. Massengale wound up four strokes off the pace.
