Speeding major police problem

PRINEVILLE — Speeding was the major problem for city police during April, according to the month's report from police chief Mike Thompson. The department received 16 complaints on speeders, and four on drivers conducting speed contests.

Other cases reported included reckless driving, inadequate brakes, and failure to yield right-of-way to a pedestrian. The department issued 27 traffic citations and three warnings.

Three cases of larceny under \$75 value were reported and two were cleared, with one arrest made. An arrest was made for assault and battery, three for drunkenness, one for driving while intoxicated, and three for violations of road and driving laws.

A deserter from the U.S. Army was picked up by police and placed in custody.

The police department also issued eight juvenile citations, of which three were for shoplifting, three for possession of liquor and one each for disorderly conduct and curfew violation.

The city recorded \$634 for fines and bail collected, plus \$225 for overtime parking tickets.

John Day trip being planned by Sierra Club

The spectacular John Day River canyon will be the locale of a Sierra Club raft trip that is to start on June 10 near the Service Creek confluence, northeast of Mitchell.

A large group joining in the outing will place their rafts in the stream near the bridge over the John Day at Service Creek for the start of the 100-mile drift down the river past towering cliffs and colored hills to the Columbia River.

It will be a five day trip, and will be one of the highlights of the Sierra Club's river cruising season, according to information from Lou Elliott, who heads the California club's river - touring sub-committee. He lives in Berkeley.

The John Day River is remarkable in many ways and is probably best known as the easiest route through some of the finest geological and archaeological treasure troves in Oregon.

Huge neoprene rafts will be used in the trip down the Deschutes, with a stop to be made at Clarno for a visit to the far-famed Camp Hancock fossil beds. The trip will be headed by Lou Elliott, river cruise leader of the Sierra Club's river outings.

Shipments up, railway notes

PRINEVILLE—Shipments over the City of Prineville railway's municipally-owned line soared in May to a total of 671 carloads, it is reported by C. C. McGlenn, manager.

The major part of the shipments was in lumber, 482 cars, and lumber by-products, 95 cars. Fifty-eight cars of potatoes were shipped as growers unloaded the 1962 crop prior to the spring planting season.

Petroleum products accounted for 23 inbound cars, with the balance in feed and miscellaneous articles.

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Armed Forces Day display being planned

Armed Forces Day will be quietly observed in Bend Saturday, May 18, with activity to center around the display of the three M 48 medium gun tanks recently received by the Bend unit of the Oregon National Guard.

The tanks will be on display on Kansas and Wall, in the local ONG armory area, from 1 to 4 p.m., with guardsmen on the job to explain the operation of the equipment recently received here from Fort Lewis, Wash.

Visitors will be invited to climb aboard the tanks for looks inside, where four men are normally quartered. One man occupies the driver's compartment, and three the fighting compartment.

The tanks were displayed Thursday morning in the Bend Senior High School parking area and attracted wide attention, with as many as a dozen youngsters in the compartments at one time.

Handling the tanks will be men of Co. C, 2nd Battalion, 302nd Armory, headed by Captain Keith Molan as commanding officer.

Captain Molan reported today that on June 2 the three tanks will be taken into the Bessie Butte training area south of Bend for field operation.

United States Air Force personnel at Kingsley Field, near Klamath Falls, will hold special Armed Forces Day ceremonies Saturday afternoon, with many types of planes to be displayed.

Central Oregonians will see a number of "flyovers" of planes through the day.

In downtown Bend, flags will be displayed on streets in commemoration of the day.

Gibson receives new assignment

FORT RICHARDSON, Alaska—Major Dale E. Gibson, son of Mrs. E. J. Gibson of 432 East Clay Street, Bend, will be leaving Alaska this month after over three years of service with the Army in the 49th state.

Major Gibson and his family plan to drive to Cincinnati, Ohio, on May 25, where he has been assigned as provost marshal of the U.S. Army Engineer Division, Ohio River. His new job will entail the supervision of the security and crime prevention program for some 150 civil works and military construction projects along the Ohio River and its tributaries encompassing some 14 states.

For the past three years he has served as chief of plans and operations for the U.S. Army, Alaska Provost Marshal's office. A 1940 graduate of Bend High School, Major Gibson attended Willamette University in Salem. He entered the Army in 1940 with Bend's "hometown" National Guard unit, Company I of the 162nd Infantry Regiment, 41st Division. He is a veteran of over 24 years of Army service.

Major Gibson and his wife, the former Gwen Cuffin also of Bend, plan to drive down the Alaska Highway and spend three weeks in Bend before leaving for their new home. The couple has two children, John, 15, and Rebecca, 13.

McKenzie opening due

The McKenzie Highway across the mile-high lava fields north of the Three Sisters, the Diamond Lake route over the Cascades and the Mt. Hood Loop will be opened to traffic this coming week.

The McKenzie route, now largely bypassed by the new road past Clear Lake, will be opened to travel at 8 a.m. on Thursday, May 23. At that hour, gates at both the east and west approaches to the mountain highway will be opened for the 1963 season.

The Diamond Lake road, connective link between U.S. Highway 97 and the Medford country, will be opened to travel simultaneously with the opening of the McKenzie.

The Mt. Hood Loop will be opened one day earlier, on May 22 at 10:30 a.m., it was announced from the Bend division office of the Oregon State Highway Department.

Last year, the McKenzie was opened to travel on May 10, and the previous year on May 16. Because of the light pack of snow in the high country, the task of opening the mountain route this season was easy.

Earliest opening of the pass on record was in 1930, when cars crossed the high summit on April 14.

Water allotment increase noted

MADRAS — An upward revision of the 1963 water allotment for patrons of the North Unit Irrigation district was announced this week by directors of the district.

The new water allotment was set at 2.8 acre feet, a three-tenths of an acre foot increase over the earlier announced figure of 2.5. Roger Norland, NUID secretary-manager, said the increased allotment is the result of a slightly improved outlook of stream flow water due to the heavy rains and cool weather in the past six weeks.

To date, Norland said, demand for irrigation water has been at a minimum.

PRINEVILLE — The city swimming pool will open June 1, the day after school closes for the year. That announcement was part of the report given by Dennis "Red" Huntley at the May meeting of the city council Tuesday evening, May 14. The pool will close August 31.

Huntley is general supervisor of the summer recreation program this year in Prineville.

He announced that he has hired the personnel for the summer recreation program. Dave Clark will be head life guard and in general charge of the swimming pool, assisted by three lifeguards, Enid Bolton, Pamela Vernon and Sally Van Winkle. Kay Garrison will be manager of the physical facilities of the pool other than the pool itself. Garrison is a teacher at Crook County High School.

In the general recreation program, the popular baseball schedule will be supervised by Jim Mulvihill, assisted by Tom Thompson and John Huntley. A woman may be hired at a later date to supervise a general girls' recreation program, to include softball, baton twirling and other activities.

Model bridge to be displayed at open house

An elaborate scale model of the proposed Fremont Bridge and its west side interchange in Portland will be on display at the Open House Tuesday, May 28, at the State Highway Department's Division IV offices on the North Dalles-California Highway in Bend.

The model shows the bridge's intricate interchange with the Stadium Freeway on Portland's west side, according to Dean Swift, Division IV engineer.

The bridge has two levels, one with four lanes for traffic going east and the other with four lanes for westbound traffic. It crosses the Willamette River to link the Stadium Freeway with the East Bank Freeway in Portland.

Other displays will include those on geology, pictures of highway jobs in the area, drafting equipment, and a display by the State Parks Division.

Swift said that guided tours will be conducted through the maintenance shop area where a variety of maintenance equipment will be on display, including snow plows and sanding equipment. Bend has one of the largest highway main-
