

Stone has 1 stroke lead in Okla. Open

OKLAHOMA CITY (UPI)—Handsome Bob Stone, overcoming a shaky start, carried a one-stroke margin into today's second round of the \$35,000 Oklahoma City Open.

Stone, a part-time touring professional from Junction City, Kan., shot a four-under-par 68 on the tough, windswept Quail Creek course to grab the lead.

Right on his heels came defending champion Doug Sanders, host pro Ernie Vossler, Ken Still and George Bayer, all with 69s.

Two strokes back were nine golfers, including Julius Boros, who won the Colonial Invitational last Sunday, and Rex Baxter, who was four under par and tied with Stone until he double-bogeyed the troublesome 17th hole.

Stone opened on the wrong note. He bogeyed the first hole when he missed the green and muffed a three-foot putt. After that however the demanding par 72 course was no mystery to the Kansan.

He birdied the sixth hole from eight feet away and repeated the feat on No. 9. He sank a birdie putt on the 10th hole from six feet away, hit a 15-foot birdie on the 15th hole and sank a two-foot putt for another birdie on the 18th.

Americans lose to Yugoslavs; face France

RIO DE JANEIRO (UPI)—The United States, slightly mortified by its upset loss to Yugoslavia, will attempt to bounce back against twice-beaten France tonight in the world amateur basketball tournament.

The Yugoslavs surprised the previously unbeaten Yanks 73-73 Thursday night when the final round-robin series got under way at Maracan Stadium.

The Soviet Union, which had matched the Yanks' 3-0 record in the preliminary round, remained unbeaten by overpowering France 58-48 and Brazil opened its defense of the world crown with a 61-55 triumph over Puerto Rico. The Brazilians had drawn a bye into the finals.

In tonight's other game, Yugoslavia plays Puerto Rico and Brazil meets Italy. The Russians are idle until Saturday night when they face the United States in a crucial game for both teams.

The Yanks won the recent Pan-American Games championship without losing a game and had hoped to complete another sweep in this tournament. However, the Yugoslavs ruined that Thursday night with a strong second-half comeback.

After trailing by 14 points early in the game, the Yugoslavs reduced their deficit to 32-30 at intermission. They went ahead for the first time at 52-51 midway in the second half and then outgated the favored Yanks the rest of the way.

Bosox wins-Pesky dreams coming true

Some kids hope to grow up and become president, but one former shoeshine boy would much rather be named the American League's manager of the year.

And at the rate he's going, freshman manager Johnny Pesky of the first-place Boston Red Sox might make it.

Pesky delights in telling about his teen-age days in the early '30s when he worked as a clubhouse boy for the Portland club of the Pacific Coast League.

"I used to polish the shoes and sharpen the spikes for guys like Joe DiMaggio, Ted Williams, Mike Higgins and Frank Crosetti," the dark-eyed, 43-year-old Red Sox skipper laughs.

That's all behind him now and so is the rest of the American League.

Pesky's red-hot Red Sox won their fifth straight game and took over the league lead Thursday by blanking the Los Angeles Angels 3-0 on Earl Wilson's two-hitter.

Gets Two Hits

Wilson even contributed a 379-foot triple and a single in Boston's 10-hit attack against Dan Osinski, who usually relieves for the Angels but made his first major league start.

The Red Sox got to Osinski for all their runs in the first inning. The Cleveland Indians knocked

the Chicago White Sox out of first place with a 5-4 victory and the Baltimore Orioles battered the Washington Senators 9-1 in the only other AL games scheduled.

In the National League, the San Francisco Giants beat the New York Mets 6-3, the Milwaukee Braves defeated the St. Louis Cardinals 5-2, the Chicago Cubs blanked the Cincinnati Reds 2-0, the Philadelphia Phillies downed the Houston Colts 5-2, and the Los Angeles Dodgers nipped the Pittsburgh Pirates 1-0.

Alvin Beals Brosnan

Max Alvis' homer off Jim Brosnan in the ninth inning gave the Indians their victory over the White Sox. John Buschardt started for Chicago and had a 2-1 lead until Joe Adcock's three-run double put the Tribe ahead 4-2. In the eighth, Dave Nicholson's two-run double in the top of the ninth tied the score and set the stage for Alvis' fourth homer. Pedro Ramos, Cleveland's third pitcher, was credited with his first victory.

Brooks Robinson drove in four runs for the Orioles and Jackie Brandt three more to tag Washington's Dick Rudolph with his fourth defeat. Baltimore starter Chuck Estrada, who limited the losers to two hits before departing in the sixth with a stiff elbow, won his second game.

San Diego likes being PCL king, plans to remain so

A warning to other Pacific Coast league teams: Those San Diego Padres, 1962 PCL kings, are anxious to remain in the throne room.

The Padres proved it last night. San Diego righthander Scott Breeden shut out the talent-rich Seattle Rainiers on two hits for a 1-0 victory.

It gave the Padres the series 2-1 and was San Diego's eighth win in their past 10 games. Today the Padres can boast of being the winningest club in the league with 19 victories and sole possession of first place in the Southern Division.

But it was a roller coaster ride to the top. After chugging upwards to an 8-3 record earlier in the season, the Padres dived precariously to win only 3 of their next 14 games before starting their present climb.

Breeden (2-1) retired the first 20 batters to face him. He also drove in the winning run with a sacrifice fly after Jim Saul had singled and Chico Ruiz doubled.

It was a tough game to lose for Seattle righthander Bob Heffner (3-1) who allowed the Padres only four hits. Heffner and Breeden were locked in a scoreless duel until San Diego scored its run in the eighth.

In another top-notch pitching performance, righthander George Witt and work horse Chi Chi Olivo of Denver combined to blank Oklahoma City 2-0. Witt, acquired by Denver this week after his release by the 49ers, left the game in the fifth inning with a strained muscle.

Olivo, who leads the PCL in innings pitched, finished the game and got credit for his fourth victory against two losses.

Denver scored in the fifth on a walk, stolen base and single by outfielder Chico Salmon. Salmon's double and Lou Klimchuck's single gave Denver its other run in the

eight.

Another solid relief performance was turned in by Don Williams of Dallas - Fort Worth in the Rangers' 6-5 win over Salt Lake City. Williams (2-2), relieved starter Gary Dotter in the fifth and gave up only one run and two hits in finishing.

Salt Lake's Billy Cowan swatted two of the five homers hit in the contest. For the Rangers Ray Jabonski hit a two-run homer and Ron Henry whacked a solo. Harold Jones belted a two-run homer for the Bees.

Hawaii leveled a home-run barrage to down Portland 11-7. Eight fourbaggers were hit in the game, five by Hawaii. Islander Stan Palys, last year's PCL home-run king, slammed two homers and had four runs batted in.

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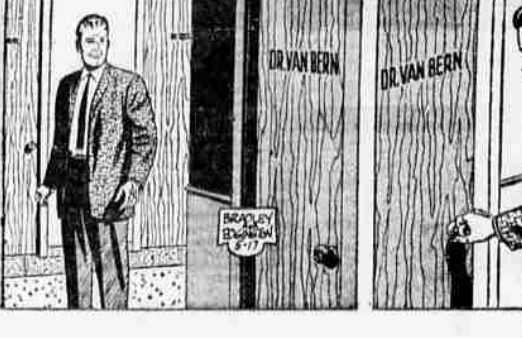
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
