Klamath Falls thumps Bend in twin bill, 7-3 and 3-1

KLAMATH FALLS — Coach Bill Bauer's Bend High School baseballers went down swinging when they finished out their season here yesterday, dropping both ends of a double bill, 7-3 and 3-1.

Klamath Falls, second place nine in that southern Oregon conference that encompasses Medford, Grants Pass and other spring sports dynamos, proved they had batting power in the opener, as they exploded for three big runs in the first inning and four in the fifth frame.

Bend, somewhat outclassed but still game, nearly came through in the nightcap, however, when the Lava Bears had the bases loaded in that final fifth inning, and then went "down to the sea in ships."

Klamath Falls' Pelicans, an older ball club (Bend's comprises by and large, sophomores and juniors), used their experience. They took advantage of several Bend miscues. A couple of times Bend runners "goofed up" on the base paths after they managed to get aboard.

In the opener, Bend got started late in the game. Down 7-1, the Bruins cut loose with a two-run onslaught in the seventh. It happened like this.

Williams got aboard via a walk, and Dick Hollenbeck got aboard when he was hit by a pitched ball. Then, after Pitcher struck out, Clark hit a two-bagger scoring Williams. An error on the Pels' third baseman enabled Clark to take third and then get home safely for the other tally. Jerry Wetle then grounded out to third, and George Woodworth went down swinging to retire the side.

In the second game, Bend only lost it 3-1, and maybe could have overcome the deficit in that last inning. With one down, Clark got aboard by taking a base on balls. Then Mike Metke rapped a single, advancing Clark to second.

George Woodworth then stepped to the plate and rapped a hot grounder to the Pel third sacker. He muffed it, and Woodworth was safe on first, loading the bases. Clark moved to third and Metke to second. Bases full. . . one down. . . good situation? Yes. Only the Bears didn't capitalize on it.

Catcher Val Lewis then struck out and Jerry Wetle hit a dribbler down the first base line, but the Pels' Larry Binnie scooped it up and threw out Clark at home on a force play to retire the side.

Hurdler jailed for theft

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Saturday's shorts: Kent Herkenrath, former San Jose State College hurdler who barely missed making the 1960 United States Olympic team, started serving a one year term in the Santa Clara, Calif., County jail today — convicted of grand theft after an armed robbery.

"He blamed the robbery plan on gambling losses," says his attorney, Marvin Lewis, "but doctors at the trial also brought out the possibility that he might have suffered brain damage from the use of methedrine and pep pills during his athletic days."

"It is an interesting case and, if the report on the pills is true, certainly should be looked into by athletic leaders."

Herkenrath was a track coach at Westmore High School in Daly City when caught. He was given five years probation and must return \$3,500 to the firms which he robbed. . .

And Miss Novella O'Hara, president of the John Pregrezer Fan Club (he's a San Francisco Giants rookie just sent down to Tacoma) explains how she became interested in Pregrezer: "I read in the paper where the Giants bought him for \$100," says Miss O'Hara. "So I says to myself that's a pretty cheap way to get a big hunk of man. So I offered the Giants \$105 for him—and I thought I'd be able to keep him a whole season."

The Giants rejected the offer—and, besides, Pregrezer is married.

It's U.S. vs. Russia tonight in basketball

RIO DE JANEIRO (UPI)—The United States meets Russia in the world basketball championship tonight in what could prove a crucial game for the Americans.

The Yanks won their first game of the final round Friday night, easily turning back France 81-61, but with one loss on their record already another defeat could eliminate them in this round-robin tournament.

Russia has won its only game thus far and a win over the United States tonight might be all the encouragement the Russians would need to go on to the championship.

Yugoslavia, the surprise team of the tourney following its upset victory over the United States on Thursday, also remained in strong contention with a convincing 73-57 triumph over Puerto Rico Friday night. The Yugoslavs go after their third straight against Italy tonight. Brazil turned back the Italians 81-62, in Friday night's other contest for its second straight win.

The United States started slowly against France and could gain only a 36-35 edge at halftime. But a full court press in the final half threw the French off balance and enabled the Yanks to pile up a solid margin.

Willis Reed and Walt Torrence paced the U.S. scoring with 17 points each.

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1.5 million silvers planted in Deschutes

PORTLAND — Approximately 1.5 million Silver salmon were planted recently above Portland General Electric company's Pelton dam on the Deschutes river in Central Oregon. PGE's chief aquatic biologist George Elcher said the Fish Commission made the plant hoping to establish a permanent run of Silvers in the Deschutes.

"The commission hopes to take advantage of the particularly favorable response of this species to early development in lakes and reservoirs, as has been demonstrated in coastal fish farms and ponds and in North Fork reservoir on the Clackamas river," Elcher said.

The PGE biologist added that the favorable response could be credited to better food conditions in lakes over most streams.

The Silver fry planted this year will begin using PGE's downstream - migrant facilities around Pelton next fall.

Also released above Pelton recently were 48,800 marked fingerling Chinook salmon. These fish will be counted and inspected by PGE biologists as they pass out of the Pelton reservoir (Lake Simstustus) via the project's downstream - migrant facility. This study will be supervised by PGE's Pelton resident biologist Elwood Madden. During the peak of the downstream migration, Fish Commission biologists will help in the work.

One record broken; others in jeopardy

Finals of the Oregon State Class B High School track meet were moving along smoothly at New Bruin Field today after some near record - shattering times yesterday afternoon and evening in the preliminaries.

One record was broken in the prelims. It happened in the 180-yard low hurdles. King Spain, Union, who was favored to win the event and perhaps shatter the record, suddenly came down with a case of appendicitis and could not compete.

Hager also equalled the existing record in the high hurdles. He took first in that one with a time of 15 flat. In the latter, nobody came close to him. The second place hurdler, L. Frick of Jefferson, managed to cross the finish line in 15.7.

In the lows, the old mark was 20.4, set by Terry Monroe of Corbett last year at Springfield. The old record in the highs (which was tied yesterday) is held by Noel Bergman of Pleasant Hill. He set the mark in Corvallis in 1951.

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All-American fullback Davis dies in Cleveland

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Ernie Davis, 23, the All-American football fullback at Syracuse who was stricken with leukemia last summer, died at Lakeside Hospital here today.

Death came at 1 a.m. for the 23-year-old athlete.

Davis had been working for a soft drink company out of Cleveland until two days ago and said he felt well.

He checked in at the Cleveland Browns' office Thursday morning and told Art Modell, club president, that he was going into the hospital for several days.

Dr. Austin Weisberger, who had been treating Davis since the disease was discovered last July, said Davis died without discomfort. Drugs administered to Davis had brought about a complete remission in the disease last fall, but there was a flareup early this

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
