

2nd no-hitter in week done by Nottebart

The guy with the big win was Don (No-Hit) Nottebart, but the man with the big grin was Houston teammate Don McMahon.

McMahon was the fellow who first recommended Nottebart to the Colts so you can imagine how he felt sitting in the bullpen last night and watching the right-hander from Lexington, Mass., pitch the National League's second no-hitter within a week.

Nottebart's masterpiece over the Philadelphia Phillies was slightly tainted in that they scored an unearned run off him in his 4-1 victory.

But Nottebart wasn't the least bit unhappy, particularly since it was the first time he pitched nine innings since 1961 and the victory brought his season record to 5-1.

The only run the Phils scored off Nottebart came in the fifth inning as a result of a two-base error by shortstop J.C. Hartman. Don Demeter reached second on the miscue, took third on Clay Dalrymple's sacrifice and scored on Don Hoak's sacrifice fly.

Goss Hits Clincher

That run matched a first-inning homer by Carl Warwick and tied the score at 1-all but Howie Goss untied it with a three-run homer in the sixth off Jack Hamilton, who had beaten the Colts

three times last year and twice more this season without ever losing to them before.

Nottebart's no-hitter came only six days after the first one of the season turned in by Sandy Koufax of the Dodgers against the Giants.

En route to his no-hitter, Nottebart walked three batters and struck out eight.

Strictly a reliever with the Braves last season, Nottebart told McMahon he would like to be with the Colts while they were chatting one night last summer.

The two were good friends, having pitched for the Braves together, and as soon as McMahon returned to Houston, he passed the word along to General Manager Paul Richards. The Colts obtained Nottebart last Nov. 29.

Dodgers Whip Pirates

In other NL action Friday night, the Los Angeles Dodgers pounded the Pittsburgh Pirates 9-3, the St. Louis Cardinals ended a four-game losing streak with an 11-2 victory over the Cincinnati Reds and the San Francisco Giants beat the New York Mets 4-3 in 11 innings. The scheduled game between the Braves and Cubs was rained out.

Minnesota trampled Cleveland 11-4 in the American League, Kansas City blanked Boston, 2-0, and the New York Yankees edged the Los Angeles Angels 4-3. A Detroit-Washington doubleheader was rained out along with the Baltimore-Chicago game.

Frank Howard drove in three runs for the Dodgers with a double and a two-run homer against the Pirates. Bob Miller gained his third victory and Joe Gibbon was charged with his first defeat.

A barrage of four home runs by George Altman, Julian Javier, Dick Groat and Stan Musial carried the Cardinals to their fourth victory at the expense of the Reds. Joey Jay, a 20-game winner last year, was routed after two innings and suffered his seventh loss against one victory.

Joe Amalfitano accounted for the Giants' victory over the Mets with an 11th inning homer that the losers vainly protested had gone foul.

Chateaugay has favorite label in Preakness

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI)—The \$180,000 Preakness Stakes comes up for its 87th running at Pimlico today with Chateaugay, the Kentucky Derby winner, again the favorite as underdog as he shoots for the crown jewel in racing's triple crown.

Two weeks ago at Churchill Downs, Chateaugay turned loose a terrific drive to run down three more highly regarded 3-year-olds in the stretch and win America's most glamorous race. The big son of Swaps, owned by the Darby Dan Farm of John W. Galbreath, again faces two of those three horses—Candy Spots and Never Bend.

No Robbery, the third, was injured in the Derby and temporarily has been taken out of training. Candy Spots Favored

In Louisville, Rex C. Ellsworth's Candy Spots was the favorite and Never Bend, owned by the Cain Hoy Stable, was a slight third choice to No Robbery with Chateaugay an outsider at better than 9-1.

Again, Candy Spots rules favorite with Never Bend a strong challenger for that post of honor. Chateaugay is likely to be third choice when the field of eight goes to the post at 5:45 p.m. EDT. The race will be televised and broadcast nationally by CBS from 5:30 to 6 p.m. EDT.

Against the "big three" in the mile and three-sixteenths race, one-sixteenth of a mile shorter than the Kentucky Derby, run Ambush Stable's On My Honor, fourth in the Derby, and four newcomers to the classic—Mrs. Charles D. Morgan's Sky Wonder, Theodore Buhl's Lemon Twist, Jacnot Stable's Country Squire, and William Robinson's Rural Retreat.

Baeza Rides Chateaugay
Chateaugay, undefeated in four races this season and winner of the Blue Grass Stakes at Keeneland prior to his Kentucky Derby victory, again will be ridden by Braulio Baeza, a Panamanian jockey who rapidly is developing to one of the best riders in the country.

Willie Shoemaker rides Candy Spots just as he has every time the chestnut colt started.

Seattle, Tacoma scrambling for first honors in PCL

Seattle is seeing goose-eggs and Tacoma is having goose-pimples in their see-saw battle for the lead in the North Division of the Pacific Coast League.

It seems the Tacoma Giants are getting the better of the deal. They slipped one-half game into first place ahead of Seattle Friday by scoring four runs in the 13th inning to down Portland 8-4.

Meanwhile, Seattle, which has the third best hitting team in the league, fell shutout victim for the second day in a row to San Diego. Dave Sisler (2-1) and reliever Ray Rippelmeyer combined to

blank the Rainiers 2-0 on a three-hitter.

San Diego scored both its runs in the ninth on singles by Chico Ruiz and Tommy Helms. A single, double and walk loaded the bases previously in that inning against Seattle pitcher Pete Smith (3-3) who was the loser.

Also in 13 innings, Oklahoma City nipped Denver 10-9; Hawaii slipped past Spokane 9-8, and Salt Lake City defeated Dallas-Fort Worth 8-1.

Seattle has not scored a run off San Diego pitching over the last 22 innings. The Padres' Scott Breeden blanked the Rainiers 1-0 Thursday.

A three-run homer by Ricardo Joseph in the 13th gave Tacoma its win over Portland. The Giants had taken a 4-2 lead in the top of the 11th only to have the Beavers tie it again in their half of the inning. Jim Hughes slammed a two-run homer for Portland in the first inning.

Oklahoma City scored twice in the bottom of the 13th to squeak past Denver. The teams were tied 7-7 at the end of the regulation nine innings and both clubs tallied single runs in the 10th. Then Denver went ahead 9-8 in the top of the 13th and the Beavers won it with two runs.

Denver exploded for six runs in the seventh inning on home runs by Ray Withrow and Jim Aaron. Surprising Hawaii ran its longest winning streak of the season to three games by edging Spokane 9-8 on a three-run outburst in the eighth. The victory tasted twice as sweet because it came at the expense of the Indians ace reliever Ken Rowe (2-1) who was sent down Tuesday by the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Two doubles, two singles and a ground out produced Hawaii's winning runs. Chuck Dees laced three doubles for the Islanders and outfielder Carlos Bernier drove in three runs for Hawaii with two hits.

Salt Lake City hurler Gordon Seyfried (2-3) pitched a five-hitter and his mates collected 17 hits in the win over Dallas-Fort Worth. Hal Jones and Billy Cowan each got four hits for the Bees and teammate Donald Eaddy chipped in with three.

No-hit pitcher gains from bullpen talk

HOUSTON (UPI)—A bullpen conversation with Don McMahon last year in Milwaukee could well have been the turning point in the pitching career of Houston's Don Nottebart.

Nottebart became the first Colt pitcher in history to pitch a no-hitter beating Houston's nemesis, Philadelphia, Friday night with a masterful performance.

"The slider was my best pitch tonight," Nottebart said after the game. "I used it, a fast ball and a slip pitch and didn't throw a curve all night."

Nottebart's no-hitter was the first since July 1, 1951, when Bob Feller beat Detroit, in which the losing team scored at least one run.

It was the second no-hitter of the season, the other pitched six days ago by Sandy Koufax of the Los Angeles Dodgers against the San Francisco Giants.

It was while pitching for the Milwaukee Braves that Nottebart, and Colt pitcher McMahon, a former Brave himself, chatted during a series in Milwaukee last year.

Nottebart said he asked McMahon to get him with the Houston club since he was not getting to pitch enough with the Braves.

"The Braves' front office was going with a youth movement and kept me in relief," Nottebart said. "I was 26 at the time."

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
