

Corbett retains Class B track title

Corbett High School, defending king of the Oregon Class B prep track and field world, has once again emerged state champion of the "little schools".

Corbett scored 59 points to almost double the tally of its nearest opponent here Saturday in the Oregon state Class B high school track meet. Camas Valley duplicated its performance last year, finishing as state runnerup.

Camas Valley scored 37 points to just nudge by a third place Bonanza team which ran up 36 1/6 points. Others finishing in the top ten were, McEwen (Athena) 30, Cascade Locks 24, Monroe 23, Oakland 22, Colton 20, Powers 20 and Triangle Lake 16.

It's all over now, but the whole affair didn't pass by the board at New Bruin Field Saturday without some re-writing of the record book.

Track fans at the Class B finals saw three records tumble and a fourth one knotted. New marks were set in the pole vault, 800-yard relay, and the high jump.

Tied was the high hurdle mark. Corbett athletes, themselves, accounted for two of the four.

Robin Hager, who entered the meet with perhaps the most outstanding season performances, stayed true to form when he equalled the existing high hurdle mark, topping the timbers in 15.0 seconds. The record was set by

Noel Bergman of Pleasant Hill in 1951 at Corvallis.

In the preliminaries Friday evening, Corbett's relay team set a new mark when the foursome exchanged the baton and dashed home in 1:33.8 minutes. The old mark of 1:34.3 was set by the Pilot Rock Rockets in 1951 at Corvallis.

Saturday, Corbett came right back and did it again. Stan Fogle, Gary Moore, Jim Dhone and Kit Houck broke their own record finishing this time in 1:33.2.

Perhaps the most amazing athlete of the state-wide affair was Elliott Lewis of Colton. He scored all of Colton's 20 points. Lewis broke one record. He completed the high jump to a leap of 6'2" in the high jump to completely shatter the old 5'11 1/2" record set by Martin Sharp of Eagle Valley in 1955, and tied by himself last year at Springfield. Bill Fredericks, Oakland, also bettered the old mark when he went 6'. Fredericks was runnerup.

Dan Hunt of Knappa cleared the cross bar at 12'5" to set a record in the pole vault. Pat Farley of Arlington, who vaulted 12'3" in 1960, had the old standard.

In other events, the first place honors were spread over a number of schools. Jon Lamoreaux of Oakland won the discus with a toss of 136'10 1/2". Sam Pambrum of McEwen won the broad jump with a leap of 21'0". The incom-

parable Lewis of Colton won the 100-yard dash in 19.2 seconds. Dave Jensen of Cascade Locks garnered a first when he threw the javelin 178'11".

Terry Smith of McEwen won the mile run with a time of 4:50.8, and Jim Dhone of Corbett won the 440-yard dash in 51.5 seconds. Dave Jensen became a double winner when he captured the shot put with a heave of 48'1 1/4". Robin Hager of Corbett won the 180-yard low hurdles in 20.5 seconds.

Bob Rice of Bonanza won the 220 when he soared home in 22.5 seconds, and Bob Lawson of Camas Valley won the half mile (880) with a time of 2:00.8.

The log-jam wasn't helped any Sunday when four doubleheaders ended in splits and none of the leaders could make the least bit of headway against any of the others.

The Red Sox had an opportunity to widen their slender percentage-points lead after clipping the A's, 7-3, in the first game of a doubleheader but lost the nightcap, 9-7.

Baltimore won the opener from Chicago, 4-3, then lost a 10-inning nightcap by the same score; the Los Angeles Angels beat the Yankees, 6-2, but dropped the second game, 10-4; Cleveland defeated Minnesota, 6-4, and lost the finale, 7-6; and the Detroit Tigers winged the Washington Senators, 5-1, in a single game.

Over in the National League, the Philadelphia Phillies blanked San Francisco, 3-0, in the first of two but then dropped a 6-5 decision. The Los Angeles Dodgers took two from the New York Mets, 1-0 and 4-2 in 13 innings; Pittsburgh beat Houston, 5-0; Cincinnati downed St. Louis, 10-6, and the Chicago Cubs defeated the Milwaukee Braves, 3-2, but lost the second game, 8-2.

Frank Malzone drove in five runs in the Red Sox Athletics opener with two homers and a single that paved the way for Bill Monbouquette's fourth victory. KC reliever Bill Fischer scored his sixth straight victory without a defeat in the nightcap as George Alusik and Ed Charles each hit two-run homers.

Robin Roberts struck out the 2,000th batter of his major league career in the Orioles' opening game victory over the White Sox. His victim was Juan Pizarro, who suffered his first loss following three straight victories. Roberts allowed five hits in bringing his record to 2-4.

Ray Herbert's string of scoreless innings ended at 38 when Orioles catcher John Orsino hit the first of his two homers in the third inning of the second game. Orsino also singled home the tying run in the ninth but Pete Ward's triple won the game for the White Sox in the 10th. Jim Brosnan, recently acquired from the Reds, was credited with his first AL triumph.

Albie Pearson's three-run homer and another two-run blast by rookie Bob Perry eased the way for Ken McBride's first game

victory over the Yanks. The Angel right-hander now has registered two of his season's three triumphs over the world champs and has beaten them five straight times.

They combed Bo Belinsky for eight runs in the first two innings of the nightcap, however, enabling Ralph Terry to coast to his fourth victory. Cleve Boyer homered for the Yankees and Leon Wagner belted his 11th for the Angels.

Lenny Green's two-run homer in the ninth inning of the second game powered the Twins to their second game win after Pedro Ramos scored his second victory in the opener. Joe Adcock drove in all six of Cleveland's runs in the nightcap with two homers and a single but Ray Moore, third of five Twin pitchers, gained his first victory.

Ramos singled home two runs in the opener and went 8 2/3 innings despite homers by Zoltu Versalles, Jimmy Hall and Earl Batley. Rookie Bill Paul scored his first major league victory for the Tigers with a three-hitter over the Senators.

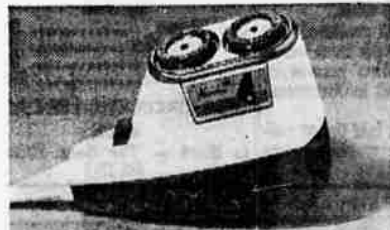
