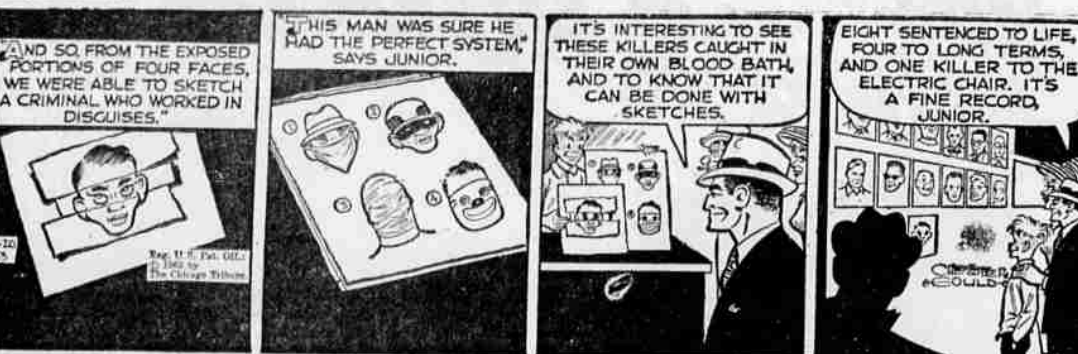

'Nothing settled' in talks on tariff cutting a Geneva

GENEVA (UPI) — The United States today sought to break a four-day deadlock with the European Common Market nations that has brought their tariff-cutting talks to the brink of failure.

A three-hour meeting between the United States and Britain on the one hand and market members on the other broke up early today and a U.S. delegate said "nothing is settled."

Former Secretary of State Christian A. Herter, chief U.S. delegate, plans to leave the conference of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT) on Wednesday, and informed sources said that if no agreement is reached by then the consequences could be as serious as Britain's failure to join the market last winter.

Tariff Cut Issue

Herter led the Anglo-American negotiators in the talks that ended shortly after midnight. He was to confer again today or Tuesday with the Common Market team, headed by Jean Rey, the market executive commissioner for external affairs.

The issue is the amount of tariff reductions acceptable to the two sides.

The United States is authorized to negotiate across the board tariff cuts of up to 50 per cent. Herter's team can settle for less than 50 per cent, but the cuts must be the same for all products.

The Common Market rejects this, charging that it favors U.S. business over European interests. The alternative is a sliding scale of tariff rates.

Find No Compromise

Both sides agree that tariffs should be cut to increase trade. The Europeans contend that the American plan would continue to protect certain U.S. products—

chemicals, for example — from European competition.

The United States says the European plan would reduce tariffs only by a total of 12 per cent. It does not consider this enough of a stimulus to trade.

Thus far, no compromise has been found for the two views.

The deadlock could have repercussions extending far beyond matters of trade. It could pit the United States and the British-led European free trade area against the Common Market in a bloc that might force the Common Market nations to line up behind France's "third force" ideas of its future.

FAS predicts reduction in wheat exports

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Foreign Agriculture Service (FAS) predicts a reduction in world wheat exports this year below the record 1,702,000 bushels of 1961-62.

FAS said the probable reduction in world trade would stem from wheat crop increases during 1962 in Western Europe and parts of Asia, and much larger crops in North Africa.

FAS said durum wheat export supplies in 1962-63 are expected to exceed normal import requirements because there was such large production in 1962.

Mainland China's larger wheat crop should reduce that country's import requirements to some extent, FAS said. Even so, imports probably will continue to be large.

Total world wheat stocks are down, FAS said, because of reduced supplies in Canada and Australia.

World feed grain exports in 1961-62 were 18 per cent above the previous record, as a result of poor crops in Europe and the continued low production in North African countries, coupled with rising demand from continued development of livestock industries in Japan and a number of other countries.

FAS said world grain production in 1962-63 is expected to exceed slightly the 1961-62 crop. Increases in production of wheat and barley partially offset reductions in corn and oats. The world barley crop set a new high, and a near-record wheat crop was produced.

The National Confectioners Association is holding its annual convention here this week. The drum beaters for the confections are not loath to point out the relationship between agriculture and candy.

The candy industry, the association said, uses the production of nearly 2.5 million acres of land and the output of 160,000 cows and 285,000 hens.

Production from the land that goes into the nearly 3 1/2 billion pounds of candy made yearly includes:

—1,275,000,000 pounds of beet and cane sugar, the production of 263,000 acres of sugar beets and sugarcane.

—740 million pounds of corn syrup and 63.5 million pounds of corn sugar and other sweeteners, obtained from 21,140,000 bushels of corn grown on 425,000 acres.

—148 million pounds of shelled peanuts, the production of 42,225 acres.

—26.4 million pounds of almonds produced on 74,000 acres.

—12,250,000 pounds of soybean and cottonseed oil from 105,000 acres of soybeans and 300,000 acres of cotton.

—35 million pounds of dry coconut grown on 38,000 acres.

—320 million pounds of cocoa and cocoa products from 1,160,000 acres of cacao trees.

The 160,000 cows produced 1.03 billion pounds of milk from which came the 42 million pounds of milk products used in American-made candy.

The 285,000 hens laid the 37 million eggs used in making candy last year.

Radcliffe girls stage raid on Harvard Sunday

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UPI) —

Radcliffe College girls staged a reverse party raid on Harvard Sunday night and touched off a noisy demonstration involving 2,000 students.

Police broke up the disturbance and arrested eight Harvard men on charges of disturbing the peace and alleged property damage. They were to be arraigned today.

There were no injuries and no major damage.

The uprising, blamed on spring fever and pre-exam pressure, started when 150 Radcliffe girls marched a mile to Harvard Yard and shouted to men in Winthrop House, a male dormitory, to throw them underwear.

Some of the Harvard boys threw shorts and others dropped water bombs and bars of soap. One Radcliffe girl said the raid was planned early Sunday.

As the girls began returning to their dormitories, the Harvard boys began grouping for a party raid on Radcliffe's nine dormitories. At one time there were at least 2,000 men and women involved in the demonstrations, officials said.

By this time police had been posted at all doors of the Radcliffe dormitories, allowing no girls out and no boys in. Police said none of the boys entered the girl dormitories, but they yelled at the girls to throw them panties.

Some of the girls tossed unmentionables and others retaliated with water bombs.

During the demonstration police told the students that Harvard President Nathan Pusey had warned them that any boy whose identification card was confiscated would face possible suspension. Police also drove cruisers slowly through the milling crowds in an attempt to split up and disperse the students.

By 11 p.m., EDT, most of the Harvard boys had returned to their campus.

Demonstration ends without any incidents

KENNEWICK, Wash. (UPI) — A scheduled racial demonstration which had drawn attention and newsmen from all over the state ended without incident after half an hour Saturday, with the demonstrators being invited in by local church people for soft drinks and coffee.

The demonstration had been called by Jack Tanner, Northwest head of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, who termed Kennewick the "Birmingham of Washington."

There are no Negroes living in the southwest Washington town of 14,200, although there are a substantial number in the neighboring communities of Pasco and Richland.

Invitations to participate had been sent to 4,000 Northwest NAACP members. About 75 showed up, approximately three-fifths of them white persons.

The demonstration had been scheduled to run an hour and a half, but was called off after half an hour as the marchers wearied quickly in the 80 degree weather.

Crowds turned out to watch the marchers, but there was no heckling.
