### Chamber group hears Seeley

Delegates from Madras, Prineville, Redmond, Culver and Bend attended a meeting of the Central Oregon Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night in Culver at which Don E. Seeley, coordinator of intrastate travel for the travel information division, Oregon State Highway Department, was the guest speaker.

Seeley said an estimated \$270,000,000 is brought to Oregon annually by travel from out of state. Added to this imposing total that goes into travel channels is some \$195,000,000 spent by persons traveling within the state.

It was estimated that Central Oregon receives some 10 per cent of the travel bonanza. John Prodel, Bend, president of the Central Oregon Chamber, presided at the Culver meeting. He was accompanied to the meeting by Marion E. Cady, Bend Chamber of Commerce manager, and David Y. Wilson.
