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Entire LaPine school takes tour of Crescent District

CRESCENT — The entire LaPine Grade school, composed of 54 pupils from grades 1 through 8, joined in a field trip to the Crescent District of the Deschutes National Forest on May 14. Accompanying the youngsters were their four teachers, Mrs. Lorraine Lohner, Mrs. Ora Roberts, Mrs. Katie Taylor and Mrs. James Aroao.
The trip was made in the LaPine school bus, with trip leaders meeting at the Crescent Ranger Station. Trip leaders were Leslie P. Yates, Crescent District ranger, and Leslie R. Martin, his timber management assistant.

First stop was at the Odell Butte timber sale, where the youngsters were met by Rufus Childre, woods management superintendent for the Gilchrist Timber Company. Various parts of the sale were visited and the pupils watched Bill Hight and Bud Capps fall two large pines.

Stops were made at various places, with a lunch stop made at Dell Camp.
The pupils saw birds in their native habitat at Davis Lake and examined wood nesting boxes. In one area, trees planted in landings after logging was completed

were inspected. Campground construction work was seen. Deer browsing damage in some areas was noted.
Final stop was on the shore of Wickiup Reservoir, where some thinning had been done in the young fir timber. Importance to irrigation of water stored in the Wickiup reservoir was stressed.

Site survey plans reported

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Approval by the Area Development Administration of a survey of potential industrial sites in Columbia and Hood River counties in Oregon was announced today.

The announcement was made jointly by Sen. Wayne Morse, Sen. Maurine B. Neuberger and Rep. Al Ullman, all Democrats.
The legislators said in a statement that a \$17,000 survey to be carried out in 12 months might result eventually in bringing new industry to the area.
The area will put up \$10,000 of the cost with local agencies paying \$7,000.

Polar route conquered in small plane

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (UPI) — Two Swedes who conquered the polar route on a nonstop flight from Bodoe, Norway, to Alaska in a single-engine small plane planned to return Tuesday, but by a different route.
Businessman Sigurd Hallstrom said he and pilot Olie Ringstrand, both of Stockholm, planned to return by way of northern Canada and Greenland.

"A change of scenery would be nice," Hallstrom said, "and there is the weather — the weather is very important."
Hallstrom and Ringstrand arrived here early Monday from Norway in their Piper Comanche. Their flight from Bodoe to Barter Island at the northeastern tip of Alaska took 21 hours and 15 minutes.

The trip is believed to be the first time the polar route has been flown in a single-engine private plane.
After a brief refueling stop at Barter Island the pair flew the rest of the way south to Anchorage in five hours.

Their plane was undergoing a maintenance check at Safeway Airways here in preparation for their departure this afternoon. On the flight to Alaska the only difficulty they encountered was with the craft's long range radio.
Repairmen said the radio had a defective transistor. But the craft withstood the long flight over the polar wastes without difficulty.
Hallstrom maintained the trip over the pole was "just routine."

"It was a business trip," he said, "nothing out of the ordinary."
Ringstrand said the plane, specially equipped with an extra 130 gallon fuel tank in the rear seat, weighed 3,800 pounds when fully fueled.

Hail stones batter south Texas area

A Texas-sized hail storm left hailstones piled 18 inches deep in south Texas today. Crops were flattened and cars were dented by the golf-ball size stones and at least two roads were closed.
At least two persons were dead after a tornadoic wind and rain storm lashed North Carolina Tuesday.

An 18-inch layer of hail was reported seven miles north of Bovina, Tex., where wheat, cotton, and corn crops were damaged heavily. The hail, which fell during the night, was followed by torrential rains which caused minor flooding. Two roads were closed because of high water.

Four inches of rain fell on the Texas-New Mexico border during the night.
Thunderstorms, packing winds up to 75 miles per hour and 34 inch hailstones, pounded North Carolina. Two persons were killed in an automobile accident during the height of the storm near Clay-ton.

Heaviest damage was reported at Chapel Hill, N.C., where the storm knocked down trees, snarled traffic, disrupted power and flooded one street.

POLICE WEAR SHIELDS

BRISTOL, England (UPI) — Bristol police have been equipped with lightweight "gladiator" shields of glass fiber to ward off attacks with guns and knives.
A police spokesman said Tuesday the shields are 2 feet long and 2 feet wide and give protection against stones, daggers, clubs and light caliber pistols.

1959 census figures reflected in latest edition of yearbook

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department has issued its annual statistical yearbook. It is called appropriately, "Agricultural Statistics, 1962."

The department said the current edition is a more complete reference than any other recent issue, with some tables dating back to 1866. The statistics reflect revisions resulting from review of the 1959 census of agriculture.

The book contains statistics on agricultural products, production, prices, supplies, costs, income, land use, farm ownership, farm-workers, food consumption and related subjects. There are statistics on weather, freight rates, refrigerated warehouse storage, fisheries, forestry, world crops, and foreign trade.

The department reported almost 532 million bushels of 1962-crop corn had been put under price support; loans and purchase agreements through April. A year earlier, almost 549 million bushels of 1961 crop corn had been put under support through April.

During April, farmers put almost 23 million bushels of 1962-crop corn under price support, compared to about 40 million bushels in March. During April, 1962, farmers put 50 million bushels of 1961-crop corn under support.

An Economic Research Service (ERS) report shows that the beverage industry used 13.5 per cent of all sugar consumed in the United States in 1961. This was about one-fourth of the sugar delivered to industrial users. Beverages top all other industrial uses of sugar.

ERS said nearly 95 per cent of the caloric sweeteners delivered to the beverage industry in 1961 was sugar, about 2 per cent was dextrose, and 3 per cent was corn syrup.

Soft drink producers are the largest users of sugar in the beverage industry, which includes soft drinks, flavorings, malt, malt liquors, and distilled liquors. ERS said. Flavorings take the second largest share, but as soft drink manufacturers are the largest users of flavorings, much of the sugar in flavorings reaches consumers in soft drinks.

There are 27 states and Puerto Rico now participating in the four-phase state-federal hog cholera eradication program. This four-phase cooperative program establishes uniform procedures that must be met to attain eradication.

The department lists the phases: I—Preparation or program organi-

zation; II—Reduction of hog cholera incidence; III—Elimination of outbreaks; IV—Protection against reinfection.

There are no states in phase IV. Nevada is in phase III. Delaware, Montana, and Oregon are in phase II. In phase I are Alabama, California, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Mississippi, Nebraska, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Ohio, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, Washington, Wyoming, and Puerto Rico.

Kennedy's jet sets new mark

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy's jet transport Air Force No. 1 set a Moscow-to-Washington record of 9 hours, 53 minutes and 52 seconds Tuesday, cutting nearly three hours off the Russian mark.

It was the second record in as many trips for the President's Boeing 707. On the trip to Moscow from Washington Sunday, the jet piloted by Col. James B. Swindal, 46, set a trip record of 8 hours, 38 minutes and 42 seconds.

Air Force No. 1 had to buck considerable headwinds on the return trip and landed at Andrews Air Force Base in a driving rain, but it was still far better than the 12 hours and 21 minutes it took a Russian TU114 turbo-prop plane to bring Premier Nikita Khrushchev to Washington in 1959.

The President's plane took Atomic Energy Commission Chairman Glenn T. Seaborg to Moscow to sign an agreement on an information exchange. Upon arrival in Washington, the jet had to quickly refuel and fly to Patrick Air Force Base, Fla., to bring astronaut L. Gordon Cooper to Washington.
