California area rocked by quake

EL CENTRO, Calif. (UPI) — A series of earthquakes shook Imperial Valley and San Diego County late Wednesday night and this morning.

No damage was reported, but the tremors were strong enough to rattle windows and make hanging objects sway. The California Institute of Technology Seismological Laboratory in Pasadena, Calif., recorded four quakes during the period between 11:30 p.m. and 9 a.m. ranging in magnitude from 3 to 5 on the Richter scale.

Television's annual Emmy awards to be made Sunday

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—It's Emmy time again and 29 golden statuettes will be passed out to deserving winners in a nationally televised blowout wherein video will pat itself on the back.

One of the chief patters is Robert Levine, a CBS bigwig (vice president in charge of programs in Hollywood) who also is national president of the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

There was a time when nearly everybody in television won an award. Emmys once were passed out indiscriminately. Now the academy feels it has reached a satisfactory number of awards as well as a measure of stature. But the question is, why give out any awards at all?

TV Needs It "Because they are symbolic of recognition of one's peers," said Levine. "You might ask why any awards or decorations are presented in other fields. Television has a need for this kind of public platform to make the public aware of the vast storehouse of entertainment and information that has been available all year long."

Levine, who will appear on the May 26 Emmy show, makes no apologies for the video medium. "TV is the third major activity of people in this country—right after sleeping and working," he said. "More time is spent watching television than any other entertainment medium in history."

Watching and Rooting "If the public watches that much it must develop an attachment for the people on the screen. Therefore, viewers will obviously be watching and rooting for their favorites at the awards."

"We expect 55 million viewers to be tuned in. The public has a proprietary interest in its favorites."

Levine believes, too, that the Emmys do a service to the public at large by reminding viewers of the best moments in television.

Resources plan suffers setback

SALEM (UPI) — Creation of a department of natural resources got a setback in the House today that probably is final for this session.

The House voted 36-24 to send the bill back to the Committee on Natural Resources.

The measure would have grouped the state's multitude of natural resource agencies into one department with six divisions:

Forestry, agriculture, mineral resources, fish and game, water resources, and small boats and harbors.

The governor would have appointed the department head, who in turn would have named division heads.

The agencies and interests involved lobbied strenuously against the bill. Reps. Stafford Hansell, R-Hermiston, and John Mosser, R-Beaverton, said the question was whether Oregon's resources should be managed under a coordinated program for all the people, or whether each vested interest should retain its "little empire."

"We are one of the great natural resource states of the nation," said Rep. Richard Eymann, D-Marcola. "It is amazing we have gone so long without trying to coordinate our natural resource."

"These agencies are spending more time fighting than trying to cooperate," he said.

Influencing Minds "I believe nothing in the history of mankind has wielded a more effective single influence on the minds of men than television has during the past 10 years," Levine said.

As for the big razzmatazz Sunday night, Levine feels some inequities are bound to show up. But he believes that most nominees will be contending against "like" shows and performances. In the past such nutty goings on included Bishop Fulton Sheen competing in the same category with Milton Berle.

"This year's contests won't be as confusing as they were in earlier awards," Levine said. "We are still working toward the best possible awards program without cheapening the Emmys."

"As for their performance as compared with the Oscars, it is good to remember that more people watch television in a single week than go to see movies in an entire year."

Students get L.A. ballroom after all

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy will see to it that students at the John Burroughs High School in Burbank, Calif., get their senior prom the night of June 7 at the Beverly Hilton Hotel in Los Angeles after all.

Kennedy will be attending a \$1,000-a-plate Democratic fund-raising dinner the same night in the same hotel. He learned Wednesday that 600 students were upset because the prom they had scheduled for the ballroom had been bumped by the President's birthday fund-raising dinner, to be held in the same room.

Press Secretary Pierre Salinger told reporters that when Kennedy heard about the row he called California Democratic State Chairman Eugene Wyman and told him to work out another arrangement. Wyman arranged for the high school students to have the ballroom and the Democrats would hold their dinner in the Starlight and Escoffier rooms at the hotel. "Two rooms at the price of one," quipped Salinger. He added that "we hope the kids have a good time."

"The students are very excited and very appreciative of what the President did," said Mrs. Elizabeth Hill, student body advisor at the Burbank school. "We were dumbfounded by all the notoriety the matter got, but we were sure all along it was just a misunderstanding."
