North Koreans refuse to free 2 U.S. pilots

PANMUNJOM, Korea (UPI) — Communist North Korea has refused to release two American helicopter pilots or even to disclose whether they still were alive after a forced landing on Communist territory Friday.

The United States believes the pilots, Capt. Ben W. Stuts, 32, Florence, Ala., and Charles W. Vultz, 26, Frankfort, Mich., are alive. But Maj. Gen. George H. Cloud, who met with North Korean negotiators at this truce village, said the Communists "don't have the decency to tell us."

Cloud said after the meeting that "we will ask for another meeting and we will continue to hold meetings until they answer."

He told the North Koreans that the flight was unintentional and was regretted. The two pilots were flying a United Nations Command boundary-spotting mission when they apparently strayed into North Korea from the demilitarized zone separating North and South Korea.

Cloud said the aircraft carried neither cameras nor weapons and "it is unreasonable to treat the pilots as criminals."

But North Korean Maj. Gen. Chang Chung Kwan labeled the flight "an aggressive act by your side" and instead of giving information on the pilots, issued a long denunciation of the United States.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon didn't quite make the "Ev and Charlie Show" this trip, but he has an option to appear on the GOP production later.

The assurance that he will share the Republican congressional leadership platform at some future date may make Nixon feel more comfortable in his strange new role of being more practicing lawyer than practicing politician.

GOP sources said it was an assurance he was looking for.

Nixon arrived Wednesday, 24 hours too early for today's scheduled "Ev and Charlie" leadership meeting and news conference of Senate Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., and House Leader Charles A. Halleck, Ind.

The 1960 GOP presidential nominee lunched with Senate and House Republican leaders Wednesday.

Nixon made it clear to newsmen he was not out gunning for any 1964 presidential candidate, be it Sen. Barry Goldwater, Ariz., New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller or anyone else.

He said "Eisenhower-Nixon Republicans" could and should be able to support any of the prominently mentioned White House prospects.

Neither "kingmaker" nor candidate, as he said, the transplanted Californian now is experiencing the problems known by Republican Thomas E. Dewey and Democrat Adlai E. Stevenson as defeated presidential nominees.

Like Nixon, both Dewey and Stevenson turned to the law, travel and international affairs in fashioning new careers after years in politics.

Now a New York attorney, Nixon

on plans to leave for an extended European tour June 11. The combined vacation, work and study trip will bring him home in August ready to make speeches and write articles in the months before the 1964 election.

DRINKERS CAN'T DANCE

MONTPELIER, Vt. (UPI) — Tipplers in Vermont now can stand and walk around—but they can't dance while drinking.

The state Liquor Control Board Wednesday announced the change in barroom regulations which still prohibit dancers from carrying drinks.

Gone is the old rule that required waitresses to transport drinks if a patron moved from one spot to another.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Civil Aeronautics Board Wednesday refused a request from West Coast Airlines that it be allowed to reduce service to Roseburg, Ore.

However, the CAB noted that traffic at Roseburg has dropped to near the board's "use-it-or-lose-it" standard of five passengers a day. It said West Coast could apply again to suspend service to the city if traffic declines further.

The program will continue with two numbers by the a cappella choir. The benediction will be pronounced by Rev. Stanton Irvine, followed by the recessional.

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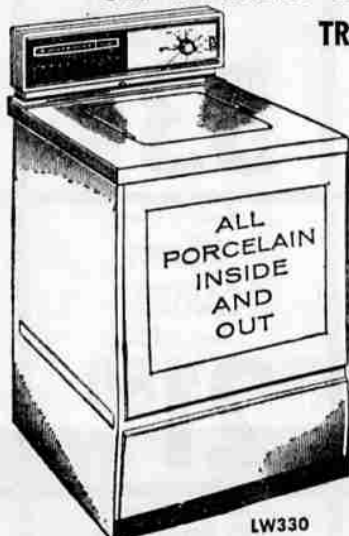
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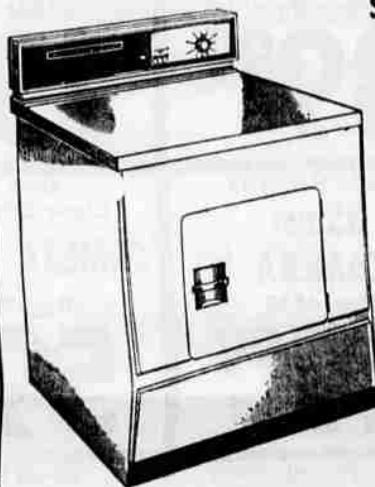
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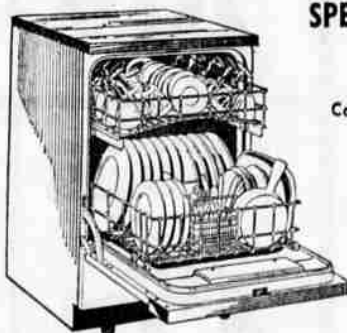
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Astoria man gains honors

SEATTLE (UPI) — John C. Webb, 33, an Astoria coastguardman, was honored Wednesday as "Maritime Man of the Year" for winning the Treasurer, Department's gold lifesaving medal and two Coast Guard commendation medals during the past 2½ years.
